Staff Recommendation:

APPROVE the FY 2008 – 2013 City of Knoxville Capital Improvements Program

Comments:

Pursuant to Knoxville City Charter requirements, the Planning Commission staff, in cooperation of the City's Finance Department staff, has prepared the City's Capital Improvements Program for Fiscal Years 2008 – 2013. The following projects are highlights from this year's document:

- Adair Greenway This project will include the extension of the existing Adair Park Greenway to Old Broadway.
- **Downtown Transit Center** Funds for this project will support continued design, planning and construction of the proposed center, which will replace the on-street transfer point on Main Street.
- I-275 Business Park Access Improvements This project will involve improvements to adjacent access roads to foster development in the I-275 Business Park.
- **KCDC Park City Infill Housing Program** This program will support the construction of new infill housing in the Five Points area of Park City.
- South Knoxville Waterfront Project Funds for this project will support the implementation of several priority public improvement projects which can serve as catalysts for major private investment in the project area.

After approval by the Planning Commission, the document will be forwarded to City Council for their consideration and adoption. Please let me know if you have any questions regarding the FY 2008 – 2013 Knoxville Capital Improvements Program. A copy of the CIP has been included with the monthly MPC agenda package.

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Introduction

Introduction

What is a Capital Improvements Program?

The Capital Improvements Program (CIP) is a prioritized, multi-year schedule of public improvements, including construction projects, as well as land acquisitions and major equipment purchases. The CIP covers a six year period and sets the policy framework within which capital improvements will be made. The program is one of the processes utilized to achieve desired urban growth and development. By providing a planned schedule of public improvements, the program outlines present and future public needs and intentions, which have a positive influence on private investment decisions. The coordination of orderly and efficient programs of private and public investment can thus be developed for the maximum overall public benefit.

The CIP provides the principal tool for coordinating physical and financial planning, but it should not be considered a final and fixed plan. A meaningful measure of its usefulness will be its effective application as a process. The projects listed in the first year of the program form the Capital Budget. The Capital Budget may be amended by City Council during the fiscal year. The full CIP is reviewed and revised each year. An additional year is added to maintain the full five-year period of the program.

Reasons For Preparing a Capital Improvements Program

A CIP provides for the orderly and systematic financing and acquisition of public improvements. It also provides (1) information for individual taxpayers, neighborhood associations and other civic groups interested in the City's development plan: (2) a statement of intention for Federal and State agencies who provide grants-in-aid to the City; and (3) a source of information for potential investors who may purchase municipal securities.

There are several advantages to protecting and scheduling capital improvements in advance of actual needs:

- Reduced need for "crash programs" to finance the construction of City facilities.
- Budgeting within a system which assures that capital projects will be built according to a predetermined priority system while planning in advance for the revenue needed to finance and complete these capital projects.
- Advanced planning to ensure that projects are well thought out in advance of construction.
- Scheduled purchasing commensurate with favorable market conditions.
- Maximized coordination with the City's Operating Budget. An important aspect of capital improvement planning is the effect capital expenditures have on the annual operating costs of the City. For example, once a new facility is completed, operating costs (such as staffing and maintenance) are an on-going expense.

Authorization

Authorization of CIP and Budget for Knoxville is found in the City Charter of Knoxville establishing the Capital Improvements Programming and Capital Budgeting Process.

Article VIII, Section 801 C provides:

C. Capital Improvements Program

1. The Mayor shall have the Metropolitan Planning Commission annually prepare a Capital Improvements Program of proposed capital expenditures for the ensuing fiscal year, and the next five fiscal years thereafter, accompanied by the report and recommendations of the Metropolitan Planning Commission.

- 2. The Mayor or an agent of the Mayor shall obtain annually from the officers, departments, boards and commissions and other agencies requesting funds from the City for capital improvements, such information as may be necessary in order to enable the Metropolitan Planning Commission to prepare a CIP. These data shall be delivered to the Planning Commission not later than four months prior to the end of the fiscal year. The Mayor shall submit a capital improvements program and budget to the Council not later than 45 days prior to the commencement of the next ensuing fiscal year, and the method of financing them, noting the impact on the debt structure of the City, and shall include in the appropriate current operating budget any projects to be financed from current revenues for the ensuing fiscal year.
- 3. Council shall have the power to accept, with or without amendment, or reject the proposed program and the proposed means of financing. Council shall not authorize expenditures for the construction or acquisition of any building, structure work or improvement, unless the appropriation for such project is included within its capital improvements program, except to meet public emergency threatening the lives, health, or property of the inhabitants when passed by a votes of two-thirds (²/3) members of Council. The capital improvements program must be acted upon finally by the Council not later than (15) days prior to the commencement of the next ensuing fiscal year.
- 4. The Mayor may submit amendments to the capital improvements program any time during the year, accompanied by the recommendations thereon of Metropolitan Planning Commission, which amendments shall become effective when adopted by a vote of two-thirds (²/3) of the members of Council.

Participants and their Role in the CIP Process

All Departments, boards, commissions and agencies requesting funds or authorization to expend funds for capital improvements during the forthcoming fiscal year are required to participate in the capital improvements programming process. They have the primary responsibility for the initial proposal of improvement projects to be included in the program. The heads of these departments can most accurately assess future capital needs necessary to fulfill the departmental function and program. They are also able to determine project costs and the relative importance of each project. The departments must present a written budget request to the Mayor and have funding authorized by the City Council in order to implement the projects. Other participants in the process and their roles include the following:

The Metropolitan Planning Commission:

The Metropolitan Planning Commission staff assembles, tabulates, and coordinates project requests submitted by the various operating departments. The Planning Commission recommends priorities for proposed projects based upon their conformance with the comprehensive plan.

Mayor and Staff:

The Mayor must consider the program recommended to him by the operating departments. It is his responsibility, with the aid of his staff, to determine the overall objectives and direction for the City and the administration's priority for requested requests. The Finance Department is primarily responsible for reviewing the program and evaluating it in terms of the City's financial resources. The program which is submitted by the Mayor to the City Council reflects the administration's recommended plan for the coming year. The Mayor and his staff will reevaluate the other proposed projects as funding becomes available.

City Council:

The City Council exercises the right of final approval of the CIP. It may, after considering the program submitted by the Mayor, require amendments or revisions. The Council's power for approval and adoption of the final program derives from the fact that only Council is authorized to approve the expenditure of public funds. Those projects approved for funding in the ensuing budget year become the Capital Budget. Once the City Council approves a Capital Budget and CIP, it can not authorize expenditure of Capital Funds for projects not contained in these documents unless they are first amended by a two-thirds majority vote of Council.

Some Important Definitions

Capital Improvement Project: This is an item for which the purchase, construction, or other acquisition represents a public betterment to the community and adds to the total physical worth of the City, provided that the project considered has an anticipated life of not less than one (1) year following its purchase, construction, or other acquisition, and has a total cost of not less than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000). Whenever possible, each item which is a usable structure, separate facility, piece of equipment, or rolling stock should be designated as a separate project. An initial project includes all parts thereto; i.e., land, buildings, machinery and equipment integral to it, and as such will be considered as a single capital project. This definition includes, but is not limited to the following:

Land:

All expenditures for land regardless of whether or not they meet the dollar cost limitation set forth above, and whether they are for an interim holding in connection with a program of economic development or for a long-term public use.

Structure:

All expenditures for structures, including construction cost, feasibility studies, architectural, engineering, legal, and related expenses, and expenditures for major renovation of or additions to structures should be included.

Machinery and Equipment:

All expenditures for machinery, equipment, and furnishings that are built into and are an integral part of the structure at the time of initial acquisition or construction are to be included.

Capital Improvements Program (CIP):

This is a plan for capital expenditures to be incurred over a six-year period to meet capital needs defined in the longterm work program of the departments and other City agencies. Thus, the program sets forth each proposed project in which Knoxville is to have a part, and specifies the full resources estimated to be available to finance the proposed expenditures.

Capital Budget:

The first year of the CIP becomes the Capital Budget. Included in the budget are the projects recommended by the Mayor and approved by City Council for funding during the next ensuing fiscal year.

Understanding This Document

Year one of the Capital Improvements Program is the basis for the recommended current year capital portion of the annual operating budget. The Program and the operating budget rarely are the same, as priorities change, and projects must be accelerated. Examples of priorities shifting include situations such as, additional funding offered from outside sources, advanced or slowed project schedules, and unanticipated or extraordinary events. The total amount of the recommended capital improvements budget for any particular year cannot exceed the financial resources available for capital projects from the City's projected cash flow for that year. The following page lists the capital projects approved for the FY 2006-07 Capital Improvements Program (July 1, 2006 - June 30, 2007).

COMMUNITY AND NEIGHBORHOOD SERVICES

• ADA Curb Cut Program

This is an ongoing program that supports the installation of curb cuts to improve sidewalk accessibility throughout the City. A committee of citizens with disabilities and City staff prioritize those locations where curb cuts should be installed.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price

Funding Source: Local FY 2008 = \$250,000 FY 2009 = \$350,000 FY 2010 = \$350,000 FY 2011 = \$350,000 FY 2012 = \$350,000 FY 2013 = \$350,000 Project Total = \$2,000,000

• Adair Greenway

Money for this project will support the extension of the existing greenway, which begins in Adair Park, to Old Broadway. Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods Funding Source: Local FY 2010 = \$250,000 Project Total = \$250,000

• Alley Paving

This program will pave existing alleys which currently have a soil or stone surface. Priority will be given to neighborhood alleys where Infill Housing Overlay Zones and Redevelopment Areas have been adopted (such as Lonsdale, Oakwood Lincoln Park and Five Points). In these neighborhoods, driveway access is required to be from the alley rather than the street Administrative Goal: Stronger and safer neighborhoods Funding Source: Local FY 2008 = \$200,000 FY 2009 = \$200,000 FY 2010 = \$200,000 FY 2012 = \$200,000 FY 2013 = \$200,000 FY 2013 = \$200,000 Project Total = \$1,200,000

Ball Field, Tennis Court and Playground Improvement/Maintenance Funds for this project will be used to support the ongoing improvements and maintenance at the City's ball fields, tennis courts, and playgrounds.

This is an ongoing program that finances the City's match for the Federal and State Bridge Maintenance Program. Funds will be used for improvements as recommended by the Tennessee Department of Transportation.

• Capital Project Surveying Equipment

Funds for this project will allow the purchase of new surveying equipment, some of which is 18 years old. The upgrade will result in increased accuracy, efficiency and productivity from field crews and office staff.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price; an energized downtown - everybody's neighborhood; more and better jobs

Funding Source: Local **FY 2010 = \$45,000 Project Total = \$45,000**

• Central Avenue Pike/Merchants Drive Improvements

This project will include construction of a right-turn lane on southbound Central Avenue Pike and improve the radius at the southwest corner of the intersection. Funds will be used to match a federal grant.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price; more and better jobs

Funding Source: Local **FY 2008 = \$200,000 Project Total = \$200,000**

Citywide New Sidewalk Construction

Financial support for this program will allow new sidewalk construction in areas throughout the City to address safety issues and pedestrian needs and requests. Specific projects will be selected from a list prioritized by the Engineering Division. Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can

count on at a competitive price; more and better jobs **Funding Source:** Local **FY 2008 = \$400,000 FY 2010 = \$400,000 FY 2011 = \$400,000 FY 2012 = \$400,000 FY 2013 = \$400,000 FY 2013 = \$400,000 Project Total = \$2,400,000**

• Citywide Resurfacing Program

This is an ongoing program that annually funds the resurfacing of approximately 37 of the City's roughly 1,000 miles of public streets. The resurfacing of streets allows for the safe and efficient movement of traffic and easy access to private developments. Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price

Funding Source: Local FY 2008 = \$4,600,000 FY 2009 = \$4,900,000 FY 2010 = \$4,900,000 FY 2011 = \$4,900,000 FY 2012 = \$4,900,000 FY 2013 = \$4,900,000 Project Total = \$29,100,000

• Citywide Roadway Safety Program

This new annual program will allow the construction of minor roadway improvements, such as site distance upgrades, radius improvements, turn lanes, cul-de-sacs, guard rail installation, and new shoulders, based on Engineering Division priorities.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price; more and better jobs

Funding Source: Local FY 2009 = \$275,000 FY 2010 = \$275,000 FY 2011 = \$275,000 FY 2012 = \$275,000 FY 2013 = \$275,000 Project Total = \$1,375,000

• Citywide Traffic Calming Program

Program funds will support the design, education and engineering for traffic calming proposals in several neighborhoods. Exact needs will depend on neighborhood agreement to implement a traffic calming plan.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price

Funding Source: Local FY 2008 = \$100,000 FY 2009 = \$200,000 FY 2010 = \$200,000 FY 2011 = \$200,000 FY 2012 = \$200,000 FY 2013 = \$20,000 Project Total = \$1,100,000

• Cross Park Drive Drainage, Phase II

This project will complete the installation of a stormwater system along Cross Park Drive beginning at Park Village Road and continuing to Cross Creek Road. This improvement will help to alleviate the continuing problem caused by periodic flooding of this roadway.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price; more and better jobs

Funding Source: Local **FY 2008 = \$200,000 Project Total = \$200,000**

Crosswalk Safety Program

Funds for this project will support the equipment and materials necessary to install new crosswalks and/or signage at high priority locations. This will lead to the improvement of pedestrian and bicycle mobility throughout the City. Administrative Goal: Stronger and safer neighborhoods Funding Source: Local FY 2008 = \$100,000 FY 2009 = \$80,000 FY 2010 = \$80,000 FY 2011 = \$80,000 FY 2012 = \$80,000 FY 2013 = \$80,000 Project Total = \$500,000

• Dog Park

This project will result in the establishment of the City's second designated area for dogs to run freely and play off-leash. Funds will pay for fencing, signage, benches, water fountains, and preparing the ground in the designated area **Administrative Goal:** Stronger and safer neighborhoods **Funding Source:** Local **FY 2009 = \$65,000 Project Total = \$65,000**

• Downtown Transit Center

Project funds will support continued design, planning and construction of the proposed Downtown Transit Center, which will replace the existing on-street transfer point on Main Street.

Administrative Goal: An energized downtown - everybody's neighborhood Funding Sources: Local FY 2008 = \$500,000 Project Total = \$500,000

• First Creek Improvements: Phase II - Lower End

This project will help to address the problem of flooding along First Creek. Included will be the replacement of the bridge over First Creek at Emoriland Boulevard, the installation of a new bridge/culvert under Emoriland Boulevard, and widening of the First Creek channel, primarily between Chickamauga Avenue and Emoriland Boulevard.

Administrative Goal: Stronger and safer neighborhoods

Funding Source: Local **FY 2008 =** \$1,200,000 **FY 2009 =** \$1,250,000 Project Total = \$2,450,000

• First Creek Master Plan

Funds for this project will support the hiring of a consultant to enhance and improve a Stormwater Master Plan and Model for the First Creek Watershed. Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can

count on at a competitive price **Funding Source:** Local **FY 2009 =** \$150,000 **FY 2010 =** \$150,000 **Project Total = \$300,000**

• Fort Kid Playground

This project will involve renovation of this much used playground, which was built with private funds. Among other things, a rubberized under-surface is being considered to improve wheelchair accessibility.

Administrative Goal: Stronger and safer neighborhoods Funding Source: Local FY 2008 = \$150,000 Project Total = \$150,000

• Fourth & Gill Park Improvements

Funds for this project will support needed improvements to this neighborhood park, which will be affected by TDOT's SmartFix 40 project. Possible improvements would include new play equipment, a new picnic shelter, benches, tables and lighting.

Administrative Goal: Stronger and safer neighborhoods Funding Source: Local FY 2008 = \$75,000 Project Total = \$75,000

• Gay Street Intersection Repair

This project would replace concrete/brick intersections at Gay Street and Church Avenue and Gay Street and Clinch Avenue with all concrete material. Work will also include a crosswalk on Summit Hill Drive at the Crown Plaza Hotel. Administrative Goal: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price; more and better jobs **Funding Source:** Local **FY 2010 = \$250,000 Project Total = \$250,000**

• Gay Street Lighting Improvements

Funds for this project will allow the replacement of older light pole and fixtures along Gay Street, between Hill Avenue and Church Avenue. The new fixtures will be similar to those along the Gay Street Bridge.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; an energized downtown - everybody's neighborhood

Funding Source: Local **FY 2008 = \$300,000 Project Total = \$300,000**

• Gay Street Sidewalk - 100 Block

This request will fund the design of streetscape improvements for S. Gay Street from Summit Hill Drive to Jackson Avenue. The project design would include the complete reconstruction of the street and adjoining sidewalks along with other amenities, similar to Gay Street, south of Summit Hill This design project would include the alley directly east and adjacent to Gay Street (commonly referred to as Fire Street).

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price; an energized downtown - everybody's neighborhood; more and better jobs

Funding Source: Local FY 2008 = \$1,000,000 FY 2009 = \$1,000,000 Project Total = \$2,000,000

• Golf Course Improvements

This project will fund improvements to the City's two municipal golf courses, Knoxville Municipal and Whittle Springs. Possible improvements include paving parking lots, replacing irrigation systems, redoing cart paths, rebuilding greens, and improving the clubhouses.

Administrative Goal: Stronger and safer neighborhoods

Funding Source: Local **FY 2008 =** \$100,000 **Project Total = \$100,000**

• Greenway Improvements

This budget request will support the annual repaying of a minimum of one mile of the City's greenways.

Administrative Goal: Stronger and safer neighborhoods Funding Source: Local FY 2009 = \$50,000 FY 2010 = \$50,000 FY 2012 = \$50,000 FY 2012 = \$50,000 FY 2013 = \$50,000 Project Total = \$250,000

• I-275 Business Park Improvements

This project will improve access to the I-275 Business Park through improvements to adjacent roadways to foster development on the property.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price; more and better jobs

Funding Source: Local FY 2008 = \$248,000 FY 2009 = \$248,000 FY 2010 = \$248,000 FY 2011 = \$248,000 Project Total = \$992,000

• I-40/Pellissippi Parkway Interchange Lighting

The installation of lights at the I-40/Pellissippi Parkway interchange will be funded through this project. Included will be 17 high mast lights and 56 individual lights. Administrative Goal: More and better jobs

Funding Source: Local FY 2010 = \$450,000 FY 2011 = \$450,000 Project Total = \$900,000

• Jackson Avenue Ramps Replacement

This project will involve the replacement of the Jackson Avenue ramps at Gay Street. Funds will be part of the City's match under the Federal Bridge Replacement Program.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price; an energized downtown - everybody's neighborhood; more and better jobs

Funding Source: Local FY 2008 = \$100,000 Project Total = \$100,000

• Jim Sterchi Road Improvements

A design contract with a consultant will be supported by this project, which will include roadway improvements to Jim Sterchi Road between Dry Gap Pike and the city limits.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price; more and better jobs

Funding Source: Local FY 2010 = \$300,000 Project Total = \$300,000

• Knox-Blount Greenway

This project will involve the construction of a pedestrian pathway from TDOT's soon to be constructed Buck Karnes pedestrian bridge, following the south bank of the Tennessee River and portions of Alcoa Highway to the Knox County - Blount County line. The project will be done in two phases.

Administrative Goals: Stronger and safer neighborhoods; city services you can count on at a competitive price; more and better jobs

Funding Sources: Local FY 2008 = \$290,400 Project Total = \$290,400

• Lower Second Creek Site Improvements

Funds for this project will allow the completion of improvements to the greenway connection along Lower Second Creek, between the Convention center and development along the Tennessee River.

Administrative Goal: Stronger and safer neighborhoods Funding Source: Local FY 2009 = \$400,000 FY 2010 = \$400,000 Project Total = \$800,000

Neighborhood Drainage Improvement Program
