RECOMMEND that County Commission APPROVE the street name 'Jones Creek Way.'


The proposed street name is not a duplication and meets all requirements of the Knox County Street Naming and Addressing Ordinance.

COMMENTS:

This private joint permanent easement has about 10 feet of pavement width. All adjacent property owners have been mailed a letter with the proposed street name and as of the date of this report, staff has received nc objections to the proposed name for the easement. The naming of this easement will make it easier for emergency services personnel and anyone else to locate the properties accessed from this now unnamed easement, increasing public safety. It will also allow for all dwellings accessed through this easement to be assigned addresses using the same street name. There was one citizen who asked for postponement at MPC's November 8 meeting who may be opposed to this request.


If approved, this item will be forwarded to Knox County Commission for action on 1/17/2013. If denied, MPC's action is final, unless the action to deny is appealed to Knox County Commission. The date of the appeal hearing will depend on when the appeal application is filed. Appellants have 30 days to appeal an MPC decision in the County.



The MPC Addressing staff reviewed the matter and discovered that no address can be assigned until the easement is named. The *Knox County Street Naming and Addressing Ordinance* states that when an easement serves fewer than six dwelling units or lots and there are no available numbers, the easement must be named.

Enclosed is a form with three suggested names for your easement that meet addressing requirements. Please select one of the names or propose a different name of your choosing (see form for instructions). The name selected by a majority of property owners will be the chosen name. Any addresses currently assigned off this easement will be changed to reflect the new name.

The street name change will be heard by the Metropolitan Planning Commission at its monthly public meeting, within two or three months. Prior to the meeting, you will be notified of the MPC meeting date, time, and location, and you will receive a canvass form to sign, registering your vote for or against the new street name. You also may appear at the MPC meeting to voice your opinion on the matter.

Please return the enclosed Suggested Street Names form by Friday, June 15, 2012 to register your preferred street name.
