I am forwarding you this e-mail I sent to Ms. Brooks related to the past due diligence in determining what use in the Knox County zoning ordinance would be appropriate for a residential adolescent treatment facility and which zones would accommodate that use. This was done before the owners asked to rezone the Wise Springs Road Property to PR, but the PR was specifically choses because it was Executive Director Green's and Knox County's interpretation that "Boarding Home for Sheltered Care" was the most accurate use definition and that the PR zone would be the most appropriate zone for this use. Those e-mails are attached hereto. Following the subsequent confusion regarding the "Assisted Care Living Facility" I sent this e-mail to Ms. Brooks, Mr. Elliot, and the Knox County Law Director's office. Subsequently, Mr. Elliott opined that they would honor the past interpretation of Knox County. I followed up with Mr. Elliott with a phone call and the following e-mail exchange (See below)

I hope this clarifies the use issue, but I will be glad to discuss this further this afternoon.

Steve,

Thank you for your e-mail and interpretation. I wanted to follow-up on this and a couple of matters we talked about on Tuesday.

As I understood our conversation, as the Boarding Home for Sheltered Care is not specifically called for in any zone, the most appropriate zone for the Boarding Home for Sheltered Care would be the PR zone because of the flexibility of that zone and other similar uses listed in the PR zone. We also discussed that our would also be allowed prior A zone, but each dwelling unit would need to be separately permitted on one-acre lots. By rezoning to PR it allows the flexibility and creativity to cluster the developments on a central campus and concentrate the intensity of the development and maximize security. If I misunderstand our conversation then I apologize. I do agree with you that 5.13.02.G is also applicable here with regard to the Planning commission's authority. Although I don't think we specifically talked about it, I would add that to the extent our development includes commercial, recreational and educational units, which are not already contemplated in the "Boarding Home for Sheltered Care" definition, then those are already permitted uses in the PR (5.13.02.C., 5.13.02.D., and 5.13.02.E. respectively).

I agree with your required condition that each dwelling unit be limited to 12 of fewer people. That was the reasoning behind our duplex-style cottage where each cottage is 2 dwelling units with 9 residents per unit.

I appreciate everyone's efforts in working through these issues. We are working hard on presenting a development plan that meets the intent of the ordinance and is compatible with the community.

Amy,

Sure. I had multiple meetings with Gerald regarding the property, but there were two meeting with Knox County prior to seeking the PR zoning to accommodate this property. I first brainstormed with Gerald Green in the spring of 2019 about this potential use. I had first reached out to Sean Payne on July 18, 2019. (E-mail Attached) about my conversations with Gerald about potential uses and how this did not appear to fit squarely into any definition in the County Code. We were ultimately able to meet on July 29, 2019 with Mr. Payne, Mr. Lemons, Mr. Nations, and Deputy Law Director Daniel Sanders. At that meeting they determined that the closest use would be "Boarding Home for Sheltered Care". The other option was that it was Codes' opinion at that time that the authority to determine the uses allowed in a PR zone falls exclusively with the Planning Commission and would seem to be appropriate under 5.13.02.A.3 (Multi-dwelling structures and developments); 5.13.02.C (Commercial Uses); 5.13.02.D (Recreation uses) 5.13.02.E (Education uses) and 5.13.02.G (Other uses, deemed compatible with the proposed development by the planning commission).

Following that meeting, I e-mailed Mr. Green about the appropriateness of rezoning the property to PR based upon the comments of codes that the PR zone would be an appropriate zone. (e-mail attached). Mr. Green responded on August 20 that "I have spoken to staff and we agree that the use is appropriate in the PR zone. Some differences of opinion regarding the rezoning of the property to PR ..." (Copy attached). Mr. Green and I spoke about the appropriateness of the PR zone for the property (not the use issue which we thought had been determined above) and his initial impression that the PR zone may not be appropriate due to the AG sector plan. Following that conversation, On August 23, 2019, I sent the e-mail (attached) with my rebuttal regarding the concerns about the appropriateness of the PR zoning for this property.

Due to the initial resistance to rezone the property to PR we explored other properties that either had PR already attached or that could be rezoned PR. Ultimately we came back to this property with the idea that we would not need a density of greater than 1 du/ac; therefore, there would not need to be any sector plan amendment to rezone this property in the AG sector plan.

At that time, prior to filing our application for rezoning, I reached back our to Mr. Payne and Mr. Nations to review our use again to confirm its appropriateness in the PR zone. (e-mail attached). At that time, we were focused on the definition of dwelling unit, and the limitation of "not more than twelve (12) persons unrelated to the proprietor" in the definition for Boarding Home for Sheltered Care. As a result of this e-mail, I met again with Mr. Payne, Mr. Nations, Mr. Green, and Kathy Saunders and Travis Evans with the Knox County Fire Marshal's office on December 4, 2019. It was during that meeting that we determined the duplex would work as a dwelling unit so long as there was a physical separation between the units and it was less than 12 individuals on each half of the duplex. (Hence our cottage plans as a duplex with a medial separation for staff). With this direction, we filed our PR zoning application on January 3, 2020 for the February 13, 2020 Planning Commission meeting. On the Application I listed "Potential Boarding Home" as a proposed use of the property. https://agenda.knoxmpc.org/packages/2-H-20-RZ_pkg.pdf. The use question was specifically addressed by the Planning Commission at its February 13, 2020 meeting. At that time, Ms. Albertson, Mr. Green and I discussed the potential use definition as Boarding Home for Sheltered Care consistent with Group Day Care Home. See: (https://vimeo.com/395447496 at the 57 minute mark). This item passed County Commission unanimously with Commissioner Beeler, of the 8th District, making the motion to approve.

Prior to filing for our Use on Review, I reached out the Mr. Elliot via e-mail in hopes to have an informal plans review session and identify any issues. In my initial email to Mr. Elliott, dated April 29, 2020, I recounted the previous conversations we had with Knox County. "Acadia is going to be looking at a use on review for an adolescent residential treatment facility for this property which was recently rezoned. We had previously had a similar conversation about this use of the property being allowed as a "boarding home" or a "group home" in the PR zone with Sean Payne, Dennis Nations, Gerald Green, and the county Fire Marshal prior to the owners seeking a rezoning. Now that the rezoning has passed County Commission we want to come back with a more detailed plan to discuss prior to asking for a use on review.

It was only recently, when Ms. Portier sent me an e-mail from Kevin Murphy, that I learned that it was being considered as an Assisted Living Facility. While I think the "Boarding Home for Sheltered Care" definition also fits, this determination is acceptable to us as I think its fair to apply 5.13.01(G) to either application finding the

We worked hard, for well over a year, trying to identify the appropriate definition for our use and the corresponding zone which to accommodate that use. It was only after multiple levels of consultation did we move forward with a contract on the property and the rezoning. Even at that time, the "Potential Boarding Home" was identified on the application and the definition discussed at the Planning Commission level. Please confirm that the use is not an issue at this stage, only the review of the applicable use on review standards.

Thank you again for speaking with me. I greatly appreciate discussing the differences in the micro-analysis of the particular lot versus the macro-analysis of the community as a whole. To that end, I wanted to follow-up and note that although the sector plan is a sea of AG (as depicted in the attached) looking at the surrounding rezoning (also attached), there are several islands of PR zoning in this area which, at least from my perspective, would indicate that the PR zone is not out of character with the community. As late as 2005 it was both Planning Commission's and County Commission's opinion that a PR zone is acceptable in this sector plan without a sector plan amendment. Maybe things have changed since then but just looking at these facts seem to make a compelling case to support a rezoning of the property.

My clients are still mulling over whether or not they will proceed with a contract on the property, and the requested rezoning. I will let you know what their decision Thank you again and have a great weekend.

Gerald,

Mr. Trivett, Mr. McCoy and I met with Sean Payne, Dennis Nations, Max Lemons, and Daniel Sanders with the County regarding our potential acquisition of property for a residential treatment facility for adolescents (ages 13 to 17). By way of brief reminder, the facility will provide individual and family therapy, activity therapy, education, and assistance with activities of daily living. The concept is to have cottage-style residences for approximately 16-18 adolescents and their staff. We anticipated serving approximately 145 adolescents and a total staff of approximately 200. We would be licensed by the state but, unlike a hospital or acute care facility, we would not need to obtain a Certificate of Need.

Meeting with Mr. Payne and the County this morning, he believed the closest comparable use in the County would be a "Boarding Home for sheltered care" which is defined as "a profit or nonprofit boarding home, rest home or other home licensed by the appropriate governmental agency which in addition to providing food and shelter to three (3) but not more than twelve (12) persons unrelated to the proprietor, also provides any personal care or service beyond food, shelter, and laundry. Such services may include: (1) supervision and assistance in dressing, bathing and maintenance of good physical hygiene; (2) care in emergencies of in temporary illness, usually for periods of one (1) week or less; (3) supervision in the taking of medications; and (4) other services conducive to the resident's welfare." This use is allowed in the current Agricultural zoning as a "use on review." The largest issue with applying this definition to our use is the limitation of 3 to 12 individuals. This is over-restrictive in the use. He, and County Law, were uncertain if this could be varied by the planning commission on a use on review or would need to be a variance granted by the County Board of Zoning Appeals.

Another option was raised in our meeting, and that is the appropriateness of this use in a PR zone. Mr. Payne was of the opinion that the authority to determine uses in a PR zone falls exclusively to the Planning Commission and if they approved the use for a parcel zoned PR, then his review would be cursory as to set backs, etc. and not the underlying use. I believe this is appropriate in a PR zone under5.13.02.A.3 (Multi-dwelling structures and developments); 5.13.02.C (Commercial Uses); 5.13.02.D (Recreation uses) 5.13.02.E (Education uses) and 5.13.02.G (Other uses, deemed compatible with the proposed development by the planning commission).

Finally, if either of the two options outlined above have issues the planning department could not support, then the Law Department suggested a text amendment to the zoning to create an accommodated use to be included in the A zone as a use on review.

I believe that our preference would be to explore this use working within the confines of the PR zone. Consequently, I have the following questions for consideration:

1. If we were to apply for rezoning of 4937 Wise Springs Road from A to PR, could planning staff support such a rezoning?

- 2. Assuming a rezoning of PR, and we later applied for a use-on-review for our adolescent treatment facility, would planning staff support a determination that this use would be appropriate under the PR zone (possible pursuant to 5.13.02.A.3, 5.13.02.C, 5.03.02E., and possibly 5.13.02.G)?
- 3. If we were to submit for a use-on-review for a boarding home under the A zone, could the planning commission grant a variance for the limitation of individuals serviced from 3 to 12 to 16-18 per cottage as contemplated?
- 4. Assuming none of these first three options, would the planning staff support a text amendment to boarding home removing the limitation of individuals from 3 to 12 total to be based on something that could accommodate our desired use (such as up to 16-18 individuals boarded per cottage and up to 3.5 cottages per acre)?

Of course we would welcome a time to meet with you or any of your staff again in light of the information I summarized above. My clients will be in town the 2nd week of August for the rezoning for their acute care facility if you had time that week. Otherwise, when would be good to meet again?

Dear Commissioners,

Mr. Mullins submitted a letter summarizing the background of community discussions and the desires and commitments of the applicant.

If you should decide that approval is appropriate, I urge you to add the following additional conditions to the approval of the development plan. Most of these were commitments made in Mr. Mullins letter, but unless they are added in conditions, they are not enforceable.

- 8. Ensuring that site lighting is full-cutoff lighting, adequately shielded, and designed so that no more than 0.1 horizontal and vertical footcandles (1.0 horizontal or vertical lux) of illumination extend 10 feet beyond the property line.
- 9. The applicant applies for the Knox County Adopt-A-Road program for Wise Springs Road
- 10. Installation of a ten (10) foot high wooden privacy fence along the entire exterior perimeter of the property, and fenced access control for driveway
- 11. Preservation of existing vegetation along the proposed exterior perimeter fencing for a depth of at least 10 feet, and preservation of existing old-growth cedar trees adjacent to parcels 040134, 04013601, 040136, 041137, 04113701, 04113702, 140173
- 12. Establishing a communications plan that will inform neighbors of adverse events with phone calls and text messages, and providing the neighbors contact information to facility administrators
- 13. Establishing a Community Advisory Committee to ensure regular communication and address any issues that may come up.

Dear Director Brooks and Director Elliott,

I listened to the Agenda Review meeting and have read the case file for 8-C-20-UR. I am now concerned that this is not properly in front of the Planning Commission.

- 1. "Boarding home for sheltered care" is defined in the Definitions section of the County Zoning Ordinance, but is not used anywhere in the zoning ordinance.
 - 1. If a "boarding home for sheltered care" is similar to a "boarding house", then "boarding house" is specified as a Use permitted on Review in several zones in the ordinance - Ag, CA, and CB. It is not listed as a Permitted Use or Uses Permitted on Review in the Planned Residential zone.
- 2. I understand that the prior Planning Director and county Development Director determined that a "boarding home for sheltered care" would be a use allowed in the Planned Residential Zone.
 - 1. Was this determined to be a "Permitted use" under section 5.13.02, or a "Uses permitted on review" under section 5.13.03?
 - 2. The documents and correspondence that determined this must be part of the case file. The determination and reasoning was made out of the public view, and is still out of the public view. Transparency and consistency in our planning and administrative processes is not present.
- 3. There is no Development Plan in front of the Planning Commission; the only item on the Agenda and in the Case File is a Use on Review application. Zoning Ordinance 5.13.15.B requires a "written application for review and approval of the development plan has been filed with the planning commission", which I believe we are used to calling a "Concept Plan".

By determining that this is a "Boarding home for sheltered care", which is not listed as a Use in any of the zoning districts, and then allowing that Use in the Planned Residential Zone, administrative interpretation has overreached into legislative responsibility for the zoning ordinance. This interpretation sets precedent that staff could place a "boarding home for sheltered care" in any zoning district.

I would support interpreting this proposed use as a "Recovery Housing", which is allowed in Transition and OB zones, and is governed under more stringent Use on Review Approval Standards in section 4.105. The way to correct this would be to acknowledge a mistake in the previous interpretation, have staff initiate a rezoning to the T zone at no cost to the applicant. This dots all the i's and crosses the t's.

Consistency in applying the zoning ordinance is critical to public faith in the process. The core principal of Knox County Planning Advocates is for easily understood rules and the consistent application of those rules. I urge you to reconsider how this item is in front of the Planning Commission.

Planning Commission,

My name is Meghann Howard. I live at 4921 Wise Springs Rd. I am emailing in opposition to the Juvenile Residential Treatment Facility at 4937 Wise Springs Rd.

We are at the "11th hour", and once again the community is trying to wrap their mind around the **new** category and definition of Boarding Home for Sheltered Care. Has planning Staff contacted and received a statement from the Knox County Sheriff with any concerns, or lack of concerns?

The nearby firing range is still, and always will be a major concern for anyone suffering from mental illness. Mrs. King has attached a powerful study in her power point submitted to the commission. Has planning staff spoken with any behavioral specialists with Acadia that have physically been out to the grounds to evaluate this disturbance; about their concerns or lack there of?

From my understanding of watching the Agenda Review, previous Staff categorized this Juvenile Residential Treatment Facility as Assisted Living. It is clear that they never fit that definition and current staff has recategorized this facility as Boarding Home for Sheltered Care. The community had a Holiday weekend to try to shift their mindset and understand how this definition applies. No one on the Review 9/8/2020 touched on the length of stay at a Boarding Home (up to but usually no more than one week) and the intended 3-4 month stay that Acadia has planned for their patients. It appears it has been very difficult to line up a good fit for this facility. That alone speaks volumes to the incompatibility to this neighborhood and county. How does a square peg fit in a round hole? How will this impact the future development? Will future residential development be appropriate, or will this type of facility strangle the area and negatively impact nearby property owners? The community didn't want the Detention Center and we have had to bear that burden; does this community become the dumping ground for all treatment and reform centers in the county?

It was said that the Applicant did not want a full perimeter fence as it would be too "institutionalized". You cannot use the Detention Center as a scapegoat of compatibility, but refuse to be compared or held to some standard of safety. In regards to safety and conditions, the community brought up a need for multiple conditions on August 21st. Proposed conditions were not available by the published Agenda or Agenda review meeting 9/8/2020. I am willing to try to

understand the allowances of certain uses under the PR zone, but I do not agree that <u>this</u> project matches the intent of a PR zone.

Commissioners:

This matter was last heard by the Commission on August 13, 2020. At that time, the Commission voted to postpone consideration of this Use-on-Review to provide the applicant and the neighbors a chance to meet and discuss the issues related to this application to make sure everyone had a chance to discuss the issues surrounding the development and to see where, if any, there was any common ground. A few minutes after the Planning Commission meeting, I reached out to Chase McSpadden, Kathy King, and Meghan Howard to schedule a second community meeting. Ultimately we agreed to conduct a meeting via ZOOM with many of the interested neighbors. That meeting took place on Friday, August 21 at 7:00p.m. Representatives for Acadia Health Care were myself and Adam Hendrickson (Crunk Engineering). Representing the neighborhood was Meghan Howard, Chase McSpadden, David Leon, Kevin Murphy and Lisa Starbuck. The meeting lasted for approximately an hour and issues related to security, fencing, lighting, proximity to the firing range, and neighborhood communication were discussed at length. As a direct result of this conversation, Acadia is committed to making changes to its plans to address these concerns. Those changes, which can be made a condition to Use-on-Review approval, will be specifically noted in this letter.

Mr. Leone had hoped to ask more specific operational questions about how Acadia and the Wise Springs Road facility is organized and governed. Mr. Leon e-mailed me a specific list of detailed topics and questions he would like to discuss, and on Thursday, September 3 at 7:00p.m. we conducted a follow-up call with Mr. Leone. Representing Acadia on that call was

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Mr. McCoy and Mr. Bill Mason (Acadia's Division CEO). Although the meeting was open to any neighbor that wanted to participate, only Mr. Leon spoke with us on that occasion. The meeting lasted a little over an hour and we addressed Mr. Leone's questions point by point. From this conversation, and at Mr. Leone's suggestion, Acadia is committed to setting up a Community Advisory Committee to meet regularly with the facilities CEO and Chief Nursing Officer to discuss issues that affect the community as it relates to the facility, to address any concerns within the facility or the community, and to maintain an open dialogue in the neighborhood moving forward. We have asked that Mr. Leone help organize this committee from the neighborhood's end.

I have also had multiple e-mails with neighbors following up on all the issues they have raised and openly solicited additional meetings or conversations during the past month. I have had specific conversations with Mr. Murphy and Ms. Julia Gibson; however, there was no interest with the remaining neighbors for a subsequent community meeting with Acadia. We remain interested in continuing conversations on how we can address any ongoing neighborhood concerns.

Having made good faith efforts to address concerns raised by many of the neighbors, I wanted to address some common themes and concerns in their comments and communications and briefly outline how we are addressing them and how we comply with the requirement for Use on Review.

Location and Allowed Use in Zone:

Last month, there was some confusion about what use best encapsulates the proposed Residential Treatment Faculty and current codes initially reviewed our use-on-review application as an "Assisted Living Facility." Subsequent to the last meeting, I reproduced all of the e-mails I had with the former Executive Director of the Planning Department, Gerald Green, the former heads of County Codes (Sean Payne and Dennis Nations), the County Law Department and the Knox County Fire Codes. After reviewing all the potential use definitions in the Knox County Code and all the potential zones, it was the interpretation that the use would meet the definition of Boarding Home for Sheltered Care, (with the 12 person duplex concept). As Boarding Home for Sheltered Care is not a use called for in any current County zone, Codes opined and interpreted its use would be allowed under the AG and PR zone (which allows Group Day Care Homes) however, the PR zone would allow us the flexibility to cluster the dwelling units as opposed to each of them being located on individual one-acre lots. This use was specifically discussed before the Planning Commission on February 13, 2020 when the underlying property was zoned to PR at 1 du/ac. Mr. Green and Ms. Albertson specifically read the definition for Boarding Home for Sheltered Care and its allowance as a use allowed in the PR zone. Present at that meeting were neighbors Mr. and Mrs. McSpadden, Kathy King, Meghan Howard, and Bert Farmer. This use of the property as a "Residential Boarding Home" was also referenced when the County Commission unanimously approved the PR zoning at its April 27, 2020, County

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Commission meeting. As Mr. Elliot and Ms. Portier discussed at Tuesday's Agenda Review, they need to honor this interpretation as to withdraw it at this stage would be unfair and potentially arbitrary and capricious. Also, as Commissioner Korbelick pointed out, this was a use interpretation that was communicated to the public as early as February 13, 2020. The 30 days provided by code to appeal a use interpretation to the Board of Zoning Appeals has expired. Consequently, this use is allowed in the PR zone.

As stated by the staff report, the area is Low Density Residential and adjacent to the Knox County Detention facilities. This property is tailor-made for the intended use because of the low-density character of the neighbors and its proximity to the county facilities (limiting contact to residential neighborhoods to the north). It is very rare to find property in LDR areas that have the required acreage, topography, and access to public sewer. Moreover, the local zoning definitions do not change the more stringent and specific State and Federal licensing requirements for the facility. As such, the Use on Review plan, as proposed, exceeds the standards for a use on review because it will be required to meet the more stringent state and federal regulations and licensing requirements.

Joint Venture with Covenant Health:

Recently, Acadia and Covenant Health broke ground on a joint-venture for a new psychiatric in-patient hospital in the City of Knoxville. https://www.covenanthealth.com/east-tn-behavioral-hospital-groundbreaking/ Combined, the new psychiatric hospital and this residential adolescent treatment represent a commitment of more than \$75 million dollars into the community with increased jobs and access to state-of-the-art mental health care for all Knox County Citizens. These facilities are intended to provide distinct but complimentary services to the community. It is better for local patients to have local treatment facilities and Acadia urges approval to support the shared mission of both facilities.

Licensing and Security:

As I referenced last month, our facility as designed is regulated by the State Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities (https://publications.tnsosfiles.com/rules/0940/0940-05/0940-05-37.pdf) and, on a Federal level the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. It is also licensed through the Tennessee Department of Education and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). Our facility and program meets or exceeds the facility and security requirements of these state and federal organizations.

- All residents are vetted; admitted patients cannot have a history of significant or violent crimes or behavior, and no sex offenders.
- At the level of treatment we are offering, our licensing only requires 1 Behavioral Health Technician per 8 residents during waking hours. We are committed to providing 1 BHT per 4 residents during this timeframe. Our internal standards on

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staff to resident ratio are twice that which is required by state regulation. The BHT is only **one** type of staff member present for aiding supervision of the residents. There will be a full staff of licensed professionals with clinical training and experience at the facility. Representations by the neighbors to the contrary are false.

- The behavioral health associates are an extension of the therapy and nursing staff. The minimum educational requirements are a high school diploma, but Acadia attempts to recruit higher individuals with at least baccalaureate level education who have an interest in entering the behavioral health field. That is not always possible to fill every position with candidates that exceed the minimum standards, but it is aspired to.
- Generally, our hiring practices include posting in various channels for open positions where we specify the minimum requirements for any position. The candidate pool is then evaluated first on their application and resume. If they meet the threshold requirement they may be invited for an interview. If they have successfully completed the interview and an offer is made to them for employment then we have a series of background investigations that occur that includes a criminal background check. When a candidate for hire is identified, a Background/Drug test must be completed within 72 hours of the email being sent. Once all items are completed and approved, the applicant receives an email from with all the required onboarding documents. Background checks include:
 - SSN Trace
 - County Court Criminal Search (Past 7 Years Criminal)
 - Enhanced Nationwide Criminal Search (7 Years)
 - Federal Court Search (7 Years Criminal)
 - Locator Select
 - Drivers Record (MVR)
 - Education Verification
 - Employment History Verification (We need 5 years employment history, if not verified during BG, HR calls to verify)
 - Personal/Professional Reference (We need 3 personal references, if one of these is used to verify employment history they cannot be used for personal. Additionally, the applicant must have known at least one personal reference for a min. of 5 years)
 - Drug Screen
 - Fraud and Control Information System (FACIS) L3
 - Dept. of Justice Sex Offender Search
 - Death Master File Search

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HR additionally verifies:

- TBI Fingerprints
- OIG
- TN Abuse Registry
- NC Abuse Registry
- TN Sex Offender
- National Sex Offender
- Licensure if licensed position
- HR will verify employment and personal references if Sterling is unable to
- At the level of treatment we are offering, perimeter fencing is not required. We are providing a **14 ft fence** of the facilities and court yard. It was incorrectly noted that our internal proximity fence was only 10 feet. That is incorrect.
- At the level of treatment we are offering, locked doors are not required. Our doors are locked.
- The doors in the cottages are triple-locked—meaning that to access a secure area, there must be three triggers from an electronic key via the main entrance, a vestibule, and a hallway. Staff "Keycards" are required for ingress and egress into the facility and into doors to the cottages. These "keycards" are actually a personal bracelet, much like a Fitbit, which are attached to the staff's person. Staff may not inadvertently set down or misplace this device nor can it be easily stolen as the device would need to be physically removed from the staff member.
- The International Building Code and our Occupancy Use Classification allows all exit doors to be locked. In case of an emergency, such as a fire, all staff are trained to lead occupants out to areas of refuge in the secure patient courtyards.
- If residents are outside of the interior courtyard, cottages, or main complex, they will be supervised by at least one BIIT and additional qualified staff as required for the therapy session they are participating in. Also present on the facility will be therapists, teachers, psychiatrists, psychiatric nurse practitioners, registered nurses, and administrative staff. If a specific therapy is called for, such as equine therapy, there will be additional staff trained in that therapy method present in addition to the BHT. Finally, prior to being allowed outside the complex, they will have demonstrated progress in treatment to earn the additional privileges.
- Acadia recently began exploring for this location an innovative patient tracking system. The system is administered via Bluetooth and tamper resistant bracelets for the patients, tracking their location within defined parameters. Initial discussions very recently began upon feedback heard from neighbors.
- While there is no guarantee there will not be elopements (even the Knox County Detention Faculty cannot make that guarantee) our industry research tells us that the type of facility Wise Springs is designed as can expect substantial reductions in elopements from other types of facilities with less security.
- The Use on Review is conditioned on landscaping buffering along the property lines of any adjacent residences. At the neighbor's request, we will be able to retain

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existing vegetation along the proposed exterior perimeter fencing, including old-growth cedar trees and the existing fencing on the neighbor's property.

- The fencing we are proposing along the exterior perimeter (adjacent to the closest neighbor) will be a residential-style wooden privacy fence that is at least 10 feet tall. We are willing to condition approval of the use on review with regard to the fencing that we have proposed which will help shield and screen the closest neighbors from the use on the property and provide a deterrence for clopement in the areas that are the most populated.
- An updated illustration of the facility perimeter security plan, which illuminates our
 designed security within the courtyard areas of ingress and egress, is attached hereto
 as Exhibit 1.

Connection to the Community:

- Enhanced text notification if there were an adverse event on campus that has <u>any</u> potential impact to the neighbors. At the neighbor's request, the text system will be upgraded to include an immediate phone call to specific neighbors in case of an issue or if there's an elopement that could impact the community.
- Any event on our campus that has the potential to impact the community will be sent out in an immediate text alert and phone call with a recorded message to the neighbors.
- Neighbors will have direct phone numbers to the on-campus administrator for 24/7 access as well as the contact information for the CEO and other senior leadership.

Lighting:

Mr. Kevin Murphy requested we agree to minimum lighting standards to reduce light pollution beyond the property line. We will use fixtures with low glare ratings (cutoff below horizontal) and specific backlight control distributions to virtually eliminate light spill onto adjacent properties. As the grade for the campus and courtyard will be reduced by approximately 20 feet, and the lighting will be directed down, we do not anticipate that the lighting will detract from the immediate environment of the neighborhood. With the proposed site plan we can state that we can achieve 0.1 horizontal and vertical footcandles (1.0 horizontal or vertical lux) or less at 10 feet beyond the property line. As with the fencing, this is a standard we are committed to providing regardless of the use-on-review conditions; however, we have no objection to the Planning Commission making the lighting condition such that the light will not exceed 0.1 footcandles (1.0 horizontal or vertical lux) or less at 10 feet past the property lines.

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Unfair Comparisons to the Village treatment facility:

Acadia is the largest provider in the nation of Mental Health and Dependency treatment. It has over 600 facilities across the United States and in the U.K. We treat 25 million patients a year and approximately 70,000 patients a day. With that level of treatment there will be issues that arise, which the neighbors have documented, but Acadia has the highest level of Compliance by Joint Commission and Regulatory agencies. The vast majority of matters investigated are found to be either "Standard Level" (which is not a significant violation) or No Finding whatsoever. That is because any issues are addressed deliberately and decisively across the board. Positive and successful treatments and events are not what gets reported in the press.

With this in mind, we do not expect a repeat of the negative issues reported on the Village in Blount County because this facility is designed to improve upon the atmosphere and security for treatment in every conceivable way.

- Acadia does not own the Village campus. It is owned by Covenant Health. Acadia
 inherited the existing facility and operational layout and took over operations. The
 Wise Springs facility is designed not just as a replacement for the Village in
 Louisville, but as a state of the art "campus" facility for the treatment of adolescents.
 Taking experiences learned not only at the Village, but from across the nation to
 design a "Class A" facility.
- There are no fencing and no locks at the Village. Anyone can drive up or away from to the cabins. It is bisected by a residential community. It is not designed as a secure and self-contained campus. Rather, as stated in the February 16, 2019 Daily Times Article, "The fact is The Village is set up for a summer camp, not an inpatient facility." Conversely, the Wise Springs facility is a state-of-the art inpatient residential treatment facility built upon a foundation of knowledge acquired through years of experience and expertise in the industry.
- It is expected that some patients treated at the Village will be transferred to Wise Springs. They will be moved to a better facility with increased security and treatment options.

Property Values:


Although the neighbors may have sincere beliefs and speculations that their property values will be affected, there is no material evidence to support this assertion. Similar facilities in the County, such as Florence Crittenden (which operates an in-patient alcohol and drug-treatment facility off of Dick Lonas Road, is zoned residential and surrounded by subdivisions. A review of the tax assessments for those properties do not reveal a blighted or depressed neighborhood. Incidentally, Florence Crittenden does not have a perimeter fence. Another

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historical example is while Lakeshore was an inpatient psychiatric hospital, it was surrounded by some of the most valuable residential real estate in the County.



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Firing Range:

The neighbors expressed concern over the proximity of the Sheriff's training facilities and shooting range. Some neighbors described it as a "war zone" and that it would be detrimental to the therapeutic treatment of the residents. I confirmed with the Knox County Sheriff's office that their training and firing range is open for operation Monday through Friday between the hours of 9 am to 4 pm. They have both indoor and outdoor training and firing ranges. At times there can be periods of continuous firearms training, but it does not occur "all-day, every-day." During the past year and a half of due diligence, Acadia representatives have been on the property dozens of times surveying and planning operations on the property during the operational hours of the Sheriff's training facility. Only sporadic gunfire was noted. Regardless of the characterizations by the neighbors, this activity is not expected to have a detrimental impact on our modalities of therapy. During the operational hours of the Firing Range, the Wise Springs patients will be attending school in a 40,000 sq. foot building.

Additionally, Acadia's Chief Medical Officer has reviewed the concerns and opined that the reported activity will not in any way compromise the quality of care the youths in treatment will receive. See Dr. Michael Genovese's letter dated August 28, 2020 attached hereto as Exhibit 2. As explained by Dr. Genovese, the patients and the patient's family will be fully informed of the activities that occur at the training facility prior to admission. The program will be staffed with a multitude of highly experienced therapists specifically trained in working with youths who are suffering from mental, emotional, and behavioral health concerns. "Clinically speaking, the location of the facility will not impede the ability of those professional to deliver comprehensive care, nor will it negatively impact the patients' ability to thrive in the treatment process." Dr. Genovese's CV is attached hereto. Based on his education, training, and experience, he is qualified to provide an authoritative expert opinion on this issue.

Community Advisory Committee:

As stated above, Acadia welcomes this idea and is committed to setting this up as part of our operations. We believe this would be important to ensure regular communication with the neighborhood and the management of the facility and address any issues that may come up in our relationship with the community. It's an opportunity for Acadia to hear from neighbors regarding their experience has been and for Acadia to communicate what is occurring with the facility and the campus. And if there's a big issue then that's an opportunity for that group to get together and find a path towards a solution. Most importantly, it's an opportunity for us to share off and talk about it our successes, and it ensures that the dialogue with the community will continue beyond the Planning Commission approval of our Use-on-Review.

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Neighborhood Support:

Following the August 13 Planning Commission meeting, I personally received multiple e-mails from neighbors in the community who are in support of this facility at 4937 Wise

Springs Road. I have collected and attached the 11 e-mails and texts as Collective Exhibit 3 to this letter. Some of the support from other members in the community come from local high school teachers and parents of teenagers, former drug addicts, and ambulance drivers who provided front-line treatment to drug related emergencies and over-dose events. They describe an adolescent community that is onslaught with issues of substance abuse—in the same part of the County this facility seeks to locate. While these voices may not equal the number of voices in opposition, they need to be given equal force and effect. Regardless, the consideration of this proposal does not rise or fall on the support of the neighborhood, but on compliance with the specific standards for use on review. Although local governments and administrative agencies have broad discretion when it comes to decisions involving local land-use matters, that discretionary authority must be exercised within existing standards and guidelines. McCallen v. City of Memphis, 786 S.E. 2d 633, 639 (Tenn. 1990) (emphasis added). "When a legislative body included a certain use within a given zone as a use on review, such a use is intended in that zone." Wilson County Youth Shelter v. Wilson County, 13 S.W.3d 338, 342 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1999) perm. app. denied (2000). The Wilson court went on to hold: "[t]his means that an applicant for such use cannot obtain the necessary permit to proceed with its plans without going through the appeal process as outlined in the Zoning Ordinance; but once the applicant goes through the process and the requested use satisfies all other pertinent regulations of the local zoning regulations, it must be granted." Id. at 342 (emphasis added). "It is not the function of the board to conduct a referendum on public attitudes relative to [a] petition." Wilson County Youth Shelter v. Wilson County, 13 S.W.3d 342 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1999) (emphasis added). If the proposed use meets the applicable standards then it must be granted. Id.

Health Industry Support:

Acadia has received endorsements from the following agencies and health care professionals for its proposed facility on Wise Springs Road:

- Mental Health Association of East Tennessee (letter from Ben Harrington, CEO, attached);
- Healthy Mind Counseling (letter from Sarah Weddington, LCSW, attached);
- Dianna Westbrook, Licensed Professional Counselor, Mental Health Service Provider, Imago Relationship Therapist, Emotionally Focused Therapist (letter attached);
- Metro Drug Coalition (letter from Karen Pershing, Executive Director, attached)
- The Next Step Behavioral Health (letter from Ryan Peters, CEO, attached)

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- Cornerstone of Recovery (letter from Nichol Pfohl, Director of Business Development, attached)
- Cornerstone of Recovery (letter from Anne Burnett Young, Director of Residential Programs, attached)

These letters (attached hereto as <u>Collective Exhibit 4</u>) underscore both the need for the specific treatment modalities offered by Acadia, but also the overarching message that "the land will provide [Acadia] an opportunity to update their facilities, serve additional youth in need in a safe, supportive, therapeutic environment. This land could not go to better use in helping kids and their families who struggle getting their kids the help they need." MDC letter, August 25, 2020. These letter stand for the dual need for the services provided and to update facilities to provide better and safer care for children in need.

Conclusion:

The information provided by the applicant not only demonstrates that it is equal or exceeding the professional licensing and permitting requirements of the State and Federal agencies which provide oversight, it has provided more information than is normally required for a use on review. At the request of the Planning Commission we have worked with, and are committed to continuing to work with, the neighborhood to address their concerns. The plans set forward arc the product of several months of legal, medical, engineering, and architectural designs and have been adjusted as much as possible to assuage ongoing concerns and speculations of fear. While the objecting neighbors are sincere in their belief, they are only able to present a series of worst-case scenarios based on experiences of inferior and outdated facilities. The use is allowed in the PR zone (which was changed to accommodate the interpretation of Knox County) and there is a similar, and substantially more intense, facility in the area so there is not material evidence to suggest the development is incompatible with the surrounding area (which is a mix of LDR, agricultural, and institutional uses). If denied, there must be a material reason for the denial, articulated on the record, so that it can be corrected upon future application. Stating the use is not compatible is not sufficient in this instance. As our use meets the applicable standards, as opined by Planning Staff, it must be granted.

The applicant respectfully requests this matter be approved consistent with Staff's recommendation and the interpretation of Knox County Codes and that it be approved consistent with Staff's recommendation and the additional conditions we agree to abide by as a result of our working with the community on this matter. I look forward to speaking with you more during the upcoming Commission meeting.

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



To Whom It May Concern:

I would like to take a moment to address the concerns regarding the site of the new child and adolescent treatment program. Please know that these concerns are heard and understood, but we want to assure you that the placement of this facility will not in any way compromise the quality of care the youths in treatment will receive.

Upon admission to the program, patients and their families will be made fully aware of the presence of the police training center and what that entails. At that time, they will have the opportunity to request additional details or to ask any questions they may have. The staff will be forthcoming with all information so that there is no room left for concern.

We have done our due diligence and confirmed with the sheriff's department the time frame in which law enforcement professionals are engaged in training. During the identified time period, the youths in the program will primarily be in school, which will be housed in a 40,000-square-foot building that will deflect the sounds that may come from the training center.

The child and adolescent treatment program will employ a multitude of highly experienced therapists who are trained in working with youths who are suffering from mental, emotional, and behavioral health concerns. Clinically speaking, the location of the facility will not impede the ability of these professionals to deliver comprehensive care, nor will it negatively impact the patients' ability to thrive in the treatment process.

Opening a behavioral health treatment center in any neighborhood elicits its own set of challenges. Yet, it is imperative that we recognize the importance of making sure that access to quality mental health and addiction treatment is readily available. The new child and adolescent treatment program will offer exemplary care through the utilization of numerous specialized therapeutic approaches, providing families with the treatment their children need in an ideal setting within their own community.

I was given this email and asked to send my thoughts in a center in the Corryton/Gibbs area that seeks to help mental illness and drug addiction issues with teenagers. I think its a fantastic idea and support it fully.

I live in Gibbs, I grew up in Gibbs and I have children that attend all 3 schools. Many of my classmates from school had drug dependency issues and psychiatric issues. Many of my 15 year old daughter's classmates or their parents (who had issues as teens) struggle with mental health and drug dependency.

After graduating Gibbs High School in 2003, I began working on an ambulance. Before I retired for family reasons (my spouse died) I had to treat countless former classmates of mine or my husbands. In several instances, they were drug overdoses resulting in the deaths of my former peers. My father also worked on the ambulance, he and I often worked together. Many times during our employment, we transported my former classmates for various psychiatric and drug issues. Several times, we pronounced my former classmates dead. It was very hard for me to have to run those calls. I knew that some of these people had drug issues from the time we were kids. So did my father. One case in particular comes to mind, where myself and father had a former classmate. He overdosed on opiates and wasn't found in time. The fire engine company that came to help us, also had a former classmate of ours. My father cried because he knew I was friends with the deceased person, and he said he was sad for their family but thankful I chose not to follow in my friends' footsteps. The other classmate on the engine kept saying how sad he was but that it didn't suprise him in the least bit. That maybe, "if someone had gotten this person help when he was younger, things would be different."

For some reason the churches and many residents in the area are strongly opposed to the idea of a facility. However, those same people are some of the very same people these issues have impacted. The folks here seem to be in denial, like if you don't admit there's a problem, it won't keep happening. I can tell you with absolute certainty there IS a problem. 1/4 of my graduating class is dead from drug overdoses or suicide. 1/4 of my late husbands class of 2002 has also passed away from drug and psych issues. A child my daughter knew hung herself on Gibbs High School's property less than 2 years ago. THERE IS A PROBLEM AND OUR YOUTH NEED HELP!

Our youth need help! The proposed facility is in a good location to be able to help young teens and young adults. Hopefully it will pass and begin to put a stop to the issues facing our younger adults.

My 15 year old daughter also goes to Gibbs High. Her best friend's mother grew up with me. She is on methadone every day and she has a history of abusing all kinds of pills. If someone had reached her younger, my daughter's friend's mom may have a totally different life. So would my daughter's friend. History will likely repeat itself within that family if there isn't something done. Our area is in need of a facility that can help heal the youth's minds and help heal their habits.

You have my support for proceeding forward with plans. I look forward to seeing what the outcome of this facility is. I pray it gets approved.

On behalf of the millions of adolescents struggling with mental health and substance use disorders today, I am writing to respectfully show my support and recommendation for the proposal of Acadla Healthcare to build a new adolescent residential treatment facility in our local community.

I have been in the mental health field for 16 years and currently work in private practice providing mental health therapy in Knox County. I treat both adults and adolescents in my practice who are struggling with mental health disorders and substance abuse disorders. My background prior to private practice consisted of adult and adolescent residential work, crisis stabilization, outpatient services, detoxication unit and as a substance abuse therapist for the Department of Corrections. Often times I still recall how many inmates serving 10+ year sentences would verbalize how much they needed services as an adolescent and their life choices could have been vastly different. For this I am hopeful that every adolescent struggling can be provided the opportunity with services they need to potentially change their future. I have direct knowledge of the positive and rewarding impact that Village Behavioral Health has provided to our local community adolescents and surrounding areas with that same goal in mind.

The demand for adolescent services has never been more profound than it is in our current generation. 

There is a railroad track that crosses Wise Springs road a couple hundred feet past the entrance to the proposed facility. The RR crossing does not have lights or an arm that activates when a train comes by, which will be an additional hazard the additional traffic associated with the facility. This will have an impact on the current flow

There is also a school bus stop adjacent to the proposed entrance to the facility. Again, with the additional 500 plus daily traffic (I am sure much of which will be M-F), this will be an additional hazard to our children at the bus stop.

This email is regarding the Use of Review agenda item 8-C-20-UR.

I would like to take the time to identify some concerns regarding the Acadia Healthcare juvenile residential treatment facility proposed for the 4937 Wise Springs Rd location. This information was collected from a community meeting that Acadia held at Union Baptist Church on 8/10/2020.

1. **Patient well-being** – the attendees at this meeting identified that the selection of this location, was not selected with the patients care in mind. Rather the location was selected more for as an inexpensive financial opportunity. This location is susceptible to a large amount noise generated from the Law Enforcement firing range directly adjacent to the proposed property. Among the attendees at the meeting were certified medical personnel. They identified that the loud continuous noise which persist on a daily basis generated from the firing range, will more than likely hinder the treatment of the patients who have been diagnosed with the behavioral problems that Acadia has stated will receive treatment. It was also stated that the level of noise generated from the firing range is likely to cause more damage to the mental state of the expected patients.

- 2. **Location** the surrounding community is not in favor of this location. The adjacent property landowners have stated privacy and safety concerns that have happened at the previous facility, and still have the potential to arise at this facility. This is due to the unsatisfactory "Security Upgrades" that Acadia stated that they will install at the new facility. When asked about these "Security Upgrades" they stated that they will only have a fence and locks on the doors. The level of security measures that have been identified as "Upgrades" can, and more than likely will be bypassed with a little of coordination from the patients not wanting to remain there. This ultimately puts an additional risk to the safety of the patients and the surrounding neighbors.
- 3. **Staffing / Professional care** The staffing ratio that was identified by Acadia will be 1 staff member to 4 patients with the majority of the staff requiring no more than a high school diploma. The majority of staff that has been identified at the Louisville facility was proven not to be adequate enough to handle the level of care and attention that these type of patients need. According to the Acadia representative the same staffing ratio is supposed to be adequate for activities that will take place on the outside of the "Security Fence" on the 30 plus acre property. Allowing uninterrupted access to the adjoining properties. In some instances, the "staff" that Acadia has employed at the Louisville facility has been mistaken for escaped patients. When the neighboring homeowners contacted the facility with a description of the individual trespassing on their property, the personnel on duty stated that it was one of their employees. This possibly identifies that Acadia employs individuals that display a lack of professionalism. There is a certain level of professionalism necessary when treating patients requiring positive emotional support as well as professional medical attention. There were other examples of there being lack of professionalism that were identified during the meeting, however I was unable to record all that was being said. One community member did stress the information that was being displayed on the popular social media platforms by current staff members were labeled as disgusting and disrespectful. Acadia representatives held this meeting with the agenda to convince the community that Acadia is a professional healthcare facility with the main focus being on the well-being of the patients in their care. However the only message that was clear to myself, and the majority of the community that were in attendance at this meeting was that Acadia is a company/business who may provide care to some troubled youth however there priority is appears to be on the business side focusing on making a profit. This is evident through the staff selection/screening process and the lack of willingness to upgrade the security level necessary to adequately protect the patients and the surrounding community.

Tennessee is a large state and there is more than likely a more suitable location available away from any community that will suit the needs of a facility like this. I urge the Knox County Planning Commission to **deny** this location or any other location within this community.

I also want to thank you for the opportunity to express my concern of the proposed location.

My name is Meghann Howard. I live at 4921 Wise Springs Rd. I am emailing in opposition to the Juvenile Residential Treatment Facility at 4937 Wise Springs Rd.

We are at the "11th hour", and once again the community is trying to wrap their mind around the <u>new</u> category and definition of Boarding Home for Sheltered Care. **Has planning Staff contacted and** received a statement from the Knox County Sheriff with any concerns, or lack of concerns?

The nearby firing range is still, and always will be a major concern for anyone suffering from mental illness. Mrs. King has attached a powerful study in her power point submitted to the commission. Has planning staff spoken with any behavioral specialists with Acadia that have physically been out to the grounds to evaluate this disturbance; about their concerns or lack there of?

From my understanding of watching the Agenda Review, previous Staff categorized this <u>Juvenile Residential</u> <u>Treatment Facility</u> as Assisted Living. It is clear that they never fit that definition and current staff has recategorized this facility as Boarding Home for Sheltered Care. The community had a Holiday weekend to try to shift their mindset and understand how this definition applies. No one on the Review 9/8/2020 touched on the length of stay at a Boarding Home (up to but usually no more than one week) and the intended 3-4 month stay that Acadia has planned for their patients. It appears it has been very difficult to line up a good fit for this facility. That alone speaks volumes to the incompatibility to this neighborhood and county. How does a square peg fit in a round hole? How will this impact the area and pegatively impact nearby property owners? The community didn't will this type of facility strangle the area and negatively impact nearby property owners? The community didn't want the Detention Center and we have had to bear that burden; does this community become the dumping ground for all treatment and reform centers in the county?

It was said that the Applicant did not want a full perimeter fence as it would be too "institutionalized". You cannot use the Detention Center as a scapegoat of compatibility, but refuse to be compared or held to some standard of safety. In regards to safety and conditions, the community brought up a need for multiple conditions on August 21st. Proposed conditions were not available by the published Agenda or Agenda review meeting 9/8/2020. I am willing to try to understand the allowances of certain uses under the PR zone, but I do not agree that this project matches the intent of a PR zone.

When File #8-C-20-UR Use on Review Report was initially reviewed at the August 13, 2020 Planning Commission meeting, the applicant was filing for "approval of an assisted living/hospice care facility in the PR district". After the flaw in filing as assisted living was pointed out, File #8-C-20-UR Use on Review Report was changed to filing for "approval of a boarding home for sheltered care in the PR district" for the September 10, 2020 Planning Commission meeting. Acadia and their contracted support seem to be stretching the intended meaning of what is acceptable under Planned Residential Zone (PR).

This is not an assisted living facility. This is not a boarding home for sheltered care. This is a **residential treatment center** for youth and adolescents with drug and alcohol abuse as well as mental health issues. This is not a boarding home facility where residents reside usually for a week. This is a treatment facility where residents reside usually for 3 to 4 months. This is not a boarding home facility where they shelter not more than twelve (12) persons per "home". This is a treatment facility where they shelter not more than eighteen (18) per "home". A boarding home is not a locked facility to keep residents in. This is a residential drug and alcohol treatment center and it is a locked, secured facility meant to keep residents in.

Even if this application fit the definitions acceptable for Planned Residential Zone, a majority of the residents in this area are opposed to this facility being built within the geographic area. The majority of residents in this area are concerned for the safety of the community and are aware of the potential loss of the community's well-being if a mental health, substance abuse treatment center is built.

As a resident of Wise Springs Rd, I have a few concerns on the development of 4739 Wise Springs Rd as a Resident Rehabilitation Facility.

To begin with, I think the need for a facility of this nature is needed for the children in Knoxville and surrounding area. I do not think the area on Wise Springs is the best location for this type of facility.

My concern for the residents of this facility consist of the fact that the children in this facility have a variety of issues. This area is less than a mile from the Regional Training Firing Range which is used 6 days a week. This gun fire is live rounds of ammunition that goes on for hours each day. I cannot understand how this type of environment is best for adolescents that are in a facility for Mental, Emotional and Behavioral Disorders.

When meeting with Acadia, the violence, assaults and elopements from various types of facilities ran by Acadia was addressed. The only thing that Acadia will say is that the facility in Blount County cannot be compared. They also stated that some of those residents could be moved to the site on Wise Springs. Moving the patients from one location to another is not going to solve the issues without addressing the real problem, which in this case would be proper security for the residents and adjacent property owners. They have no plans for perimeter fencing around the entire facility.

If Acadia wants to come into our neighborhood and build a facility of this type, it seems to me as though they would want to make the neighbors feel secure and have the concerns of all parties involved in their best interest.

All the security concerns voiced by the community meeting with Acadia were met with resistance and the comment made "that fencing is not needed". The statement was made that if a fire alarm was pulled that only the back doors would unlock to the courtyard and there would be no outside access. I have enough experience in healthcare to know that when a fire alarm is pulled all doors are required to open which would allow the residents free access to outside of the facility.

As a lifelong resident of this community I have the right to feel safe on my property. Our fears are fact based on articles published by the Maryville Times in February, 2019.



Dear Commissioners:

I have lived in this community for 61+ years, and I am an adjacent property owner. I have included a lot of information in this power plan, and I have also researched and provided links to articles. While I agree that the resource is needed, I have to **strongly disagree** that the environment and location for this Recovery Center is not in the best interest of the Children that they plan to provide care for. In addition, I do have safety concerns, based on facts, for my grandchildren living in my residence and other children that are living adjacent to the facility. Please review the attached power point. Thank you.

PATIENT CONCERNS - ACADIA IS A FOR PROFIT COMPANY

I. Per the Program Overview: The Residential Treatment Center and Alcohol and Drug Treatment Center will treat patients experiencing histories such as:

Trauma from physical, emotion, sexual abuse; Mood Disorders such as Depression, Bipolar Disorder, Anxiety; Behavioral Disorders; Family Problems - usually includes - Violence, Aggression, Defiance Disorders; Chemical Dependencies - Drug and Alcohol * which many of the above usually have multiple diagnosis.

Review of the literature indicates that the environment for these patients will need a stable, serene, safe, nurturing environment.

Speaking as a Registered Nurse with 40 years experience — Continuous GUN FIRE that may occur for many hours, as often as 6 days a week, does not promote a sense of Safety, a Serene or Nurturing environment. The Environment of the proposed Residential Treatment Center is NOT conducive to meeting a therapeutic, nurturing or healing environment for any Residential Treatment Patient.

According to Mr. Mullins, Acadia is not concerned with the Gun Fire as per use by Knox County it is 9 – 4 p.m. as the Children will be in School. The residents can attest that there is Gun Fire outside these time frames as again this is a Regional Firing Range which includes the testing to obtain a Gun permit.

My Question is: Did a licensed Psychologist or Psychiatrist come and stand on the property when the Gun Fire was occurring? It was very apparent that Acadia was caught off guard related to the Gun Fire during the Community meeting and the medical representative appeared to find the noise disturbing.

The Literature which is cited below CLEARLY States that NOISE impacts mental well-being in both Children and Adults. Studies show that their are consequences. Numerous studies have linked noise pollution to Increased Anxiety, Depression, Stress, More Medication, and in adults more likely to Heart problems and High Blood Pressure. YOU CAN CLOSE YOUR EYES, BUT YOU CANNOT CLOSE YOUR EARS. (1)

AGAIN, A CHANGE TO THE CATEGORY: NOW - BOARDING HOME FOR SHELTERED CARE

- If Knox County does not have a category to fit this facility, it does not seem to be a good business practice to try to make it fit. It has been changed multiple times from the first time when the land was filed for rezoning.
- While the community was misled with the title of Assisted living Facility now it has changed to Boarding Home with Sheltered Care. Again the community residents have had little time to realize the category has changed. As a resident in the community for over 61 years, (born and raised here), it seems that the Applicant should have to start over with a formal request and re-advise the community of the change. It also seems that the planning commission should evaluate the categories and update accordingly so the community and residents have knowledge of what is intended. The below definition is very vague and not really consistent to a Recovery Treatment facility. The Applicant has stated Acadia is looking to build a Juvenile Residential Treatment Center, while it appears the City has the correct category to cover this, the county does not.
- Boarding Home definition: Boarding home for sheltered care: A profit or nonprofit boarding home, rest home or other home licensed by the appropriate governmental agency which in addition to providing food and shelter to three (3) but not more than twelve (12) persons unrelated to the proprietor, also provides, any personal care or service beyond food, shelter, and laundry. Such services may include: (1) supervision and assistance in dressing, bathing and maintenance of good personal hygiene; (2) care in emergencies or in temporary illness, usually for periods of one (1) week or less; (3) supervision in the taking of medications; and (4) other services conducive to the residents' welfare. *The only requirements are no more than 12 people and periods of less than 1 week. This is very vague in comparison to what a Residential Treatment center should be.
- I would also like to voice that yes we have the Detention Center, yes we have a Regional Firing Range, but does that mean this community should have to continue to bear the burden of putting everything in this area because we are a small community and not considered the high end of Knoxville?

WHY IS THE COMMUNITY CONCERNED? BASED ON FACTS

- II. Adjacent Landowner and Community Concerns: Acadia Health's previous issues at Jones Bend Road, referencing article with the Daily Times(I): "Louisville Behavior Health Center to relocate after assaults, neighborhood concerns" Article date: Feb 16, 2019.
- There were 160 incidents listed in the log from (Jan.3, 2016 to Feb, 7, 2019) with the most common call being missing juveniles. Approximately 43 missing incidents reported, 10 assaults, 5 disturbances, and 4 thefts. Acadia Healthcare Division President Jeffrey Woods stated in the article: "you're always going to have the 17 year old boy who does something stupid, and every facility has patients that flee secretly. This is the real world and reality is it's going to happen on any campus."

 In one incidence 3 male teenagers over powered a female employee who advised that the three boys assaulted her and then bound her escaping the facility(2).
- In the same article(I), Mr. Woods outlines the expectation that a new proposed facility would "keep them out of residential areas or even areas that are likely to become residential in the future". The current property is a residential area and Smith Built Homes does have plans to build a subdivision directly across from the proposed 4937 location in the future. Why would Acadia plan to repeat their mistake by selecting a residential location?

CONCLUSION:

- Acadia states: Patient's First it is hard to understand how a medical corporation with licensed medical staff select a Recovery Treatment Center and Alcohol and Drug Center next to a Noisy Active Firing Range. If the Children's well-being is first, then each of you will need to decide is it right to subject children with these defined problems to the loud gun fire. This is NOT a nurturing, quiet environment and is not a location for Children with these issues. If it were children or grandchild would you select a facility next to an Active Firing Range?
- Acadia stated they did not have a Plan B. They are building a New adult and adolescent facility at the corner of Old Weisgarber Road and Dow Springs Blvd. Why would they not build this facility adjoining that one so they could share staff and make it easier for the Providers (MD's, NP's and PA's accessibility). The picture of the new facility shows wooded area and opportunity. It makes more sense.



EastTennesseeBehavioralHealth.com Acadia Healthcare Operations Group President Dr. Jeffrey Woods said the hospital will offer a full continuum of care with inpatient treatment, partial hospitalization and intensive outpatient services. Treatment programs will serve adults and adolescents who struggle with acute symptoms of mental health disorders such as anxiety, depression, bipolar disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and substance use disorders.

- Acadia should put Patient's First, which includes safety. They should also take the responsibility for keeping the community people and our children Safe and First as well. The Community does not feel that Acadia Residential Treatment Center and Alcohol and Drug Center should be located at this location for the stated reasons.
- However, if this review is passed, the Community does not feel that Acadia has addressed our security concerns as we do not desire any repeat incident of the "The Village". Acadia via Mr. Mullins came back with a 6ft privacy fence option at \$112,000 dollars for a partial perimeter fence. Community representative came back and stated we wanted a full perimeter privacy fence at a minimum of 10 feet. With a budget of 30 million + (112,000 dollars is 0.37 % of the budget). For Acadia to be a good neighbor, based upon their previous history not only in Louisville, but other areas, and to provide privacy and protection for both the community residents and the children, we the community do not feel it is asking too much to have the full perimeter fencing.

The current site in Blount County is already ruined so why not LEAVE it there?

The idea of putting a fence only on the roadway side simply would funnel the drug addicts the other way...Directly into a secluded family neighborhood where they would be able to hide in the shrubbery before breaking into those homes, outbuildings and vehicles; probably encountering the mostly elderly residents and bludgeoning them or being SHOT by them in their own defense. That is the worst thing that could be done for both the residents of the neighborhood AND the transient patients of the proposed facility.

Dear Commission,

I greatly appreciate your consideration regarding use on review of the property located on 4937 Wise Springs Road. I know that the mental health of our youth is very important, and there is no doubt that a facility to enable our next generation to thrive is an essential institution. However, I believe that the youth, as well as the community, would be better served if the facility were in a different location. In addition, I do not believe that the MPC zoning regulations have been met with the proposal that Acadia has set forth. As I mentioned in previous e-mails, the standards below are not as clear as Acadia set them out to be:

- The proposal indicates that there will be minimal impact on existing street system and will not draw substantial additional traffic in the area. However it also states that there is an estimated traffic impact of 562 daily vehicle trips per day.
- Per Use on Review Neighborhood context- this is a community setting with mostly large single family detached houses.
- Adding 562 daily vehicle trips to a community setting of mostly large single family detached houses is a substantial additional traffic impact.

The proposed development was for Assisted Living Facility. However, the previous staff of MPC at the time of rezoning found that this should be considered Boarding home for sheltered care.

- There was some discussion at the August 13th commission meeting about the proposal meeting the guidelines for Assisted Living Facility under several points. The Proposal by Acadia now is suggesting that the "current staff in codes office will honor this interpretation made by previous staff as it would be unfair to change the recommendation at this time in the process" (See COMMENTS on Use on Review Report for this Agenda Item)-
- In the Community meeting with Acadia in July at Union Baptist Church when questioned about why this fell into Assisted Living Facility, Ben Mullins indicated that this was nothing in the zoning ordinance that was more closely matched to what is being proposed.
- The Zoning for 4937 Wise Springs Road is Planned Residential (PR) which does not include Boarding home for sheltered care under the permitted uses (5.13.02)

The Acadia group was asked to meet again with the community between the August 13th meeting and the September 10 meeting of the commission but they declined.

The Knox County Detention Facility is across the road a few hundred feet from the proposed facility as is the Knox County Sheriff Training facility. There is gunfire heard mainly during daytime hours M-F from the shooting range, but there is also gunfire heard at night and on the weekends that are not "planned" shooting skills training. This has already been pointed out as non-conducive to the healing environment needed for the youth at the mental health rehab facility.

It is my hope that the commission will review carefully and make the decision to decline the use on review for the Acadia proposal



Burglary petitions are on file for four juveniles who broke out of a behavior center in Louisville early Monday, Aug. 3, and are accused of trying to rob a store and steal a utility truck.

Ranging in age from 15 to 17, the male juveniles were reported missing from the Helen Ross McNabb Gateway Center, 3845 Holston College Road, Louisville, according to a statement from Blount County Sheriff James Berrong.

Deputies started looking for them in the Holston College Road area, but didn't find anyone.

Monday morning, deputies responded to multiple reports of thefts, burglaries and attempted burglaries in the area of Ralph Phelps and Quarry roads.

These included a convenience store break-in attempt and burglary and vandalism at a church, both on Ralph Phelps Road.

There were also complaints of "numerous" attempted vehicle burglaries, and the theft of a bucket truck belonging to the city of Maryville, stolen from property on Quarry Road.

Berrong asked people who live near these roads to keep an eye out for the four juveniles and to keep their doors locked.



The concerns and comments I wish to bring forward relate less to the zoning issues, and more to address the environment surrounding this property as it pertains to the potential clients/residents of the proposed Adolescent Residential Treatment Facility. I am currently a Tennessee Licensed Master Social Worker with over 30 years of experience in the field. I have worked in mental health facilities, medical care, with abused children and families, as well as in a long-term Residential Treatment facility for adolescent boys.

First, the back of this property is within 1/3 mile of an outdoor shooting range where shooting occurs at minimum Monday through Saturday from 9 am until into the evening on some days. My experience with clients who have a history of exposure to varying levels of violence, as well as those clients with limitations or deficits as to their mental, social and/or emotional development; the sounds of bullets in such a close range is likely to increase anxiety, promote extreme reactions due to fear or stress, and generally impact the adolescents' needs for feelings of mental and physical safety. This could unnecessarily limit or extend the therapeutic process for those clients.

My home on Washington Pike is located 2/3 mile from the shooting range, and we can easily hear shooting when we are in our yard. The first sounds of shooting on a given day are startling, and loud enough to be uncomfortable with how close it sounds,

My next concerns relate to both the safety of the youth to be in residence at the Adolescent Treatment facility as well as the safety of the neighborhood in the surrounding area. The proposed facility is on Wise Springs Road within a short distance of an intersection with Maloneyville Road. That area of our community is in proximity to the Knox County Law Enforcement Training Center (where the shooting occurs) and across the road is the Knox County Detention Center. The detention center is a locked and secure facility with tall fences topped with razor wire and has staff who patrol and manage security. However, inmates have escaped in the past despite a high level of security.

The Adolescent Residential Treatment facility proposal shows an administration building surrounded by eight cottages housing 18 youth each which are located within a fenced courtyard – with the fencing ten feet tall. We were told that in order to leave that fenced area, one must have a key or fob that will allow access outside. I support the neighbors' request to add similar perimeter fencing to contain the complete campus of the proposed facility. This would act as a barrier if someone with ill intent might want to get into the facility, as well as an additional barrier to keep the clients within the support and control of the treatment facility. From my personal experience, if an adolescent wants to get out of the facility, they will find a way. It behooves the facility to have adequate security measures in place.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide additional information to assist you in your decision-making.

Planning Commission Members,

First of all, thank you for listening to the members of our community and postponing action on the above case number. As a concerned resident of the Corryton Area, I am opposed to the development of the Behavior Health Center to be located on Wise Springs Rd. I attended the community meeting at Union Baptist Church on August 10 and the overwhelming consensus of those attending are against this project at this location. Here are some of the reasons why:

- · Although Acadia is the one of the largest healthcare systems of its kind, it only has a 2.5 out of 5 rating from its employees. See: https://www.indeed.com/cmp/Acadia-Healthcare/reviews.
- The Louisville facility has had many difficulties and the residents want them out of the community. It appears the same people who were managing that facility will be managing the proposed facility on Wise Springs Rd. Our residents do not want that here. See https://www.thedailytimes.com/news/louisville-behavior-health-center-torelocate-after-assaults-neighborhood-concerns/article_523be3b2-98ce-5ea6-afdf-028e94103b9e.html#:~:text=WhatsApp-,The%20Village%20Behavioral% 20Health%20Treatment%20Center%20will%20relocate%20from%20Louisville,from%20the%20juvenile%20residential%20facility.
- Although Acadia says they will have a staff of physicians, psychologists, and other professionals, when asked who will spend the majority of time with the residents, the answer is staff who will go through 2 weeks of training. These staff members will probably be much younger persons at entry level. We understand

there's a high turnover rate.

- · We have a beautiful residential area.
- The amount of additional traffic (200 employees and visitors) is not conducive to the area. Traffic on Washington Pike is already getting quiet heavy for the highway as it
- There are safety concerns about having that facility in close proximity to residential areas. Although, it is supposed to have a 14 ft. fence, residents are very skeptical.
- The whole approach has been a Public Relations disaster. The project has not been communicated broadly enough and well enough. Very few persons in our subdivision have had any knowledge of this project. Neither the commission nor Acadia can expect to hold a single community meeting with the decision to be made 3 days later without the community feeling that this is an attempt to fly under the radar and sneak this project through. It raises BIG TRUST ISSUES!
- Is also close to the target range of the Sheriff's Department where the deputies practice very often. It was apparent that the officials from Acadia who attended the meeting at the union Baptist were aware of the firing range. It was reported that one of the psychologist from Acadia who attended the above meeting stated she was unaware of the target range. Again, it doesn't seem that Acadia did its initial homework, which exacerbates the reality that this is not a well-managed organization.
- This location is not a healthy and ideal place for youths with emotional and behavioral issues.

Dear Commission Members:

My family and I have reviewed the revised Use on Review Report for the youth treatment center proposal at 4937 Wise Springs Road. We still have several concerns:

This was previously evaluated as an assisted living facility, which it did not appear to be. It is now being evaluated as a boarding home for sheltered care. That doesn't seem to be the case, either, as the definition states that a boarding home for sheltered care provides "care in emergencies or in temporary illness, usually for periods of one (1) week or less". This proposed facility states in their materials that their clients would stay in the program for 3-4 months. Additionally, a boarding home for sheltered care provides "food and shelter to three (3) but not more than twelve (12) persons unrelated to the proprietor". This facility is seeking approval for up to 216 beds.

The zoning is unclear in terms of how many dwelling units are allowed per acre, but the report indicates that each cottage constitutes 2 dwelling units. With 12 cottages containing 2 units each, will these be spaced one per acre?

The security measures outlined in the revised report indicate that the interior courtyard would be secured by a 10-foot privacy fence. The community was told this fence would be a 14-foot tall fence. The community has asked for a 10 foot perimeter fence as well, and Acadia has indicated that they will provide a 10 foot partial fence only around the neighboring homes, which the neighbors do not feel is sufficient. This still allows for elopement from the unsecured portion of the property, especially when the residents are outdoors for their recreational activities.

We are concerned about the public utilities available to the site as many residents have requested access to sewer services for years, only to be told by KUB that the wastewater treatment facility was at capacity and could not handle additional connections. How, then, will they be able to support 216 additional residents and how can they connect those residents but not the rest of the community? Even if this can be done, who has to pay for the lines that pass by neighboring properties? In the past, when KUB ran a sewer line past a property, the homeowner was responsible for a monthly payment toward that line, even if they could not or did not connect to it.

The report continues to state that the proposed facility would have minimal impact on the existing street system and that it would not draw substantial additional traffic through residential areas. The entire surrounding area is comprised of residential areas. Our roads are already high traffic and need work, and this report states that the estimated daily traffic impact is 562 trips. That seems quite a strain to our roads and definitely "substantial additional traffic through residential areas". Many people also take the back roads just to get to this part of the area in an effort to avoid the more heavily congested areas around the interstates, and those back roads are just like Wise Springs Road...narrow and winding. Acadia's attorney, Mr. Mullins, did state that Acadia could stagger their shifts around the peak traffic times, which is appreciated, but with the sheriff's shift changes, school and bus traffic, as well as daily work commuters, that may be difficult to accomplish. Additionally, there will be deliveries and visitors to the site, and those likely could not be scheduled around peak times.

The report correctly states that the proposed facility is significantly larger than structures in the surrounding area. This is because the surrounding structures are mostly comprised of residential homes, with the exception of the Knox County Detention Center. The report does state that there will be visual buffers, which according to the report, also serve to lessen potential impacts on property values, but how do visual buffers resolve that issue? The facility is what it is, hidden from sight or not, and that would be taken into consideration in values of surrounding homes. Providing visual buffers does not change the adverse impact on the character of the neighborhood.

The report states that the use is compatible with institutional properties (the Knox County Detention Center) to the north and west of where it is proposed and further states that "the use is more intense than that of the surrounding residential properties to the south, east, and west". That is correct; the only "compatible" use is the Detention Center, and the remaining properties are residential. Why should we be the community to house all of these such facilities? Additionally, if this facility and its residents are not cause for concern to the neighborhood, why is it consistently compared to the Knox County Detention Center?

The report still states that no surrounding land uses would pose a hazard or create an unsuitable environment for the proposed use. I understand that someone told Acadia's representatives that shooting at the neighboring gun range only occurs from 9:00 to 4:00 Monday - Friday, but according to the direct neighbors, that is not the case. The permit carry courses, for instance, take place on the weekends. Additionally, the railroad tracks running alongside the unfenced perimeter would be cause for concern due to the train noise and due to potential elopements as a child could easily escape to those tracks and disappear or they could be injured by a train or on the tracks themselves.

Per Acadia's representatives, they want their facility to be housed in a low density area. As Smithbilt has purchased a large farm for future development directly across the street from this proposed site, this will no longer be a low density area if and when Smithbilt decides to develop. How would this support their mission statement?

In the event of a medical emergency, the closest hospital is downtown. It would seem much more practical to establish a facility in an area where medical treatment could be much more easily accessible.

Finally, the community has no confidence in Acadia. In researching the Louisville facility, it seems that that facility had more security incidents after Acadia took control of the facility than when it was operated by their predecessor. Additionally, Acadia is a for-profit, publicly traded corporation, and we have been told that each of their facilities is autonomous. This does not promote confidence in the company or their motives.

Our family and the majority of the residents who even know about this proposal feel that this will negatively affect our community. We already have the Detention Center. If this center is forced upon us, what's next? We don't want to be the community known and responsible for housing these facilities. At what point do all these facilities start to impact our values? At what point do these facilities BECOME the character of our neighborhood? We don't want that; we want our community to continue to have the residential feel that brought us to it.

I have her power of attorney and I also have a vested interest in opposing the Acadia project. She (Naomi Farmer) and I (Phyllis Shnider) are against the development of the Acadia Healthcare Juvenile Residential Treatment Facility at proposed location 4937 Wise Springs Road, Knoxville, TN 37918.

Again I state:

- 1. The roads that will be needed for travel are not wide enough to handle the increased amount of traffic and supply truck deliveries. There are blind hills on the Wise Springs Road that will make it unsafe for home residents to enter Wise Spring road from their own driveways because of increased traffic
- Knox County Police gun firing range is located right across the street from the facility and the range is used 6 days a week. We can hear the shooting from our house and it sounds like a war zone. Why would you allow the proposed facility to be located near a war zone sound that is created by the constant shooting? If the care and concern for the health and well-being of the children to be housed at this site with their many challenges as Acadia has listed that the children are being treated for, do you really think that hearing bang, bang, bang, bang constantly is not going to be an agitation factor in their treatment. Some of the children are being treated suffer from PTSD. Autistic children can't stand loud noises.
- When Acadia was asked the question regarding the education of the 24/7 Behavioral Heath Technicians, this is staff to be in the cottages with the children at all times, we were informed that a high school graduate or college graduate with 40 hours education in how to deal with the children will be required by Acadia. We ask the question did the staff have any clinical experience in dealing with children with the type of issues Acadia is treating at the facility. The answer was no. As those who work in healthcare know, clinical experience is a must in treatment and dealing with these children who are in need of such treatment.
- 4. Lack of security. They have on their drawings a 14 foot wall around the cottages. Why are they not putting the 14 foot wall around the entire perimeter? Do they want the children to be safe or not? Do they want the community and surrounding neighbors to be safe? We think not. They have no security guards on campus. Key cards carried by staff is the only security they have. So if a child gets hold of the staff's key card, out the door they go. Acadia is not concerned about the safety of the children or community at all.
- Why was this property selected? Because it was cheap? They are bringing children in from out of state at least 17% from North Carolina and some from other states that are unknown at this time. We ask if they had a plan B for a secondary location. The answer, no they had no plan B. Was this already a done deal but the community was not aware of the deal already made? We ask had they looked in North Carolina for a site since they were brining children from North Carolina to Knox County to be treated? They had not looked a location in North Carolina.
- Does Knoxville need a place for treatment for children who have the challenges, yes we do. But, this is not the location!!!
- 7. At the meeting held at Union Baptist Church where Acadia came and spoke with the community residents approximately 50-60 people in attendance, the overwhelming voices are saying NO to the Acadia facility being built in this location as proposed. Even the speaker for Acadia, was aware of the feeling of the community as in NO we do not want your facility at this location.
- 8. Doctors are not on campus 24/7. One nurse is.
- Acadia's previous location in Maryville, look at Acadia's track record there. They are managing that facility and look at what has happened there. Did you take that into consideration when you heard their request to build on the proposed location?

Honorable Commissioners,

I live at 4809 Shell lane; a few hundred feet from the proposed facility described as a "Residential Treatment Center".

#1. The proposed project does not match the INTENT of the PR zone. The area restriction of at least 20 acres was to allow space for a community which included space for diverse use. The definition of the PR (Planned Residential) is essentially to establish a predominately residential area with some commercial activities allowed under the ordinance. "5.13.01 Residential areas thus established would be characterized by a unified building and site development program." ie one comprising mostly family residential use (nationally approximately 80%).

The intent of the zone is to establish a residential area with consideration for other use within that area. By the wording of the ordinance and by the nationwide use of such a designation, the standard for a PR should contain a predominately family residential makeup.

This proposal is for a 100 per cent *commercial* use and no provisions are set aside for any percent whatsoever for the intended majority residential family use. There will be no one residing at the proposed facility. The patients will *not* be establishing residency. While transient use is allowed in the PR zone it is not the intent for that to mean the entire 20 (or 10,000 or whatever) acres will be other than approximately 80 percent normal family type homes.

Under the nation wide precedence for application of this type of zoning arrangement, enough surrounding property of the proposed facility would have to have been re-zoned 'PR' to provide a balanced proportion of residential to commercial and other use. The owners and residents of the entire surrounding area would have to have been included in the lawfully required advertisement for that proposed zoning change, not just the property owners within 200 feet of the site, as was done. The Planned Residential zone is by its name is obviously a zone *primarily* for residential use. The application made is for a totally commercial use of the PR, in direct violation of a PR's intent.

"The intent of the PR zone is not a means to carve out a piece of property within a residential neighborhood in order to allow a commercial endeavor to 100 percent occupy that carved out site."

#2. Although by the obvious argument in #1 negating the need for further comment, the Knox Co. planning staff has decided the proposed facility should be treated as and regulated as a "Boarding" Home for Sheltered Care" described elsewhere in the ordinance.

The "Use on Review" section 5.13.03 is very explicit as to what 'use' the commission may allow under this section, as follows:

- A. Group care DAY homes
- B. Assisted Living Facilities (which we have agreed is not a match for the proposed use.)
- C. Adult DAY CARE centers.

- D. Rural Retreats.
- E. Public Safety Facilities.

Section 5.13.03 does NOT include consideration for Boarding Homes under the "Use on Review" section. Therefore it would appear that the commission would have no legal option but to deny the request.

#3. Additionally, under other articles of the ordnance, the allowance of exception under commission review is limited by the wording in the general and sector plans, ie "The use will not significantly injure the value of adjacent property." I respectfully submit to the commission that simply put, if any of the neighbors near this proposed site are so concerned by the awful stories online about nearby crimes committed by escapees from the Acadia facility in Louisville, Tn. and others around the country (Please see attachment), that these neighbors decide to sell out and move as my wife and I are considering; then I ask you if you would think that maybe when I submit in writing as required by law to any prospective buyer interested in my property, that the bedroom windows of my home are only a very short walk across a cow pasture from two hundred or more heroine and other drug addicts that are very disturbed, scared, angry and suicidal but otherwise very strong and healthy adolescents, and there's nothing between my bedroom windows and them BUT that cow pasture; that perhaps the price for my property will plunge if not evaporate. I refer you again to the intent of the ordinance. If staff somehow finds a way to justify approval of this project by means I have not been able to find in the law, then you are STILL bound by the general intent of the ordnance as to protect us from injury to our property and to preserve the expectation of safety and security for our families in our own homes and in our own yards. At least the Sheriff's Detention facility has Chain link and razor wire and armed guards between me and my bedroom window. Think about my elderly wife and me as we try and try to go to sleep in our lovely little old retirement home with no money lying around to move somewhere else. I deserve just as much compassion as some wayward youth that could get his methadone and *supposed* other treatment at a much more remote and secure site. Acadia Health will be even less secure here than at Louisville. Here they will be able to hide in the woods and walk unopposed straight into a true residential neighborhood.

The kid ended up getting hurt and Acadia sued the construction company and won a big settlement from them. Who's to say this wouldn't happen while a kid is on Knox County property? My other issue is what if a bunch of kids run off and decide to damage Knox County property? This could be expensive... Wouldn't this come out of our taxes to have property/patrol cars replaced or fixed?

Kids walking off from these locations is nothing new apparently. And why wouldn't they? Once again there is no security to keep them on Acadia grounds or to keep people off of the grounds. As a lifelong resident of the Ritta community for nearly 70 years, I have witnessed the Hillcrest Nursing facility demolished to be replaced by the Roger D Wilson Detention center. This new facility was never to house federal inmates, however, this has not been the case. This parcel originally housed what was known as the Poor Folks Home. It was a place to house indigent persons with no home, family or means of support. In time the Poor House gave way to the Hillcrest Nursing facility. An historic church, school house and other buildings were destroyed when Hillcrest was torn down to build the incarceration center with no consideration of the will of the community. A potters cemetery remains on the site and continues to occasionally be used to bury unfortunate people with no relatives to claim their remains

The old work house was for incarcerating minor law breaking persons. When the new center was built, it was determined that it would not be cost effective to tear down the old building, therefore, it would set dormant. Not so, as it is still being utilized.

In addition, a county shooting range facility was built adjacent to the old work house facility. All these maneuvers happened without any consideration of the will of the community residents. No one in the community was pleased: no voice, no choice.

Now, fast forward, and the proposed subject facility with a false zoning request with virtually no prior warning is seemingly being forced on our community. This national company has and continues to have many allegations, complaints. lawsuits etc. nationwide. The facility which is relocating from Louisville, TN is being forced out of that community for negligence, lack of control and security and for the many issues there with absolutely no consideration for the community. Their remedy is to relocate and infringe on our community as Acadia sees us as a dumping ground as they feel we already house a prison and shooting range (not by choice but by force). Our community feels it is time for some other area to share what has been "given" to Ritta whether wanted or not.

I have a great interest in this matter as my wife and I, our children, grandchildren, friends and relatives reside in close proximity to this location!

WHY, I question, would anyone in our community want this problem? Why, I question, would any commissioner even consider to vote approval with all the problems this company has and when it is against the will of the great majority of the community. I may also add that many in the community are not even aware of this request due to the short notice and fraudulent zoning request.

My request is for ALL COMMISSIONERS to research this company on a national level, recognize the problems, complaints, issues, lawsuits and vote NO on the approval and allow Acadia to pursue a location other than our tranquil and pleasant community. I am writing about the Acadia juvenile behavioral health/drug treatment center being proposed at 4937 Wise Springs Rd. There has been additional communication with Ben Mullins since the last Use of Review hearing, the biggest issue that keeps arising is the communities request for perimeter fencing & Acadia's resistance to the idea. Acadia has offered a 10 foot fence bordering the closest residential homes. They state in case of patient elopement this should help deter the escapee from coming into our backyards & funnel them into the vegetation area or kcso detention property/railroad tracks. I stand firm that a minimum 10 foot privacy fence needs to be around the entire property, not just the closest residential area. Patient elopement is going to happen & this perimeter fence will only aid Acadia in keeping their patients on their property. I also stand firm that 4937 Wise Springs Rd is not an appropriate property for this facility due to its proximity to the KCSO training facility/shooting range & the fact that this area is already heavily residential & will only be growing in the future. A common thing I have heard is this facility is consistent with the community due to the Detention Center already being in the area, the reality of this is the detention center has multiple barriers, including perimeter fencing as well as fencing with barbed wire, to keep inmates on their property & guards on patrol. In my 10 years as a Wise Springs resident the detention center has never caused a disturbance for my home, I expect the same from Acadia if they receive approval to build this facility.

Dear Commission Members:

Having read the use on review report and staff recommendations for the planned residential treatment center on Wise Springs Road, I had a few concerns that I would like to address related to the following:

- 1) The report states that "the use is in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the Zoning Ordinance". The site is actually being evaluated as an assisted living facility, so this statement does not appear to be accurate.
- 2) The report states that "the use is compatible with the character of the neighborhood where it is proposed". Is it considered compatible because the Detention Center is nearby? Otherwise, what makes this site compatible with the character of the neighborhood?
- 3) The report states that "the use will not significantly injure the value of the adjacent property". Has anyone spoken to experts to obtain their opinion on this? Has anyone researched the property values of the neighboring homeowners of the Louisville center?
- 4) The report states that "no surrounding land uses will pose a hazard or create an unsuitable environment for the proposed use". Would the noise from the shooting range and the nearby railroad tracks not be unsuitable for the children receiving treatment?
- 5) The report states that "the use will not draw substantial additional traffic through residential areas since the site is located on a major collector street". Is Washington Pike considered "a major collector street"? Wise Springs surely is not. Washington Pike, Wise Springs and all the surrounding roadways are all residential areas. The report further details an estimated traffic impact of 562 average daily vehicle trips. This seems like a lot of extra traffic that the roads can't handle under present conditions.

I understand that Acadia is now offering partial perimeter fencing at a minimum height of 6 feet. Given Acadia's past history of elopements, anything short of a full perimeter fence at a height significantly above 6 feet should not be considered. Please bear in mind the many elderly residents and children in this residential area. Additionally, funneling elopers toward the railroad tracks does not seem to be a good idea. Acadia is spending \$30 million on this facility; surely they can spare the cost of total perimeter fencing.

A home is a person's single biggest investment. I imagine that, like any other homeowner, people moved to this community based upon the premise that it was and would continue to be a residential neighborhood of families. I doubt that anyone anticipated a treatment facility being built in the middle of a residential or agricultural area. According to reports, some of the adjoining property owners became aware that this property was being rezoned from agricultural to planned residential in February of this year. If this was presented as a subdivision or even as an assisted living facility, as it is currently being evaluated, I suspect the residents would not have been as concerned. Even as an assisted living facility, it would still maintain a more residential feel. With the increased traffic and noise of 140+ children at the proposed facility, the neighboring property owners obviously have concerns. From what I understand, even the adjoining property owners only learned of the planned treatment facility a short time before the scheduled commission meeting on August 13, with some of the surrounding residents becoming aware of the proposal at a community meeting held on August 10, just days before the commission meeting. Although the property owners directly adjoining this facility are most impacted, the entire community deserved to know about this proposal.

Obviously, this commission has the authority to take away what we envisioned for our families, our futures and our community. However, I ask you to take into consideration the concerns and requests of the community, most of whom have voiced their opposition to this facility as planned.

I am writing to express my concern regarding the proposed Acadia Healthcare Juvenile Residential treatment facility at 4937 Wise Springs Road. The proposed development is proposed as an "Assisted Living Facility" zoning/planning type due to the fact that there is nothing in the zoning ordinance that is more closely matched to what is being proposed. I find it hard to believe that there is not an ordinance that specifically defines the planning/zoning for a mental health treatment facility, given that there are and have been many in the city and state of Tennessee over the years. However, if that is what we have to work with the definition indicates that the facility provides room, board and non medical living assistance services appropriate to the resident's needs and medical services as prescribed by each resident's treating physician. However, it also states that the substantial majority are aged (55 and above- which I find offensive -LOL). The complex will be majority youth with precise psychological needs, not medical needs. While mental health is part of the overall medical health system, the method and delivery of the mental health provider is significantly different.

The proposal indicates that there will be minimal impact on the existing street system and will not draw substantial additional traffic in the area. However, it also states that there is an estimated traffic impact of 562 daily vehicle trips per day. This is a community setting with mostly large single family detached houses..as stated in the Neighborhood context of the Use on Review. When adding 562 daily vehicle trips to that type of community setting, that is a substantial additional traffic and impact.

The community also houses the Knox County Detention Facility within 1/2 mile of the proposed location as well as the training facility for Knox County Sheriff's office. The training facility conducts firing "drills" or something of the sort, daily and the sound is easily heard around the neighborhood. The noise is probably going to be a distraction for the youth when inside the Rehab facility, but it will definitely be a concern when they are in the courtyard or in the surrounding area of the facility.

This neighborhood has already been subjected to the nuances of the Detention facility and the Sherriff's office, and are on high alert every time there is a helicopter overhead because we wonder if someone has escaped, because if you have lived here long enough, you know that is how it works. I request that the Commission please take in consideration the request of the community in making their decision to approve or deny this request.

Planning Commission Members,

As a concerned resident of the Corryton Area, I am opposed to the development of the Behavior Health Center to be located on Wise Springs Rd. I attended the community meeting at Union Baptist Church on August 10 and the overwhelming consensus of those attending are against this project at this location. Here are the reasons why:

- It is in a residential area
- The amount of additional traffic (200 employees and visitors) is not conducive to the area. Traffic on Washington Pike is already getting quiet heavy for the highway as it exists.
- There are safety concerns about having that facility in close proximity to residential areas. Although, it is supposed to have a 14 ft. fence, residents are very skeptical.
- The whole approach has been a Public Relations disaster. The project has not been communicated broadly enough and well enough. Very few persons in our subdivision have had any knowledge of this project. Neither the commission nor Acadia can expect to hold a single community meeting with the decision to be made 3 days later without the community feeling that this is an attempt to fly under the radar and sneak this project through. It raises BIG TRUST ISSUES!
- Is also close to the target range of the Sheriff's Department where the deputies practice very often.

One of the concerns raised was the lack of fencing along the property lines. Acadia has been looking at this issue since our meeting with the neighborhood on Monday and it is willing to add additional fencing and screen all the adjacent residential homes that are contiguous to the property. This diagram illustrates where that fencing would be located. It will be a minimum of a 6 ft wood privacy fence for 2,485 linear feet. We estimate a cost of \$45 per linear foot so the cost of the fencing would be approximately \$112,000 without consideration for site preparation and installation. Our discussions with some of the neighbors suggested our diagram would be a welcome compromise since the unfenced area would be away from residential neighborhoods and toward the detention facility in the north and north west. In the unlikely event of an elopement, it would also deter and funnel anyone away from the closest neighbors and toward less occupied areas.

Please consider this as a condition that may be added to the Use-on-Review approval to address some of the concerns raised.

Michelle,

Reading the comments of those opposed to the approval it will be difficult to adequately address every concern in the usual time allotted for discussion. To that end, I've prepared the brief response to the common-themes that appear in the comments and I would ask that this be included in the record and distributed to the Planning Commissioners prior to the meeting. I will try to keep my initial comments brief, but would ask to be recognized to address any specific questions the Commission may have after hearing all public input.

Location and Allowed Use in Zone:

As stated by the staff report, the area is Low Density Residential and adjacent to the Knox County Detention facilities. This property is tailor-made for the intended use because of the low-density character of the neighbors and its proximity to the county facilities (limiting contact to residential neighborhoods to the north). It is very rare to find property in LDR areas that have the required acreage, topography, and access to public sewer. At the time this property was rezoned, Acadia's interest in this property for this facility was not assured as the property owners and Acadia did not know how they could provide sewer access to the Property. Once that issue was resolved with KUB, Acadia could move forward with its design and concept.

The use is allowed in the PR zone. Prior to seeking rezoning, Acadia representatives met with County Codes, Gerald Green, Knox County Fire Marshal, and the Knox County Legal Department. It was the interpretation at that time that the use would meet the definition of Boarding Home for Sheltered Care. (with the 12 person duplex concept). As Boarding Home for Sheltered Care is not a use called for in any current County zone, Codes opined and interpreted its use would be allowed under the AG and PR zone (which allows Group day Care Homes) however, the PR zone would allow us the flexibility to cluster the dwelling units as opposed to each of them being located on a one-acre lot. This definition, and its allowance under both the PR and the AG zone, was specifically discussed at the February 13, 2020 Planning Commission meeting (where several neighbors appeared in opposition). Although the new head of Knox County Codes asked this be reviewed as an Assisted Living Facility (despite the elderly age requirement in the ALF definition) the standards for the use on review approval do not change, and the underlying use is still allowed under the current PR zone. Moreover, the local zoning definitions do not change the more stringent and specific State and Federal licensing requirements for the facility. As such, the Use on Review plan, as proposed, exceeds the standards for a use on review.

Licensing and Security:

Our facility as designed is regulated by the State Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities (https://publications.tnsosfiles.com/rules/0940/0940-05/0940-05-37.pdf) and, on a Federal level the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. It is also licensed through the Tennessee Department of Education and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). Our facility and program meets or exceeds the facility and security requirements of these state and federal organizations.

- All residents are vetted; admitted patients cannot have a history of major behavioral conditions, significant or violent crimes or behavior, and no sex offenders.
- At the level of treatment we are offering, our licensing only requires 1 Behavioral Health Technician per 8 residents during waking hours. We are committed to providing 1 BHT per 4 residents during this timeframe. Our internal standards on staff to resident ratio are twice that which is required. The BHT is only one type of staff member present for aiding supervision of the residents. There will be a full staff of licensed professionals with clinical training and experience at the facility. Representations by the neighbors to the contrary are false.
- At the level of treatment we are offering, perimeter fencing is not required. We are providing a 14 ft fence of the facilities and court yard.
- At the level of treatment we are offering, locked doors are not required. Our doors are locked. Staff Keycards are required for ingress and egress into the facility and into doors to the cottages. In case of an emergency, such as a fire, the doors would open to the interior courtyard and not to the parking lot.
- If residents are outside of the interior courtyard, cottages, or main complex, they will be supervised by at least one BHT and additional staff as required for the therapy session they are participating Also present on the facility will be therapists, teachers, psychologists, dieticians, and administrative staff. If a specific therapy is called for, such as equine therapy, there will be additional staff trained in that therapy method present in addition to the BHT. Finally, prior to being allowed outside the complex, they will have demonstrated progress in treatment to earn the additional privileges.
- While there is no guarantee there will not be elopements (even the Knox County Detention Faculty cannot make that guarantee) our industry research tells us that the type of facility Wise Springs is designed as can expect substantial reductions in elopements from other types of facilities with less security.
- The Use on Review is conditioned on landscaping buffering along the property lines of any adjacent residences.


Unfair Comparisons to the Village treatment facility:

- Acadia does not own the Village campus. It is owned by Covenant Health. Acadia inherited the existing facility and operational layout and took over operations. The Wise Springs facility is designed not just as a replacement for the Village in Louisville, but as a world class "campus" facility for the treatment of adolescents. Taking experiences learned not only at the Village, but from across the nation to design a "Class A" facility.
- There are no fencing and no locks at the Village. Anyone can drive up or away from to the cabins. It is bisected by a residential community. It is not designed as a secure and self-contained campus. Rather, as stated in the February 16, 2019 Daily Times Article, "The fact is The Village is set up for a summer camp, not an inpatient facility." Conversely, the Wise Springs facility is a state-of-the art inpatient residential treatment facility built upon a foundation of knowledge acquired through years of experience and expertise in the industry.
- It is expected that some patients treated at the Village will be transferred to Wise Springs. They will be moved to a better facility with increased security and treatment options.

Property Values:

Although the neighbors may have sincere beliefs and speculations that their property values will be affected, there is no material evidence to support this assertion. Similar facilities in the County, such as Florence Crittenden (which operates an in-patient alcohol and drug-treatment facility off of Dick Lonas Road, is zoned residential and surrounded by subdivisions. A review of the tax assessments for those properties do not reveal a blighted or depressed neighborhood. Incidentally, Florence Crittenden does not have a perimeter Another historical example is while Lakeshore was an inpatient psychiatric hospital, it was surrounded by some of the most valuable residential real estate in the County.

Firing Range:

The neighbors expressed concern over the proximity of the Sheriff's training facilities and shooting range. Some neighbors described it as a "war zone" and that it would be detrimental to the therapeutic treatment of the residents. I confirmed with the Knox County Sheriff's office that their training and firing range is open for operation Monday through Friday between the hours of 9 am to 4 pm. They have both indoor and outdoor training and firing ranges. At times there can be periods of continuous firearms training, but it does not occur "all-day, every-day." During the past year and a half of due diligence, Acadia representatives have been on the property dozens of times surveying and planning operations on the property during the operational hours of the Sheriff's training facility. Only sporadic gunfire was noted. therapist experts are taking this into account as part of their operations. Specific trauma will be known and specific modalities of treatment will be considered. During the operational hours of the Firing Range, the Wise Springs patients will be attending school in a 40,000 sq. foot building. Based on our research there is little concern on the detrimental affect on the well-being of our patients. This is an issue for the behavioral therapy experts to address in the best interest of its patients; however, if the proximity and sound were legitimate therapy concerns, this property would have been already eliminated by Acadia as an option. The fact is the specific conditions the residents will not be detrimentally affected by ambient noise from the firing range and this is not of concern, clinically or otherwise, for Acadia.

Legal Standards on Use on Review:

Local governments, like Knox County, lack the inherent power to regulate or control the use of private property within their boundaries. Their power is derived solely from the state though specific delegations of the General Assembly. 421 Corp. v. Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County, 36 S.W. 3d 469, 475 (Tenn. Ct. App. 2000); Cherokee County Club, Inc. v. City of Knoxville, 152 S.W.3d 466 (Tenn. 2004). As these laws and regulations are in derogation of common law and operate to deprive property owners of a use of their property which would otherwise be lawful, they are to be strictly construed by the courts in favor of the property owners' right to the free use of their property. Anderson County v. Remote Landfill Services, 833 S.W.2d 903 (Tenn. Ct. App 1991). Although local governments and administrative agencies have broad discretion when it comes to decisions involving local land-use matters, that discretionary authority must be exercised within existing standards and guidelines. McCallen v. City of Memphis, 786 S.E. 2d 633, 639 (Tenn. 1990)(emphasis added).

Specifically regarding the use-on-review process, the Court of Appeals has also stated "[w]hen a legislative body included a certain use within a given zone as a use on review, such a use is intended in that zone." Wilson County Youth Shelter v. Wilson County, 13 S.W.3d 338, 342 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1999) perm. app. denied (2000). The Wilson court went on to hold: "[t]his means that an applicant for such use cannot obtain the necessary permit to proceed with its plans without going through the appeal process as outlined in the Zoning Ordinance; but once the applicant goes through the process and the requested use satisfies all other pertinent regulations of the local zoning regulations, it must be granted." Id. at 342 (emphasis added).

The Court of Appeals previously held that the Knoxville City Council acted arbitrarily in reversing an MPC decision and denying the approval of a proposed commercial development's use-on-review plan in an RP-1 zone when the developer had complied with all the requirements of the zoning ordinance. Mullins v. City of Knoxville, 665 S.W. 2d 393 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1983) perm. app. denied (1984). In Mullins, the pretextual rationale for the City Council's denial was that the development "was not compatible" with the surrounding areas. Id. at 396. In finding the City Council in error in denying the development, this Court found that the zoning map showed similar commercial developments in the area; therefore, there was no material evidence to suggest that the use was incompatible with the surrounding areas. Id. This Court also found that the various other objections made by the neighbors were not supported by material evidence; therefore, the City Council's denial of the use on review was illegal, arbitrary and capricious. *Id.* at 396-397.

Unsubstantiated fears or speculations on the harm a proposed use may cause to occur do not rise to the dignity of material evidence and do not amount to a basis to deny a use-on-review. Sexton v. Anderson County, 587 S.W.2d 663, 666 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1979). Mere beliefs, opinions and fears of neighborhood residents, however sincerely held or believed, do not constitute material evidence. Id. at 666; Mullins v. City of Knoxville, 665 S.W.2d 393, 396 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1983).

Finally, one over-riding principal for administrative approval of a use-on-review remains: "[I]t is not the function of the board to conduct a referendum on public attitudes relative to [a] petition." Wilson County Youth Shelter v. Wilson County, 13 S.W.3d 342 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1999) (citing Sexton, at 664, n. 1) (emphasis added). If the proposed use meets the applicable standards then it must be granted. *Id*.

Conclusion:

The information provided by the applicant not only demonstrates that it is equal or exceeding the professional licensing and permitting requirements of the State and Federal agencies which provide oversight, it has provided more information than is normally required for a use on review. The Planning Department and the applicant has complied with the required notice requirements. Despite protests to the contrary, this is not being flown in under the radar through some underhanded or surreptitious process. Many of the same neighbors objecting today were present in February when the concept of a Boarding Home was first discussed before this body. The plans set forward are the product of several months of legal, medical, engineering, and architectural design. Just as in the case of Mullins v. City of Knoxville, there is a similar, and substantially more intense, facility in the area so there is not material evidence to suggest the development is incompatible with the surrounding area (which is a mix of LDR, agricultural, and institutional uses). If denied, there must be a material reason for the denial, articulated on the record, so that it can be corrected upon future application. Stating the use is not compatible is not sufficient in this instance. As our use meets the applicable standards, as opined by Planning Staff, it must be granted.

The applicant respectfully requests this matter not be delayed, deferred, or denied, but approved consistent with Staff's recommendation and the interpretation of Knox County Codes and that it be approved consistent with Staff's recommendation.

I am a member of the Gibbs community and I am writing to share my concern regarding the proposed use of 4937 Wise Springs Road for Acadia Healthcare to establish an Adolescent Behavioral Health and Treatment Center. I am certainly a proponent of mental health care and helping those suffering from addiction. Addiction is absolutely horrible. I have lost a family member to addiction. I have other family members who struggle with addiction. To those of us who love these people it is beyond heartbreaking to helplessly see someone possessed by the demon of addiction. Addiction is rampant and I believe there are few among us who can say they have not been affected by it in some way. Facilities can be helpful and are necessary in almost every community. Acadia pays \$17M settlement

Deal is largest for health care fraud in West Virginia history

Acadia Healthcare will pay \$17 million in what the Department of Justice says is the largest health care fraud settlement in the history of West Virginia.

The settlement resolves a lawsuit that accused the Franklin-based behavioral health care company of defrauding Medicaid of \$8.5 million through a lab testing scheme in seven of its drug addiction treatment centers in West Virginia.

From January 2012 through July 2018, the lawsuit alleged the Acadia centers used a California lab to conduct urine and blood analysis, then billed Medicaid directly for the services — paying the San Diego lab out-of-pocket for its services. According to a DOJ press release, Medicaid subsequently paid the facilities a "substantially higher amount" for these tests than what had actually been charged by the laboratory.

As part of the settlement, Acadia and its chain of clinics have entered into a five-year corporate integrity agreement with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services that requires the company to maintain a compliance program, implement a risk assessment program and hire an outside organization to review Medicaid claims.

"Fraudulent billing by these Acadia/CRC drug treatment clinics, as contended by the government, limits the State's ability to provide desperately needed addiction treatment services," Maureen Dixon, Special Agent in Charge of the Office of Inspector General of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Region including West Virginia, said in the release. "We will continue working with the U.S. Attorney and other law enforcement partners to protect government health programs, taxpayers, and importantly people who depend on these funds for vitally needed treatment."

The investigation was conducted by HHS-OIG, the Drug Enforcement Administration, West Virginia Medicaid Fraud Control Unite and members of the U.S. Attorney's Healthcare Fraud Abuse, Recovery and Response Team. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Alan McGonigal and Jennifer Mankins represented the federal government in the settlement.

Acadia recently reported that profits slid in the first quarter to \$29.5 million from more than \$50 million early last year, led mostly by personnel costs. The company's shares (Ticker: ACHC) closed at \$32.60 Tuesday, down nearly four percent from Monday. They are up more than 20 percent so far this year.

Acadia facility closes amid abuse allegations

Seven lawsuits have been filed against the company

A youth treatment center in New Mexico owned by Franklin-based behavioral health company Acadia Healthcare has been shut down amid egregious abuse allegations, multiple lawsuits and losing its certification from state regulators.

Seven lawsuits have been filed against the Desert Hills of New Mexico facility in Albuquerque and its parent company in the past month alleging the company failed to protect its clients from physical and sexual abuse from its workers and other patients. The suits cite internal fight clubs instigated by facility staff members, sex between staff and young patients, the unchecked spread of HIV among patients and excessive use of restraints on children — more than 30 times in 60 days, according to filings.

About 11 more lawsuits are expected to be filed in the next couple weeks, according to attorney Joshua Conway, who is representing plaintiffs in the seven cases already filed.

Acadia Healthcare officials did not respond to messages seeking comment for this story.

The Desert Hills facility had been struggling to stay open since late 2018, when the New Mexico Children, Youth and Families Department threatened to take away its license. The department worked with clinic leaders on options to rehabilitate the facility but ultimately decided not to extend its certification past April 1, according to notification sent to Desert Hills employees in late February.

"We don't feel like this was a treatment center anymore," CYFD Chief General Counsel Kate Girard told KOB 4. "It felt more like an institute."

The state's notice did not indicate whether Acadia would provide severance or assistance to the almost 300 employees who have lost their job. Desert Hills patients have been transferred to other facilities in the region.

Louisville behavior health center to relocate after assaults, neighborhood concerns

The Village Behavioral Health Treatment Center will relocate from Louisville to Knox County in the next two years following the adjoining neighborhood's unease over escaped juveniles, assaults and other incidents stemming from the juvenile residential facility.

On Jan. 29, Acadia Healthcare Division President Jeffrey Woods held a meeting with members of the public to discuss the company's plan to move the facility and address neighborhood concerns.

In a recording of the meeting provided to The Daily Times by a neighborhood resident, Woods said Acadia will move over the next 18-24 months to a more fit location in Knox County.

"We recognize that it would be beneficial to these patients and even to our business interests and to your community that we move this facility to a new location," Woods told an audience of around 10. "All in all, it'll be about an 18-month turnaround."

Woods said the company was investing \$35 million to purchase property and build a new facility rather than investing in the property they currently lease from Covenant Healthcare on Jones Bend Road because, as a clinician, he does not think the Louisville location is viable.

"My assessment was almost immediately 'this has to change," Woods said. "Anybody who preceded me with respects to corporate leadership, their point of view may have been different. ... It would be in our interest to build there if it made sense to build there, because we already have the land, but it's just not appropriate."

Incidents:

The current facility, at the end of Jones Bend Road, is a residential behavioral center for low- to midacuity juvenile patients and is composed of a series of cabins and small buildings on the shore of Fort Loudon Lake, neighboring a residential community.

With no fencing or discernable border between the cabins and the community, many neighbors have been victims of or irritated by juvenile runaways and related crimes over the years.

The long-standing concern resurfaced in September 2018, when three teenage boys fled the facility and were charged with vehicle theft and aggravated assault and kidnapping of a facility employee.

In the recording, Woods seemed to try and soften the incident, saying that the oldest of the boys felt he had to "rescue" his girlfriend who had recently been discharged from the facility, adding later that "you're always going to have the 17-year-old boy who does something stupid" and that every facility has patients who flee secretly.

On several occasions throughout the meeting, Woods said the facility had experienced a significant decrease in incidents over the past year and a half because of staffing changes and selective acceptance of applicants due to the facility's inability to serve patients of a certain acuity.


Call records provided to The Daily Times by the Blount County E-911 Center confirmed this claim of a significant decrease in call quantity to the facility from August 2017 to last month, with 60 calls compared to the 18 months prior (February 2016 to July 2017), with 96 calls.

One unidentified resident at the meeting told Woods that Acadia should strive for zero patient elopements, and that anything else was unacceptable.

"This is the real world and the reality is it's going to happen on any campus," Woods said. "We have had a dramatic, sharp decrease of incidents on this facility over the last year and a half, and we want to work to a zero (elopements) point. ... But I'm not gonna stand here and tell you that between now and 18-24 months from now there will no longer be a problem on our campus."

The same call data, however, seemed to emphasize the severity of facility incidents.

Among the 160 incidents listed in the log (Jan. 3, 2016 to Feb. 7, 2019), many are follow-ups, probation and other innocuous calls, but the most common call is for missing juveniles, with 43 such incidents in the three-year range. There were also 10 assaults, five disturbances and four thefts reported.

Woods attempted to downplay the negatives, citing a committee of "some number" of neighbors who have had "strong feelings of opposition" and some that had "very strong support" toward the facility.

The resident rebutted Wood's idea there was a measure of support for the property, saying that neighbors not directly impacted would "obviously" care less.

"If (my property) wasn't directly joining your property, I wouldn't be directly impacted and I'd be like 'what are these people complaining about," he said. "The fact is The Village is set up for a summer camp, not an inpatient facility."

"There are a number of facilities that look exactly like this in terms of their structure," Woods responded. "But they tend to be, for sure, more wilderness."

"The thing is we don't have peninsula hospital patients running around our neighborhood," the resident said.

Woods said that he would have facility management regularly meet with the community for the duration of the center's Louisville stay and that staffing changes such as shorter shifts should help cut down on issues. He conceded that Acadia's priorities remain patients first, staff second and community third.

New facility

Woods said the new facility near Riverbend in Knox County would not face the same kinds of problems because of a scarcity of neighbors.

"It's currently zoned (as an) agricultural area, so there's not a lot around," Woods said. "It keeps us out of residential areas or even areas that are likely to become residential in the future."

Woods touts a nearby nature reserve and proximity to the highway as additional perks of the new location, which will begin to accept a wider range of patients.

"When there are kids, and they are kids under 18, put in your care, you have to have control and responsibility, and they can't be roaming freely, whether they're out in the country or in the middle of town," the resident added.

"We don't disagree," Woods responded.

When asked by a neighbor what would become of the current facility, Woods speculated.

"I think it's probably safe for me to say that Covenant does not have an appetite to reinvigorate that campus for that same purpose," Woods said. "I don't think that there probably is any health care provider who would look at that property and think it is viable without doing a complete rebuild."

Woods declined to be interviewed for this story, but provided a written statement on the relocation saying it "will allow Villages to continue its mission and to expand services for patients with varying levels of care intensity requirements.

"When completed, the new facility is expected to improve access to desperately needed care and treatment," the statement reads. "Village Behavioral Health is committed to providing care that meets the needs of its patients and community. We are proud of our 10 year history and the thousands of lives that have been improved by that care and treatment."

- 1. The roads that will be needed for travel are not wide enough to handle the increased amount of traffic and supply truck deliveries. There are blind hills on the Wise Springs Road that will make it unsafe for home residents to enter Wise Spring road from their own driveways because of increased traffic.
- 2. Knox County Police gun firing range is located right across the street from the facility and the range is used 6 days a week. We can hear the shooting from our house and it sounds like a war zone. Why would you allow the proposed facility to be located near a war zone sound that is created by the constant shooting? If the care and concern for the health and well-being of the children to be housed at this site with their many challenges as Acadia has listed that the children are being treated for, do you really think that hearing bang, bang, bang, bang constantly is not going to be an agitation factor in their treatment. Some of the children are being treated suffer from PTSD. Autistic children can't stand loud noises.
- When Acadia was asked the question regarding the education of the 24/7 Behavioral Heath Technicians, this is staff to be in the cottages with the children at all times, we were informed that a high school graduate or college graduate with 40 hours education in how to deal with the children will be required by Acadia. We ask the question did the staff have any clinical experience in dealing with children with the type of issues Acadia is treating at the facility. The answer was no. As those who work in healthcare know, clinical experience is a must in treatment and dealing with these children who are in need of such treatment.
- Lack of security. They have on their drawings a 14 foot wall around the cottages. Why are they not putting the 14 foot wall around the entire perimeter? Do they want the children to be safe or not? Do they want the community and surrounding neighbors to be safe? We think not. They have no security guards on campus. Key cards carried by staff is the only security they have. So if a child gets hold of the staff's key card, out the door they go. Acadia is not concerned about the safety of the children or community at all.
- Why was this property selected? Because it was cheap? They are bringing children in from out of state at least 17% from North Carolina and some from other states that are unknown at this time. We ask if they had a plan B for a secondary location. The answer, no they had no plan B. Was this already a done deal but the community was not aware of the deal already made? We ask had they looked in North Carolina for a site since they were brining children from North Carolina to Knox County to be treated? They had not looked a location in North Carolina.
- Does Knoxville need a place for treatment for children who have the challenges, yes we do. But, this is not the location!!!
- At the meeting held at Union Baptist Church where Acadia came and spoke with the community residents approximately 50-60 people in attendance, the overwhelming voices are saying NO to the Acadia facility being built in this location as proposed. Even the speaker for Acadia, was aware of the feeling of the community as in NO we do not want your facility at this location.
- Doctors are not on campus 24/7. One nurse is.
- Acadia's previous location in Maryville, look at Acadia's track record there. They are managing that facility and look at what has happened there. Did you take that into consideration when you heard their request to build on the proposed location?

WE do not want this facility built at the proposed location in our back yard. If you really care about the children needing the services of a facility such as this, do not place it near a firing range. My goodness, did not anyone even bother to know about the gun firing range and the noise associated with that and how it would bother the children???? The almighty dollar is not the most important thing here but the safety and concern for the children should be. Different location should be sought by Acadia that is not near a firing range!!!!



Review Statement of Assisted Living versus Recovery Treatment Center

Assisted living facility: A building, establishment, complex, or distinct part thereof which accepts aged persons, whom constitute a substantial majority of not less than eighty-five (85) percent of the facility population, for domiciliary care provided that residential units may be shared with a person under the age of fifty-five (55), if the head of household meets the definition of an aged person. The facility provides on-site to its residents, room, board, nonmedical living assistance services appropriate to the residents' respective needs, and medical services as prescribed by each resident's treating physician.

Recovery Housing: Housing for six (6) persons or more, with no limit on length of stay, that is occupied by the target population as defined below, and that is linked to on- or off-site services that assist the recovery housing residents in retaining the housing, improving his or her health status, and maximizing his or her ability to live and, when possible, work in the community.

Assisted living facilities are only subject to general use on review standards in section 6.50. Recovery Housing facility is subject to section 4.105. Recovery housing is much more detailed and address concerns and safeguards of the community and neighboring properties. Acadia has submitted their proposal as a Treatment facility.

- 3 miles from Ritta Elementary School
- 1 mile from Union Baptist Church Day Care
- Less than 1 mile from Home Day Care
- Less than .3 miles from Three Ridges Golf Course

- Approximately 5 miles from Interstate and 30 minutes from Children's Hospital Emergency access due to traffic to and from Residential Treatment Facility would be significantly delayed between 7:10 to 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 – 6:00 p.m. as Washington Pike is 2 lanes and the primary road access to the Residential Treatment Facility location.
- Located Directly Next to Knox County Sheriff's Regional Training Academy that includes a Live Active Firing Range

PATIENT CONCERNS & COMMUNITY CONCERNS

I. Per the Program Overview: The Residential Treatment Center and Alcohol and Drug Treatment Center will treat patients experiencing histories such as:

Trauma from physical, emotion, sexual abuse; Mood Disorders such as Depression, Bipolar Disorder, Anxiety; Behavioral Disorders; Family Problems - usually includes - Violence, Aggression, Defiance Disorders; Chemical Dependencies - Drug and Alcohol * which many of the above usually have multiple diagnosis.

Review of the literature indicates that the environment for these patients will need a stable, serene, safe, nurturing environment.

Speaking as a Registered Nurse with 40 years experience – Continuous GUN FIRE that can be all day long, sometimes 6 days a week, does not promote a sense of Safety, a Serene or Nurturing environment. The Environment of the proposed Residential Treatment Center is NOT conducive to meeting a therapeutic, nurturing or healing environment for any Residential Treatment Patient.

PATIENT CONCERNS & COMMUNITY CONCERNS

- II. Adjacent Landowner and Community Concerns: Acadia Health's previous issues at Jones Bend Road, referencing article with the Daily Times(1): "Louisville Behavior Health Center to relocate after assaults, neighborhood concerns" Article date: Feb 16, 2019.
- There were 160 incidents listed in the log from (Jan.3, 2016 to Feb, 7, 2019) with the most common call being missing juveniles. Approximately 43 missing incidents reported, 10 assaults, 5 disturbances, and 4 thefts. Acadia Healthcare Division President Jeffrey Woods stated in the article: "you're always going to have the 17 year old boy who does something stupid, and every facility has patients that flee secretly. This is the real world and reality is it's going to happen on any campus." In one incidence 3 male teenagers over powered a female employee who advised that the three boys assaulted her and then bound her escaping the facility(2).
- In the same article(1), Mr. Woods outlines the expectation that a new proposed facility would "keep them out of residential areas or even areas that are likely to become residential in the future". The current property is a residential area and Smith Built Homes does have plans to build a subdivision directly across from the proposed 4937 location. Why would Acadia plan to repeat their mistake by selecting a residential location?

Conclusion:

- Acadia states: Patient's First how would a medical corporation with licensed medical staff select a Recovery Treatment Center and Alcohol and Drug Center next to an Active Firing Range. If the Children's wellbeing is first, then each of you will need to decide is it right to subject children with these defined problems to the loud gun fire.
- Just as Acadia puts Patient's First, which includes safety, they are responsible for keeping the community people and our children First as well.
- The Community does not feel that Acadia Residential Treatment Center and Alcohol and Drug Center should be located at this location. However, if this review is passed, the Community does not feel that Acadia has addressed our security concerns as we do not desire any repeat incident of the "The Village". The community made the request in our meeting with Acadia, but met with resistance. The Community asks the Commission to enforce a 14 foot privacy perimeter fence around the entire property on the Acadia side.

We are in favor of all kinds of mental health treatment centers however, we have reservations about the placement of this facility on Wise Springs Rd. Our concerns are related to the size of the facility, it is much larger than we were originally led to believe. We also have concerns about the wear and tear and increased traffic that this construction will add to Washington Pike, which is already a very busy highway. We have concerns for the residents of the proposed facility hearing the constant barrage of gunfire from the training facility which is adjacent to the planned facility. We think the proximity to our property which is less than a half of a mile from the planned facility will lower our property values. We are a bit concerned about safety because the announced plans do not seem to address adequate perimeter fencing. Our neighborhood is primarily made up of retirees, many of whom are widows and already fearful. Having an additional center of troubled young people so close to the county detention center seems to be an added worry. We also have concerns that this facility although it is coded as "assisted living" is actually a "recovery" center and should be coded as such. If that is the case then the staffing should be adjusted to reflect the true purpose of the facility. We do not want to prevent mental health treatment facilities from being built, but do NOT think that this property was thought out considering all the issues that we have addressed here. We are quite sure that there are other parcels of land that would be better to house this than a residential/agricultural area such as the one proposed.

Members of the Knox County Planning Commission,

My family lives within a couple hundred yards of the proposed Acadia Healthcare Juvenile Residential Treatment Facility proposed to be located at 4937 Wise Springs Road. Below are my family's concerns associated with this project. Thank you for your review and consideration of these points as an important component of your decision making process.

First, I would like to echo the sentiments expressed particularly by David N. Leone, Laurie Hildenbrand, Kenneth Domingues, Julia Gibson as well as many others who have authored and submitted letters of concern. Their points are very well made and should be heavily weighted as the commission considers approval for this facility. Some of the items I note below are re-iterations of their comments.

- 1. In this COVID environment, the community has not had sufficient time nor opportunity to understand, assemble, review and provide comment to the commission in regard to its position relative to this project. Well organized municipal, city and county boards are having a difficult time communicating effectively. A community such as ours cannot properly respond to an issue of this nature in the matter of days (note the July 30 notification date). Please postpone a decision on this application a minimum of 30 days so that the community has a reasonable amount of time to respond appropriately.
- 2. Acadia has a history of prior issues. The issues are not a result of location but more so due to ineffective facility management. Location simply brought the issues to light publicly. Note the February 2019 article in the Daily Times: https://www.thedailytimes.com/news/louisville-behaviorhealth-center-to-relocate-after-assaults-neighborhood-concerns/article 523be3b2-98ce-5ea6-afdf-028e94103b9e.html
- 3. The above article notes a relocation to the Riverbend area and identifies all the reasons that the Riverbend area is a good fit. What happened? Why the Wise Springs location? It's not Riverbend. It isn't near a hospital or a highway, it's no longer agricultural zoned, it is in a residential area (Smithbilt has property for a several hundred unit subdivision directly across the street. See previously published comments that identify the ideal location for the facility:

New facility

Acadia Healthcare Division President Jeffrey Woods

Woods said the new facility near Riverbend in Knox County would not face the same kinds of problems because of a scarcity of neighbors.

"It's currently zoned (as an) agricultural area, so there's not a lot around," Woods said. "It keeps us out of residential areas or even areas that are likely to become residential in the future."

Woods touts a nearby nature reserve and proximity to the highway as additional perks of the new location, which will begin to accept a wider range of patients.

"When there are kids, and they are kids under 18, put in your care, you have to have control and responsibility, and they can't be roaming freely, whether they're out in the country or in the middle of town," the resident added.

"We don't disagree," Woods responded.

4. Placing this facility directly adjacent to a very active firing range seems like poor planning. The firing range is active in the morning, afternoon and evening. The loud, sharp reports of firearms are clearly audible up to 1 mile away. The Acadia facility would be practically next door to it. I can't imagine this is conducive to the wellbeing of juvenile behavioral health patients. Acadia is not considering patient wellbeing.

5. Staffing and Professional care services appear to be less than adequate when reviewing the records of past issues. The facility has previously admitted that staffing is a source of their issues. How has Acadia committed to fix their in-house problems that evolved into problems for the neighborhoods and surrounding community?

If the commission intends to approve this plan. Please consider the following as conditions of an approval:

- a. This development is being reviewed as an Assisted Living Facility. How many assisted living facilities in the surrounding area require a fence 14' in height as a component of the development - shown on the current plans. How many assisted living facilities have been required to relocate due to problems or dangers they have created in thier community – please refer to previously mentioned Daily Times article. If this motion passes, please require non-scalable security fencing at the entire property boundary as a component of the development for the safety of the juvenile residents. Mr. Woods previously stated that he agreed that patients should not be able to roam
- b. Please require that Acadia maintain the 1:4 staff to resident ratio and limit the capacity to 144 residents throughout lifespan of the facility.

I find it hard to believe that there is not an ordinance that specifically defines the planning/zoning for a mental health treatment facility, given that there are and have been many in the city and state of Tennessee over the years. However, if that is what we have to work with the definition indicates that the facility provides room, board and non medical living assistance services appropriate to the resident's needs and medical services as prescribed by each resident's treating physician. However, it also states that the substantial majority are aged (55 and above- which I find offensive -LOL). The complex will be majority youth with precise psychological needs, not medical needs. While mental health is part of the overall medical health system, the method

The proposal indicates that there will be minimal impact on the existing street system and will not draw substantial additional traffic in the area. However, it also states that there is an estimated traffic impact of 562 daily vehicle trips per day. This is a community setting with mostly large single family detached houses..as stated in the Neighborhood context of the Use on Review. When adding 562 daily vehicle trips to that type of community setting, that is a substantial additional traffic and impact

The community also houses the Knox County Detention Facility within 1/2 mile of the proposed location as well as the training facility for Knox County Sheriff's office. The training facility conducts firing "drills" or something of the sort, daily and the sound is easily heard around the neighborhood. The noise is probably going to be a distraction for the youth when inside the Rehab facility, but it will definitely be a concern when they are in the courtyard or in the surrounding area of the facility.

This neighborhood has already been subjected to the nuances of the Detention facility and the Sherriff's office, and are on high alert every time there is a helicopter overhead because we wonder if someone has escaped, because if you have lived here long enough, you know that is how it works. We are in favor of all kinds of mental health treatment centers however, we have reservations about the placement of this facility on Wise Springs Rd. Our concerns are related to the size of the facility, it is much larger than we were originally led to believe. We also have concerns about the wear and tear and increased traffic that this construction will add to Washington Pike, which is already a very busy highway. We have concerns for the residents of the proposed facility hearing the constant barrage of gunfire from the training facility which is adjacent to the planned facility. We think the proximity to our property which is less than a half of a mile from the planned facility will lower our property values. We are a bit concerned about safety because the announced plans do not seem to address adequate perimeter fencing. Our neighborhood is primarily made up of retirees, many of whom are widows and already fearful. Having an additional center of troubled young people so close to the county detention center seems to be an added worry. We also have concerns that this facility although it is coded as "assisted living" is actually a "recovery" center and should be coded as such. If that is the case then the staffing should be adjusted to reflect the true purpose of the facility. We do not want to prevent mental health treatment facilities from being built, but do NOT think that this property was thought out considering all the issues that we have addressed here. We are quite sure that there are other parcels of land that would be better to house this than a residential/agricultural area such as the one proposed.

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Louisville behavior health center to relocate after assaults, neighborhood concerns

The Village Behavioral Health Treatment Center will relocate from Louisville to Knox County in the next two years following the adjoining neighborhood's unease over escaped juveniles, assaults and other incidents stemming from the juvenile residential facility.

On Jan. 29, Acadia Healthcare Division President Jeffrey Woods held a meeting with members of the public to discuss the company's plan to move the facility and address neighborhood concerns.

In a recording of the meeting provided to The Daily Times by a neighborhood resident, Woods said Acadia will move over the next 18-24 months to a more fit location in Knox County.

"We recognize that it would be beneficial to these patients and even to our business interests and to your community that we move this facility to a new location," Woods told an audience of around 10. "All in all, it'll be about an 18-month turnaround."

Woods said the company was investing \$35 million to purchase property and build a new facility rather than investing in the property they currently lease from Covenant Healthcare on Jones Bend Road because, as a clinician, he does not think the Louisville location is viable.

"My assessment was almost immediately 'this has to change," Woods said. "Anybody who preceded me with respects to corporate leadership, their point of view may have been different. ... It would be in our interest to build there if it made sense to build there, because we already have the land, but it's just not appropriate."

Incidents:

The current facility, at the end of Jones Bend Road, is a residential behavioral center for low- to midacuity juvenile patients and is composed of a series of cabins and small buildings on the shore of Fort Loudon Lake, neighboring a residential community.

With no fencing or discernable border between the cabins and the community, many neighbors have been victims of or irritated by juvenile runaways and related crimes over the years.

The long-standing concern resurfaced in September 2018, when three teenage boys fled the facility and were charged with vehicle theft and aggravated assault and kidnapping of a facility employee.

In the recording, Woods seemed to try and soften the incident, saying that the oldest of the boys felt he had to "rescue" his girlfriend who had recently been discharged from the facility, adding later that "you're always going to have the 17-year-old boy who does something stupid" and that every facility has patients who flee secretly.

On several occasions throughout the meeting, Woods said the facility had experienced a significant decrease in incidents over the past year and a half because of staffing changes and selective acceptance of applicants due to the facility's inability to serve patients of a certain acuity.


Call records provided to The Daily Times by the Blount County E-911 Center confirmed this claim of a significant decrease in call quantity to the facility from August 2017 to last month, with 60 calls compared to the 18 months prior (February 2016 to July 2017), with 96 calls.

One unidentified resident at the meeting told Woods that Acadia should strive for zero patient elopements, and that anything else was unacceptable.

"This is the real world and the reality is it's going to happen on any campus," Woods said. "We have had a dramatic, sharp decrease of incidents on this facility over the last year and a half, and we want to work to a zero (elopements) point. ... But I'm not gonna stand here and tell you that between now and 18-24 months from now there will no longer be a problem on our campus."

The same call data, however, seemed to emphasize the severity of facility incidents.

Incidents since 2016



This graph shows the 160 incidents listed in the Village Behavioral Health Treatment Center call records from the Blount County E-911 center from Jan. 3, 2016 to Feb. 7, 2019.

Among the 160 incidents listed in the log (Jan. 3, 2016 to Feb. 7, 2019), many are follow-ups, probation and other innocuous calls, but the most common call is for missing juveniles, with 43 such incidents in the three-year range. There were also 10 assaults, five disturbances and four thefts reported.

Woods attempted to downplay the negatives, citing a committee of "some number" of neighbors who have had "strong feelings of opposition" and some that had "very strong support" toward the facility.

The resident rebutted Wood's idea there was a measure of support for the property, saying that neighbors not directly impacted would "obviously" care less.

"If (my property) wasn't directly joining your property, I wouldn't be directly impacted and I'd be like 'what are these people complaining about," he said. "The fact is The Village is set up for a summer camp, not an inpatient facility."

"There are a number of facilities that look exactly like this in terms of their structure," Woods responded. "But they tend to be, for sure, more wilderness."

"The thing is we don't have peninsula hospital patients running around our neighborhood," the resident said.

Woods said that he would have facility management regularly meet with the community for the duration of the center's Louisville stay and that staffing changes such as shorter shifts should help cut down on issues. He conceded that Acadia's priorities remain patients first, staff second and community third.

New facility

Woods said the new facility near Riverbend in Knox County would not face the same kinds of problems because of a scarcity of neighbors.

"It's currently zoned (as an) agricultural area, so there's not a lot around," Woods said. "It keeps us out of residential areas or even areas that are likely to become residential in the future."

Woods touts a nearby nature reserve and proximity to the highway as additional perks of the new location, which will begin to accept a wider range of patients.

"When there are kids, and they are kids under 18, put in your care, you have to have control and responsibility, and they can't be roaming freely, whether they're out in the country or in the middle of town," the resident added.

"We don't disagree," Woods responded.

When asked by a neighbor what would become of the current facility, Woods speculated.

"I think it's probably safe for me to say that Covenant does not have an appetite to reinvigorate that campus for that same purpose," Woods said. "I don't think that there probably is any health care provider who would look at that property and think it is viable without doing a complete rebuild."

Woods declined to be interviewed for this story, but provided a written statement on the relocation saying it "will allow Villages to continue its mission and to expand services for patients with varying levels of care intensity requirements.

"When completed, the new facility is expected to improve access to desperately needed care and treatment," the statement reads. "Village Behavioral Health is committed to providing care that meets the needs of its patients and community. We are proud of our 10 year history and the thousands of lives that have been improved by that care and treatment."

If they should leave their area, they have only to hop on a nearby train track to get out of the area quickly or try to hurt themselves. This is not a good location for this facility.










Dear Planning Commission,

My name is Alex & I am writing about the Acadia Healthcare juvenile behavioral health & drug/alcohol treatment center that is being proposed for 4937 Wise Springs Rd. Ben Mullins & members of Acadia Healthcare met with the community on August 10th to help us understand what they are proposing to do with land & answer questions. After this meeting I am left with even more questions & concerns about this type of facility becoming part of our community. My first question is why the facility is only having to meet the requirements for assisted living when the plans submitted by Acadia cleary describe a rehabilitation center? The best explanation I received is assisted living is the closest description under Knox County ordinance to what this facility is going to provide.

I reside at 4717 Wise Springs Rd & this facility will have an impact on my family. My biggest concern is safety for my own family & my neighbors. Acadia explained this would be a new, updated facility & different from the current "Village" facility in Louisville, TN however the only difference seems to be that the staff will have key cards to enter/exit the front of the cottages & the patients will only be allowed to exit the back of the cottages into a fenced courtyard. While this is an improvement from the layout they currently have in Louisville it doesn't change the fact that escaped patients roaming around the neighboring properties have been the number one source of complaints from the current location. After speaking with residents of Jones Bend Rd where the current facility is located they told us escaped patients were a weekly occurrence, there have been cases of assault & in one instance a group of patients stole a counselors vehicle in order to flee the facility. Acadia confirmed patients from "The Village" would be transferred to the new Wise Springs facility. These patients are not only from Tennessee but around the country, they will be curious as to what is on the outside of this facility which is our homes.

While the main courtyard may have a fence, the area they are wanting to use for nature trails, animal therapy, fishing ponds & outdoor activities has no barrier around it. This is very unsettling as a homeowner that these patients could walk off Acadia's property & be in one of our backyards in a matter of seconds. We all have children & animals that are our main priority just like Acadia states these patients are their main priority. As of now Acadia has no plans to put any barrier around the property line, when we asked about a privacy fence, like the one the are using to enclose the main courtyard, on the property line an Acadia representative responded by saying that was not something they were considering at this time but it could be looked into if issues were to occur. If this facility is approved I beg a condition of this approval be that Acadia must put a solid security/privacy fence at least 12 feet around the entire 40+ acre property. I feel this additional buffer between the facility & the community should give everyone added comfort that the patients will remain on their property.

Another concern is that this facility will be next door the Knox County Sherriffs Office regional training center & shooting range. The sound from the shooting range is very loud & happens several days a week, throughout the day. Acadia said multiple times they are striving to provide these patients with a serene, peaceful environment especially for school studies & therapy sessions. This shooting range is not conducive to provide that environment especially for children who are already struggling with mental health, anxiety & other disorders this facility will treat. In fact, after the meeting the adolescent psychiatrist who was there on Acadia's behalf approached a neighbor to express her concern over the firing range being such a prominent fixture & the effect it would have on the children.

I applaud Acadia for wanting to help challenged youth however I whole heartedly believe there is a property that would better suit their needs than 4937 Wise Springs Rd. A property with acreage & no family homes or even property in a commercial setting would be ideal for them. A residential area that only has the potential to become more residential like Wise Springs is not the place for them.

I want to thank you for your time & all I ask is that you really give this case attention & ask if our community is the right fit for this facility or if another property would better serve them & the needs of their patient's.

To whom it may concern,

My name is Chase and I live on Wise Springs Road in Northeast Knox County. I am reaching out to you regarding the proposed use of review for 4937 Wise Spings Road. We have some what we consider major concerns.

We attended the re-zoning meeting back earlier in the year and voiced our concerns then. We have learned a great deal more about what is to be developed in our backyard. A lawyer representing Acadia Healthcare reached out to me and asked to meet with members of the community either August 10th or 11th to answer questions and address concerns. We are not used to this sort of thing but we happily agreed. The use of review notice came shortly after. With only seventy-two hours to absorb the information Acadia provided, I dont believe the community got a fair deadline to voice their concerns to the Planning Commission. We were unsure of what we were dealing with until we were able to meet with Acadia.

One of the key concerns we have with this proposed residential treatment facility is the lack of perimeter fencing. We pleaded with them to build a privacy fence along the property lines to not only give the neighbors a peace of mind, but also Acadia if another major incident occurs. They pushed back and stated that a wall would only be built if they felt it was necessary or if an issue were to arise. Acadia unfortunately has gained a reputation in the past few years regarding escapes, assaults, theft, fraud, etc... I urge you to investigate the following link:

In that article, the division president was quoted in regards to escapees as "This is the real world and the reality is it's going to happen on any campus". This does not make the surrounding community feel safe. Home should be a safe place and nobody wants to have to constantly be on alert while enjoying their lives at home. They claim that they have a system in place to notify neighbors if there is a major incident but we spoke with the residents living in proximity of their current facility on Jones Bend Road in Louisville, Tennessee and they stated that Acadia isn't very proactive about Alerting the community properly.

The next major concern may be the most serious. Roughly 1000 feet West of where this facility is to be built is the Knox County Sheriff's Office Regional Training Academy. I have lived on the same plot of land my entire life and there are some days that the Sheriff's Office uses the firing range all day. Many times a week. On some days it will actually wake me up if I decide sleep in. I can't see the benefit of treating children with anxiety and emotional issues while there are live fire exercises being conducted just beyond the trees. It should be noted that at the community meeting with Acadia that they were completely aware of the firing range. One of their representatives, a psychologist, pulled some of us aside and expressed great concern over the gunfire. She urged us to press the matter with her colleagues

I personally believe we should give our children with special needs the best care we possibly can. I am not against a facility of this type. I just do not believe Wise Springs Road is the best location to properly treat our youth with these types of behavioral needs. This also very out of character with the surrounding area.

Please, I strongly urge the commission to **Disapprove** the proposed use of review for case file 8-C-20-UR.

Louisville behavior health center to relocate after assaults, neighborhood concerns

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In a recording of the meeting provided to The Daily Times by a neighborhood resident, Woods said Acadia will move over the next 18-24 months to a more fit location in Knox County.

"We recognize that it would be beneficial to these patients and even to our business interests and to your community that we move this facility to a new location," Woods told an audience of around 10. "All in all, it'll be about an 18-month turnaround."

Woods said the company was investing \$35 million to purchase property and build a new facility rather than investing in the property they currently lease from Covenant Healthcare on Jones Bend Road because, as a clinician, he does not think the Louisville location is viable.

"My assessment was almost immediately 'this has to change," Woods said. "Anybody who preceded me with respects to corporate leadership, their point of view may have been different. ... It would be in our interest to build there if it made sense to build there, because we already have the land, but it's just not appropriate."

Incidents:

The current facility, at the end of Jones Bend Road, is a residential behavioral center for low- to midacuity juvenile patients and is composed of a series of cabins and small buildings on the shore of Fort Loudon Lake, neighboring a residential community.

With no fencing or discernable border between the cabins and the community, many neighbors have been victims of or irritated by juvenile runaways and related crimes over the years.

The long-standing concern resurfaced in September 2018, when three teenage boys fled the facility and were charged with vehicle theft and aggravated assault and kidnapping of a facility employee.

In the recording, Woods seemed to try and soften the incident, saying that the oldest of the boys felt he had to "rescue" his girlfriend who had recently been discharged from the facility, adding later that "you're always going to have the 17-year-old boy who does something stupid" and that every facility has patients who flee secretly.

On several occasions throughout the meeting, Woods said the facility had experienced a significant decrease in incidents over the past year and a half because of staffing changes and selective acceptance of applicants due to the facility's inability to serve patients of a certain acuity.


Call records provided to The Daily Times by the Blount County E-911 Center confirmed this claim of a significant decrease in call quantity to the facility from August 2017 to last month, with 60 calls compared to the 18 months prior (February 2016 to July 2017), with 96 calls.

One unidentified resident at the meeting told Woods that Acadia should strive for zero patient elopements, and that anything else was unacceptable.

"This is the real world and the reality is it's going to happen on any campus," Woods said. "We have had a dramatic, sharp decrease of incidents on this facility over the last year and a half, and we want to work to a zero (elopements) point. ... But I'm not gonna stand here and tell you that between now and 18-24 months from now there will no longer be a problem on our campus."

The same call data, however, seemed to emphasize the severity of facility incidents.

Incidents since 2016

Among the 160 incidents listed in the log (Jan. 3, 2016 to Feb. 7, 2019), many are follow-ups, probation and other innocuous calls, but the most common call is for missing juveniles, with 43 such incidents in the three-year range. There were also 10 assaults, five disturbances and four thefts reported.

Woods attempted to downplay the negatives, citing a committee of "some number" of neighbors who have had "strong feelings of opposition" and some that had "very strong support" toward the facility.

The resident rebutted Wood's idea there was a measure of support for the property, saying that neighbors not directly impacted would "obviously" care less.

"If (my property) wasn't directly joining your property, I wouldn't be directly impacted and I'd be like 'what are these people complaining about," he said. "The fact is The Village is set up for a summer camp, not an inpatient facility."

"There are a number of facilities that look exactly like this in terms of their structure," Woods responded. "But they tend to be, for sure, more wilderness."

"The thing is we don't have peninsula hospital patients running around our neighborhood," the resident said.

Woods said that he would have facility management regularly meet with the community for the duration of the center's Louisville stay and that staffing changes such as shorter shifts should help cut down on issues. He conceded that Acadia's priorities remain patients first, staff second and community third.

New facility

Woods said the new facility near Riverbend in Knox County would not face the same kinds of problems because of a scarcity of neighbors.

"It's currently zoned (as an) agricultural area, so there's not a lot around," Woods said. "It keeps us out of residential areas or even areas that are likely to become residential in the future."

Woods touts a nearby nature reserve and proximity to the highway as additional perks of the new location, which will begin to accept a wider range of patients.

"When there are kids, and they are kids under 18, put in your care, you have to have control and responsibility, and they can't be roaming freely, whether they're out in the country or in the middle of town," the resident added.

"We don't disagree," Woods responded.

When asked by a neighbor what would become of the current facility, Woods speculated.

"I think it's probably safe for me to say that Covenant does not have an appetite to reinvigorate that campus for that same purpose," Woods said. "I don't think that there probably is any health care provider who would look at that property and think it is viable without doing a complete rebuild."

Woods declined to be interviewed for this story, but provided a written statement on the relocation saying it "will allow Villages to continue its mission and to expand services for patients with varying levels of care intensity requirements.

"When completed, the new facility is expected to improve access to desperately needed care and treatment," the statement reads. "Village Behavioral Health is committed to providing care that meets the needs of its patients and community. We are proud of our 10 year history and the thousands of lives that have been improved by that care and treatment."

Members of the Commission, my wife and I are providing you with thoughts, considerations and concerns regarding the proposed case 8-C-20-UR, Residential Treatment Center in PR (Planned Residential) District 8. We realize the Thursday, August 13 commission meeting relates to the applicant meeting the requirements of zoning requirements and any stipulations the commission sets on the applicants.

We first wish to state the need throughout Tennessee for youth treatment centers. The crisis of drugs and alcohol with today's youth is of vital concern. The impact of our youth dealing with these issues reaches beyond the child and tears at the family structure and our community.

Regarding this proposed treatment center, we believe it can provide the overall support to youth, however, we are concerned about the procedure followed thus far and to specifics within the proposal.

First, our community received word of this proposal on July 30 not from the applicant nor from the Planning Commission. We received word from a homeowner in the local area who mailed out a notice to all concerned residents. The earliest a community meeting with the applicants could be arranged was Monday, August 10. At that meeting residents met with an attorney working with Acadia Healthcare, the director of the treatment residential facility, and one of the professional staff. Other individuals, although not presenting, included the architects. It was at this meeting that we were informed about the Planning Commission meeting on Thursday, August 13.

The short timeframe for the residents to study, prepare and address questions and concerns was insufficient. The approval of this application should be postponed for 30 days until further community discussions can be held with members of Acadia Healthcare.

These members of Acadia Healthcare informed us of the new facility needs, program overview, staffing structure, and basics about the residents and how they are evaluated. Following their presentation, the program was open to questions. These questions pertained primarily to design, safety, security, and potential impacts to residents and their property.

From questions we and other residents asked has left my wife and I with the following concerns.

- 1. No mention of prior issues with Acadia's Village facility were mentioned although questions focused on Acadia's Village facility were raised concerning why not just expand that facility. Indeed, we were informed by one of our residents that there were serious issues with Acadia's Village facility in 2019 including staff selling drugs to residents, escaped juveniles, and assaults. The history of a residential treatment facility run by Acadia leaves us with further questions about how Acadia will organize this facility and programs differently than they did at the Village facility.
- 2. Studies on youth alcohol and drug rehab facilities show a strong need for positive support and best practices for recovery and growth of the youth. This means eliminating negative disruptions including the sounds of violence. It was pointed out to the applicants that the Knox County Sheriff's office has a firearm target range near the proposed residential treatment facility. Law enforcement frequently uses this target range which produces loud, sharp sounds heard a mile or more away. My wife and I did not feel the applicants appreciated this concern although there is sufficient information supporting this concern.
- 3. The actual footprint of the proposed facility and surrounding area became clear after further discussion. The concerns were raised about the proposed fencing around the facility itself, surrounding the grounds, cottages, and center administrative building. Many residents focused the need for fencing the complete land boundary. This was met by hesitation and avoidance by the applicants.
- 4. The concern was raised that Acadia Healthcare needs to make a profit on this facility; as any business must. According to the applicants this facility will be limited to 144 residents (although the application states 216 maximum), 8 cottages (although the application states 12 maximum), and a 1:4 staff to resident ration to ensure maintaining structure and safety. If additional residents are accepted to help meet revenue needs, will Acadia maintain the 1:4 ratio or will that ratio change to 1:6 or higher? This is an important consideration for residents to feel confident Acadia Healthcare has addressed the problems incurred at the Village residential facility.

There are many issues yet to discuss regarding this incredibly important facility. For this to succeed, we need to meet with Acadia Healthcare and discuss these issues. Your approval to delay approving this application is particularly important to us all.

As a resident of Wise Springs Rd, I have a few concerns on the development of 4739 Wise Springs Rd as a Resident Rehabilitation Facility.

To begin with, I think the need for a facility of this nature is needed for the children in Knoxville and surrounding area. I do not think the area on Wise Springs is the best location for this type of facility.

My concern for the residents of this facility consist of the fact that the children in this facility have a variety of issues. This area is less than a mile from the Regional Training Firing Range which is used 6 days a week. This gun fire is live rounds of ammunition that goes on for hours each day. I cannot understand how this type of environment is best for adolescents that are in a facility for Mental, Emotional and Behavioral Disorders.

When meeting with Acadia, the violence, assaults and elopements from various types of facilities ran by Acadia was addressed. The only thing that Acadia will say is that the facility in Blount County cannot be compared. They also stated that some of those residents could be moved to the site on Wise Springs. Moving the patients from one location to another is not going to solve the issues without addressing the real problem, which in this case would be proper security for the residents and adjacent property owners. They have no plans for perimeter fencing around the entire facility.

If Acadia wants to come into our neighborhood and build a facility of this type, it seems to me as though they would want to make the neighbors feel secure and have the concerns of all parties involved in their best interest.

All the security concerns voiced by the community meeting with Acadia were met with resistance and the comment made "that fencing is not needed". The statement was made that if a fire alarm was pulled that only the back doors would unlock to the courtyard and there would be no outside access. I have enough experience in healthcare to know that when a fire alarm is pulled all doors are required to open which would allow the residents free access to outside of the facility.

As a lifelong resident of this community I have the right to feel safe on my property. Our fears are fact based on articles published by the Maryville Times in February, 2019.

Please consider the concerns of the community when considering this facility for approval for being in our backyard.

This email is regarding the Use of Review agenda item 8-C-20-UR.

I would like to take the time to identify some concerns regarding the Acadia Healthcare juvenile residential treatment facility proposed for the 4937 Wise Springs Rd location. This information was collected from a community meeting that Acadia held at Union Baptist Church on 8/10/2020.

- 1. **Patient well-being** the attendees at this meeting identified that the selection of this location, was not selected with the patients care in mind. Rather the location was selected more for as an inexpensive financial opportunity. This location is susceptible to a large amount noise generated from the Law Enforcement firing range directly adjacent to the proposed property. Among the attendees at the meeting were certified medical personnel. They identified that the loud continuous noise which persist on a daily basis generated from the firing range, will more than likely hinder the treatment of the patients who have been diagnosed with the behavioral problems that Acadia has stated will receive treatment. It was also stated that the level of noise generated from the firing range is likely to cause more damage to the mental state of the expected patients.
- 2. **Location** the surrounding community is not in favor of this location. The adjacent property landowners have stated privacy and safety concerns that have happened at the previous facility, and still have the potential to arise at this facility. This is due to the unsatisfactory "Security Upgrades" that Acadia stated that they will install at the new facility. When asked about these "Security Upgrades" they stated that they will only have a fence and locks on the doors. The level of security measures that have been identified as "Upgrades" can, and more than likely will be bypassed with a little of coordination from the patients not wanting to remain there. This ultimately puts an additional risk to the safety of the patients and the surrounding neighbors.
- 3. **Staffing / Professional care** The staffing ratio that was identified by Acadia will be 1 staff member to 4 patients with the majority of the staff requiring no more than a high school diploma. The majority of staff that has been identified at the Louisville facility was proven not to be adequate enough to handle the level of care and attention that these type of patients need. According to the Acadia representative the same staffing ratio is supposed to be adequate for activities that will take place on the outside of the "Security Fence" on the 30 plus acre property. Allowing uninterrupted access to the adjoining properties. In some instances, the "staff" that Acadia has employed at the Louisville facility has been mistaken for escaped patients. When the neighboring homeowners contacted the facility with a description of the individual trespassing on their property, the personnel on duty stated that it was one of their employees. This possibly identifies that Acadia employs individuals that display a lack of professionalism. There is a certain level of professionalism necessary when treating patients requiring positive emotional support as well as professional medical attention. There were other examples of there being lack of professionalism that were identified during the meeting, however I was unable to record all that was being said. One community member did stress the information that was being displayed on the popular social media platforms by current staff members were labeled as disgusting and disrespectful. Acadia representatives held this meeting with the agenda to convince the community that Acadia is a professional healthcare facility with the main focus being on the well-being of the patients in their care. However the only message that was clear to myself, and the majority of the community that were in attendance at this meeting was that Acadia is a company/business who may provide care to some troubled youth however there priority is appears to be on the business side focusing on making a profit. This is evident through the staff selection/screening process and the lack of willingness to upgrade the security level necessary to adequately protect the patients and the surrounding community.

Tennessee is a large state and there is more than likely a more suitable location available away from any community that will suit the needs of a facility like this. I urge the Knox County Planning Commission to deny this location or any other location within this community.

I also want to thank you for the opportunity to express my concern of the proposed location.

My name is Meghann Howard. My address is 4921 Wise Springs Rd. My family and I share a property line with the proposed facility of 8-C-20-UR. If you are not familiar with Acadia Health systems and their previous facilies, I ur ge you, please, research. It is my opinion, moving forward with this Use of Review will be detrimental to the community. The community had the opportunity to meet with representaves of Acadia Health and voice concerns.

Although there are mulple concerns, I will try to keep this personal to me. It is known that Acadia Health is relocang this facility from Louisville, Tn. Some of our community members have had the opportunity to speak to owners of adjoining properes regarding any issues they had with the juvenile facility located there. To list a few: The, assault, and tr espassing. Acadia repeatedly states the proposed facility on Wise Springs will be different. That we cannot compare this facility to the previous. However, what they fail to ever menon is, theav operated the previous facility and were unable to make necessary safety correcons. Ther e was not a fence at the previous facility, and their soluon is onea fence around the compound with some landscape. We have begged and pleaded as a community for a perimeter fence around the enr e property. The response we were met with, "We would consider that if there was ever an occurrence or elopement." I will not tolerate an atude of "somea thing is be. er than nothing." With 30 million dollars allo Aed to this property there is no reason Acadia cannot take an ounce of prevenon. I haave a 2 year old with a TERMINAL DIAGNOSIS, my child and my family are my first priority. I have always taken extra measure to get ahead of potenal prooblems. Acadia has a responsibility of making all of these neighboring properes a priority as well.

I cannot understand categorizing this plan under Assisted Living. They do not meet the Knox County Zoning ordinance definion of assis ted living. Can I get some clarificaon? Ther e will not be any type of perimeter security. There is no security plan for immediately nof ying adjoining properes of an elopemen t. We will be given the opportunity to sign up for text alerts. TEXT ALERTS?! I am quoted 60 feet from compound fence to my fence. 60 FEET. My yard would be one of the first places to flee. This compound is surrounded by 600 acres of farm land. There are so many places a child could get hurt or hide. This brings up liability quesons as well. Hopefully someone else will address this. There are cases pertaining to escapees geng hurt and Ac adia suing.

This facility will also back up to the Knox County firing range. This facility trains individuals from all over Tennessee. We have sound clips of the shoong r ange from our back porch. I do not believe anyone could approve this locaon in g ood conscience. These are juveniles with co morbidies . Ac adia's mission claims they are trying to provide a calm/serene environment for their paen ts. It was concerning enough for the psychiatrist with Acadia(she was not aware this firing range existed) to approach me a. er the meeng , deeply concerned about this environment. She has urged the community to emphasize the dangers with this. I spoke to Tommy Spangler; he stated no one has approached him with any of these plans. I can't imagine they haven't contacted someone in the sheriff's office. Blount County Sheriff's office handled hundreds of calls regarding this facility and their paen ts. Why weren't they the first people Acadia reached out to? I hope I've been misinformed. Repeang pas t mistakes is not tolerable. Acadia representav es were not aware of the firing range! The safety, both mental and physical, of the paen ts must be thought about in more detail than this.

There are also concerns with decline in property value. Will we be responsible for paying a maintenance fee for the sewer line coming in? This facility is not compable with the curr ent neighborhood. When there is an occurrence, and a mandatory prescribed hospital stay is ordered, or worse, an injured paen t, we are far from Children's Hospital.

I hope you will truly consider the lack of communicaon and responsibility from Acadia regarding this facility. I cannot imagine hearing delivery trucks, semis, visitors, etc all day. I do not want to see or hear anything from the neighboring property. Digging down a 20% grade and adding shrubbery is not acceptable. The only acceptable measure for a company that has this track record in lack of safeguards is to relocate to an area with more accessibility to security and less access to "elope and hide". If we are unfortunate enough that they build here we, as a community, have to "demand" perimeter fencing. Our fear is fact based.

Mental health facility locaons haave declined significantly over the last 10 years. I am hands on paen t care daily. I see how my paen ts are impacted when they can't get the care they need. As a parent, I may need a facility like this for my child one day. I am on board with plans for a treatment facility in an area more populated/closer to a hospital. Let's not pretend this something it isn't. This is not a posh luxury country getaway for troubled teens. It is a treatment facility. It is NOT assisted living. Please do not put my family or any paen t in an avoidable situaon.

I would also like to know if recovery homes have to be a certain linear footage from a bus stop. I cannot find this informaon. The adjoining property is a bus stop. And if they are required to be a certain distance away, will the use of review as assisted living allow them to disregard this bus stop? Thank you for reading all the way through.

To Whom it May Concern:

I am a resident of the community where this proposed residential youth treatment facility will be built. I attended the meeting at Union Baptist Church on the evening of August 10, 2020 to hear the representatives from Acadia, their engineers and attorney speak about the development. Based upon their statements, I don't understand the logic for attempting to build the facility on this property. Many residents raised the issue of the firing range next door and the gun noises heard throughout the day. That is obviously a concern, but based on Acadia's representation that they want the children to feel at home, as if they're not confined to a prison, and they want them to be able to participate in hiking and equine therapy on portions of the property, which are not fenced, it seems to me that they need a larger property. I feel that they would be better accommodated on a property of 200+ acres, allowing room for their residences, school, eating and nursing facilities, as well as plenty of outdoor space for activities. In a setting of that nature, fencing would not be the issue it is in this particular location, where neighbors are directly alongside the facility property lines. We were told that this facility will house mostly residents from across the state of TN (70%) with an additional 15% from North Carolina and the remaining 15% from across the country. If this is a national program, why not put it in a more accommodating location with lots of open space and acreage for the students to obtain treatments without having neighbors, noise and distraction so close by?

The representatives also stated that they take measures to screen applicants through extensive background checks and that their residents do not have behavioral problems. I find this to be a false statement after reading this article, published just last year: https://www.thedailytimes.com/news/louisville-behavior-health-centerto-relocate-after-assaults-neighborhood-concerns/article_523be3b2-98ce-5ea6-afdf-028e94103b9e.html. I do understand that the former facility did not have proper safety accommodations, which in itself boggles my mind. However, I believe that the Acadia representatives presented false information when they stated that these youth do no present behavioral issues. Additionally, it is not farfetched to believe that one or more youth could overpower a caregiver, take their key card and abscond from the facility.

I understand that the youth will be outside the fenced portion of the property for hiking and equine therapy and will take off-site excursions with staff members at a ratio of 1 staff member per 4 children. I further understand that the staff member escort will simply be a person with a high school diploma or equivalent who has received 2 weeks of training. Apparently these positions are mostly filled by college students working part time jobs. I foresee many problems with this scenario as 4 children could easily overpower their staff person or, if one or more decided to escape, that staff person would not be equipped to immediately recover them.

The community implored Acadia to delay this vote, and they declined. During this time of COVID, people cannot attend an in-person meeting. The meeting being held on Zoom truly limits many people. We will have representation from 2 community members, who will receive a total of 5 minutes to present their position. Additionally, most community members were completely unaware of this entire development. Had it not been for the immediate neighbors notifying a few property owners, no one would have known at all. I personally only learned about it when I heard a meeting was being held at my church. I had to go online and find all the plans and information about Acadia for myself.

Acadia informed us at the meeting that this is their Plan A; they have no Plan B. If this is to be built – and since no one in our community of hard-working, middle class people has any connections, money or power to get this vetoed - we at least deserve all the safety precautions possible. However, when I asked that they at least put up an additional fence – one along the perimeter of the property – I was told they would address that if the need arose. Well, if the need arises, it will be too late.

Many of our children ride the bus to and from school. Many, mine included, are often home for a portion of the day alone (and all day on days that the school is not open for in-person instruction). As parents, we do not want the additional worry that some child has escaped these confines and run in the direction of homes where our children are defenseless and alone. Would any of you want that for YOUR children? I think not. Acadia's attorney mentioned that he would have no problem living in our area or even next door to this facility or one like it, but his wife wouldn't allow him to move from West Knoxville. I dare say that she would also not allow him to live next door to a facility of this nature. They would likely not put their own children at risk, and I seriously doubt any of you would.

I understand that the current owners of the property are threatening our community; they are making statements that, if we do not accept this and go along with this proposal, they will accept an offer from a developer of Section 8 housing. The current owners don't live directly in this area, so this doesn't concern them. They are obviously in this just for the money. However, now that the community is becoming aware (and no, most people still don't even know about this, but with more time, we could see to it that they did), the community would also rally against Section 8 housing. That, too, would have to come before the Commission.

Much was discussed in terms of property values. Statements were made that this would not lower our values. I dare say that the people directly touching this property would have substantially lower values and would have significant trouble should they ever attempt to sell their properties. Smithbilt purchased the land across the street from the property at issue. I now wonder if they will build lower cost homes since many people who could afford higher priced homes would not want to be right across from this facility. So in those terms, yes, our values will be brought down. The representatives also pointed out the Florence Crittenton Agency and the values around that institution. It seems that the development out there is mostly commercial, however, that is a home for girls, most of whom I believe are pregnant. This facility will house both boys and girls. As a mother of a preteen daughter, I do not like the thought of boys potentially escaping the facility and coming to my home where my daughter may be home alone.

I believe that residents of our community feel very let down by the planning commission. We have no real hospitals in our area; they are all downtown or in West Knoxville. We have no real retail to speak of. We have few restaurants; all of this industry is in West Knoxville. However, when you look for the enterprises that no

one wants, you stick them in our neighborhood. We already house the jail. We do not want the youth treatment facility as well. Additionally, we feel that this has been snuck in on us. We ask that you consider our positions, think about how you would feel if you lived beside this facility and had these concerns and vote against this proposal.

We met with about 30 neighbors last night to answer their questions about the development. I am enclosing the power-point presentation we shared with the neighbors. I would ask that this be included in the record and available for the planning commission for review prior to the meeting. I expect there to still be opposition and a push for postponement, but it was clear to me that any call for postponement is not because of the need to further review or discuss the item, but in hope that the delay may damage our chances of obtaining approval.

One issue that came up early was the Assisted Living Facility. Some of the neighbors believed that by reviewing this as an Assisted Living Facility instead of Group Boarding Home was intentional on our part and a way to avoid stricter review or state licensing. I addressed that last night relating to the differences in review under the Knox County Zoning Ordinance, and its definitions and standards versus the state licensing requirements that our facility is subject to (which is beyond the scope of this review) but it may still come up so I wanted to make you aware.



 - ► The main entrance to the property will have a key card access gate to prevent any entry of unauthorized individuals.
 - ► The youth will occasionally participate in activities in other parts of the property outside the cottages, courtyards, and main lodge. These activities will always be supervised by staff and include things such as use of the fishing ponds, walking trails, and other outdoor recreational activities.
 - Neighboring properties will be shielded from view with natural vegetation both preexisting and some areas where additional landscaping will be added during construction. Youth will always be supervised on the property.
















12 TYPICAL 18-BED PRTF COTTAGE CONCEPTUAL FLOOR PLAN

I am writing to express my concern regarding the proposed Acadia Healthcare Juvenile Residential treatment facility at 4937 Wise Springs Road. The proposed development is proposed as an "Assisted Living Facility" zoning/planning type due to the fact that there is nothing in the zoning ordinance that is more closely matched to what is being proposed. I find it hard to believe that there is not an ordinance that specifically defines the planning/zoning for a mental health treatment facility, given that there are and have been many in the city and state of Tennessee over the years. However, if that is what we have to work with the definition indicates that the facility provides room, board and non medical living assistance services appropriate to the resident's needs and medical services as prescribed by each resident's treating physician. However, it also states that the substantial majority are aged (55 and above- which I find offensive -LOL). The complex will be majority youth with precise psychological needs, not medical needs. While mental health is part of the overall medical health system, the method and delivery of the mental health provider is significantly different.

The proposal indicates that there will be minimal impact on the existing street system and will not draw substantial additional traffic in the area. However, it also states that there is an estimated traffic impact of 562 daily vehicle trips per day. This is a community setting with mostly large single family detached houses..as stated in the Neighborhood context of the Use on Review. When adding 562 daily vehicle trips to that type of community setting, that is a substantial additional traffic and impact.

The community also houses the Knox County Detention Facility within 1/2 mile of the proposed location as well as the training facility for Knox County Sheriff's office. The training facility conducts firing "drills" or something of the sort, daily and the sound is easily heard around the neighborhood. The noise is probably going to be a distraction for the youth when inside the Rehab facility, but it will definitely be a concern when they are in the courtyard or in the surrounding area of the facility.

This neighborhood has already been subjected to the nuances of the Detention facility and the Sherriff's office, and are on high alert every time there is a helicopter overhead because we wonder if someone has escaped, because if you have lived here long enough, you know that is how it works. I request that the Commission please take in consideration the request of the community in making their decision to approve or deny this request.

Planning Commission Members,

As a concerned resident of the Corryton Area, I am opposed to the development of the Behavior Health Center to be located on Wise Springs Rd. I attended the community meeting at Union Baptist Church on August 10 and the overwhelming consensus of those attending are against this project at this location. Here are the reasons why:

- It is in a residential area
- The amount of additional traffic (200 employees and visitors) is not conducive to the area. Traffic on Washington Pike is already getting quiet heavy for the highway as it exists.
- There are safety concerns about having that facility in close proximity to residential areas. Although, it is supposed to have a 14 ft. fence, residents are very skeptical.
- The whole approach has been a Public Relations disaster. The project has not been communicated broadly enough and well enough. Very few persons in our subdivision have had any knowledge of this project. Neither the commission nor Acadia can expect to hold a single community meeting with the decision to be made 3 days later without the community feeling that this is an attempt to fly under the radar and sneak this project through. It raises BIG TRUST ISSUES!
- Is also close to the target range of the Sheriff's Department where the deputies practice very often.

Commissioners:

One of the concerns raised was the lack of fencing along the property lines. Acadia has been looking at this issue since our meeting with the neighborhood on Monday and it is willing to add additional fencing and screen all the adjacent residential homes that are contiguous to the property. This diagram illustrates where that fencing would be located. It will be a minimum of a 6 ft wood privacy fence for 2,485 linear feet. We estimate a cost of \$45 per linear foot so the cost of the fencing would be approximately \$112,000 without consideration for site preparation and installation. Our discussions with some of the neighbors suggested our diagram would be a welcome compromise since the unfenced area would be away from residential neighborhoods and toward the detention facility in the north and north west. In the unlikely event of an elopement, it would also deter and funnel anyone away from the closest neighbors and toward less occupied areas.

Please consider this as a condition that may be added to the Use-on-Review approval to address some of the concerns raised.

Michelle,

Reading the comments of those opposed to the approval it will be difficult to adequately address every concern in the usual time allotted for discussion. To that end, I've prepared the brief response to the common-themes that appear in the comments and I would ask that this be included in the record and distributed to the Planning Commissioners prior to the meeting. I will try to keep my initial comments brief, but would ask to be recognized to address any specific questions the Commission may have after hearing all public input.

Location and Allowed Use in Zone:

As stated by the staff report, the area is Low Density Residential and adjacent to the Knox County Detention facilities. This property is tailor-made for the intended use because of the low-density character of the neighbors and its proximity to the county facilities (limiting contact to residential neighborhoods to the north). It is very rare to find property in LDR areas that have the required acreage, topography, and access to public sewer. At the time this property was rezoned, Acadia's interest in this property for this facility was not assured as the property owners and Acadia did not know how they could provide sewer access to the Property. Once that issue was resolved with KUB, Acadia could move forward with its design and concept.

The use is allowed in the PR zone. Prior to seeking rezoning, Acadia representatives met with County Codes, Gerald Green, Knox County Fire Marshal, and the Knox County Legal Department. It was the interpretation at that time that the use would meet the definition of Boarding Home for Sheltered Care. (with the 12 person duplex concept). As Boarding Home for Sheltered Care is not a use called for in any current County zone, Codes opined and interpreted its use would be allowed under the AG and PR zone (which allows Group day Care Homes) however, the PR zone would allow us the flexibility to cluster the dwelling units as opposed to each of them being located on a one-acre lot. This definition, and its allowance under both the PR and the AG zone, was specifically discussed at the February 13, 2020 Planning Commission meeting (where several neighbors appeared in opposition). Although the new head of Knox County Codes asked this be reviewed as an Assisted Living Facility (despite the elderly age requirement in the ALF definition) the standards for the use on review approval do not change, and the underlying use is still allowed under the current PR zone. Moreover, the local zoning definitions do not change the more stringent and specific State and Federal licensing requirements for the facility. As such, the Use on Review plan, as proposed, exceeds the standards for a use on review.

Licensing and Security:

Our facility as designed is regulated by the State Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities (https://publications.tnsosfiles.com/rules/0940/0940-05/0940-05-37.pdf) and, on a Federal level the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. It is also licensed through the Tennessee Department of Education and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). Our facility and program meets or exceeds the facility and security requirements of these state and federal organizations.

- All residents are vetted; admitted patients cannot have a history of major behavioral conditions, significant or violent crimes or behavior, and no sex offenders.
- At the level of treatment we are offering, our licensing only requires 1 Behavioral Health Technician per 8 residents during waking hours. We are committed to providing 1 BHT per 4 residents during this timeframe. Our internal standards on staff to resident ratio are twice that which is required. The BHT is only one type of staff member present for aiding supervision of the residents. There will be a full staff of licensed professionals with clinical training and experience at the facility. Representations by the neighbors to the contrary are false.
- At the level of treatment we are offering, perimeter fencing is not required. We are providing a 14 ft fence of the facilities and court yard.
- At the level of treatment we are offering, locked doors are not required. Our doors are locked. Staff Keycards are required for ingress and egress into the facility and into doors to the cottages. In case of an emergency, such as a fire, the doors would open to the interior courtyard and not to the parking lot.
- If residents are outside of the interior courtyard, cottages, or main complex, they will be supervised by at least one BHT and additional staff as required for the therapy session they are participating Also present on the facility will be therapists, teachers, psychologists, dieticians, and administrative staff. If a specific therapy is called for, such as equine therapy, there will be additional staff trained in that therapy method present in addition to the BHT. Finally, prior to being allowed outside the complex, they will have demonstrated progress in treatment to earn the additional privileges.
- While there is no guarantee there will not be elopements (even the Knox County Detention Faculty cannot make that guarantee) our industry research tells us that the type of facility Wise Springs is designed as can expect substantial reductions in elopements from other types of facilities with less security.
- The Use on Review is conditioned on landscaping buffering along the property lines of any adjacent residences.


Unfair Comparisons to the Village treatment facility:

- Acadia does not own the Village campus. It is owned by Covenant Health. Acadia inherited the existing facility and operational layout and took over operations. The Wise Springs facility is designed not just as a replacement for the Village in Louisville, but as a world class "campus" facility for the treatment of adolescents. Taking experiences learned not only at the Village, but from across the nation to design a "Class A" facility.
- There are no fencing and no locks at the Village. Anyone can drive up or away from to the cabins. It is bisected by a residential community. It is not designed as a secure and self-contained campus. Rather, as stated in the February 16, 2019 Daily Times Article, "The fact is The Village is set up for a summer camp, not an inpatient facility." Conversely, the Wise Springs facility is a state-of-the art inpatient residential treatment facility built upon a foundation of knowledge acquired through years of experience and expertise in the industry.
- It is expected that some patients treated at the Village will be transferred to Wise Springs. They will be moved to a better facility with increased security and treatment options.

Property Values:

Although the neighbors may have sincere beliefs and speculations that their property values will be affected, there is no material evidence to support this assertion. Similar facilities in the County, such as Florence Crittenden (which operates an in-patient alcohol and drug-treatment facility off of Dick Lonas Road, is zoned residential and surrounded by subdivisions. A review of the tax assessments for those properties do not reveal a blighted or depressed neighborhood. Incidentally, Florence Crittenden does not have a perimeter Another historical example is while Lakeshore was an inpatient psychiatric hospital, it was surrounded by some of the most valuable residential real estate in the County.

Firing Range:

The neighbors expressed concern over the proximity of the Sheriff's training facilities and shooting range. Some neighbors described it as a "war zone" and that it would be detrimental to the therapeutic treatment of the residents. I confirmed with the Knox County Sheriff's office that their training and firing range is open for operation Monday through Friday between the hours of 9 am to 4 pm. They have both indoor and outdoor training and firing ranges. At times there can be periods of continuous firearms training, but it does not occur "all-day, every-day." During the past year and a half of due diligence, Acadia representatives have been on the property dozens of times surveying and planning operations on the property during the operational hours of the Sheriff's training facility. Only sporadic gunfire was noted. therapist experts are taking this into account as part of their operations. Specific trauma will be known and specific modalities of treatment will be considered. During the operational hours of the Firing Range, the Wise Springs patients will be attending school in a 40,000 sq. foot building. Based on our research there is little concern on the detrimental affect on the well-being of our patients. This is an issue for the behavioral therapy experts to address in the best interest of its patients; however, if the proximity and sound were legitimate therapy concerns, this property would have been already eliminated by Acadia as an option. The fact is the specific conditions the residents will not be detrimentally affected by ambient noise from the firing range and this is not of concern, clinically or otherwise, for Acadia.

Legal Standards on Use on Review:

Local governments, like Knox County, lack the inherent power to regulate or control the use of private property within their boundaries. Their power is derived solely from the state though specific delegations of the General Assembly. 421 Corp. v. Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County, 36 S.W. 3d 469, 475 (Tenn. Ct. App. 2000); Cherokee County Club, Inc. v. City of Knoxville, 152 S.W.3d 466 (Tenn. 2004). As these laws and regulations are in derogation of common law and operate to deprive property owners of a use of their property which would otherwise be lawful, they are to be strictly construed by the courts in favor of the property owners' right to the free use of their property. Anderson County v. Remote Landfill Services, 833 S.W.2d 903 (Tenn. Ct. App 1991). Although local governments and administrative agencies have broad discretion when it comes to decisions involving local land-use matters, that discretionary authority must be exercised within existing standards and guidelines. McCallen v. City of Memphis, 786 S.E. 2d 633, 639 (Tenn. 1990)(emphasis added).

Specifically regarding the use-on-review process, the Court of Appeals has also stated "[w]hen a legislative body included a certain use within a given zone as a use on review, such a use is intended in that zone." Wilson County Youth Shelter v. Wilson County, 13 S.W.3d 338, 342 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1999) perm. app. denied (2000). The Wilson court went on to hold: "[t]his means that an applicant for such use cannot obtain the necessary permit to proceed with its plans without going through the appeal process as outlined in the Zoning Ordinance; but once the applicant goes through the process and the requested use satisfies all other pertinent regulations of the local zoning regulations, it must be granted." Id. at 342 (emphasis added).

The Court of Appeals previously held that the Knoxville City Council acted arbitrarily in reversing an MPC decision and denying the approval of a proposed commercial development's use-on-review plan in an RP-1 zone when the developer had complied with all the requirements of the zoning ordinance. Mullins v. City of Knoxville, 665 S.W. 2d 393 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1983) perm. app. denied (1984). In Mullins, the pretextual rationale for the City Council's denial was that the development "was not compatible" with the surrounding areas. Id. at 396. In finding the City Council in error in denying the development, this Court found that the zoning map showed similar commercial developments in the area; therefore, there was no material evidence to suggest that the use was incompatible with the surrounding areas. Id. This Court also found that the various other objections made by the neighbors were not supported by material evidence; therefore, the City Council's denial of the use on review was illegal, arbitrary and capricious. *Id.* at 396-397.

Unsubstantiated fears or speculations on the harm a proposed use may cause to occur do not rise to the dignity of material evidence and do not amount to a basis to deny a use-on-review. Sexton v. Anderson County, 587 S.W.2d 663, 666 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1979). Mere beliefs, opinions and fears of neighborhood residents, however sincerely held or believed, do not constitute material evidence. Id. at 666; Mullins v. City of Knoxville, 665 S.W.2d 393, 396 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1983).

Finally, one over-riding principal for administrative approval of a use-on-review remains: "[I]t is not the function of the board to conduct a referendum on public attitudes relative to [a] petition." Wilson County Youth Shelter v. Wilson County, 13 S.W.3d 342 (Tenn. Ct. App. 1999) (citing Sexton, at 664, n. 1) (emphasis added). If the proposed use meets the applicable standards then it must be granted. *Id*.

Conclusion:

The information provided by the applicant not only demonstrates that it is equal or exceeding the professional licensing and permitting requirements of the State and Federal agencies which provide oversight, it has provided more information than is normally required for a use on review. The Planning Department and the applicant has complied with the required notice requirements. Despite protests to the contrary, this is not being flown in under the radar through some underhanded or surreptitious process. Many of the same neighbors objecting today were present in February when the concept of a Boarding Home was first discussed before this body. The plans set forward are the product of several months of legal, medical, engineering, and architectural design. Just as in the case of Mullins v. City of Knoxville, there is a similar, and substantially more intense, facility in the area so there is not material evidence to suggest the development is incompatible with the surrounding area (which is a mix of LDR, agricultural, and institutional uses). If denied, there must be a material reason for the denial, articulated on the record, so that it can be corrected upon future application. Stating the use is not compatible is not sufficient in this instance. As our use meets the applicable standards, as opined by Planning Staff, it must be granted.

The applicant respectfully requests this matter not be delayed, deferred, or denied, but approved consistent with Staff's recommendation and the interpretation of Knox County Codes and that it be approved consistent with Staff's recommendation.

Addiction is no respecter of any person, regardless of their wealth, status, religion, or location. It can and does happen everywhere. Addiction is rampant and I believe there are few among us who can say they have not been affected by it in some way. Facilities can be helpful and are necessary in almost every community. With all that being said, I would not want to place anyone I cared about in an Acadia facility. In addition to the numerous problems at the Louisville, TN facility, several Acadia facilities across the country have issues of medicaid fraud, abuse, negligent care, sexual activity between staff and patients, assaults within the facilities, escaped patients and assaults on neighbors. Acadia paints a pretty picture of an upscale facility for this proposed location, but their history does not lead me to believe that they have patient care and safety as their top priority. Compromising on the safety and security of the patients will also increase the risk of the safety for the neighbors in the area. My concern is not with the fact that this is a behavioral and addiction treatment facility, but rather from a lack of confidence that sufficient security measures are in place to protect patients and neighbors; adequate staffing ratios, qualifications, experience, and training for their Behavioral Health Technicians; as well as reports of many problems within many Acadia facilities and the neighboring areas. Acadia pays \$17M settlement

Deal is largest for health care fraud in West Virginia history

Acadia Healthcare will pay \$17 million in what the Department of Justice says is the largest health care fraud settlement in the history of West Virginia.

The settlement resolves a lawsuit that accused the Franklin-based behavioral health care company of defrauding Medicaid of \$8.5 million through a lab testing scheme in seven of its drug addiction treatment centers in West Virginia.

From January 2012 through July 2018, the lawsuit alleged the Acadia centers used a California lab to conduct urine and blood analysis, then billed Medicaid directly for the services — paying the San Diego lab out-of-pocket for its services. According to a DOJ press release, Medicaid subsequently paid the facilities a "substantially higher amount" for these tests than what had actually been charged by the laboratory.

As part of the settlement, Acadia and its chain of clinics have entered into a five-year corporate integrity agreement with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services that requires the company to maintain a compliance program, implement a risk assessment program and hire an outside organization to review Medicaid claims.

"Fraudulent billing by these Acadia/CRC drug treatment clinics, as contended by the government, limits the State's ability to provide desperately needed addiction treatment services," Maureen Dixon, Special Agent in Charge of the Office of Inspector General of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Region including West Virginia, said in the release. "We will continue working with the U.S. Attorney and other law enforcement partners to protect government health programs, taxpayers, and importantly people who depend on these funds for vitally needed treatment."

The investigation was conducted by HHS-OIG, the Drug Enforcement Administration, West Virginia Medicaid Fraud Control Unite and members of the U.S. Attorney's Healthcare Fraud Abuse, Recovery and Response Team. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Alan McGonigal and Jennifer Mankins represented the federal government in the settlement.

Acadia recently reported that profits slid in the first quarter to \$29.5 million from more than \$50 million early last year, led mostly by personnel costs. The company's shares (Ticker: ACHC) closed at \$32.60 Tuesday, down nearly four percent from Monday. They are up more than 20 percent so far this year.

Acadia facility closes amid abuse allegations

Seven lawsuits have been filed against the company

A youth treatment center in New Mexico owned by Franklin-based behavioral health company Acadia Healthcare has been shut down amid egregious abuse allegations, multiple lawsuits and losing its certification from state regulators.

Seven lawsuits have been filed against the Desert Hills of New Mexico facility in Albuquerque and its parent company in the past month alleging the company failed to protect its clients from physical and sexual abuse from its workers and other patients. The suits cite internal fight clubs instigated by facility staff members, sex between staff and young patients, the unchecked spread of HIV among patients and excessive use of restraints on children — more than 30 times in 60 days, according to filings.

About 11 more lawsuits are expected to be filed in the next couple weeks, according to attorney Joshua Conway, who is representing plaintiffs in the seven cases already filed.

Acadia Healthcare officials did not respond to messages seeking comment for this story.

The Desert Hills facility had been struggling to stay open since late 2018, when the New Mexico Children, Youth and Families Department threatened to take away its license. The department worked with clinic leaders on options to rehabilitate the facility but ultimately decided not to extend its certification past April 1, according to notification sent to Desert Hills employees in late February.

"We don't feel like this was a treatment center anymore," CYFD Chief General Counsel Kate Girard told KOB 4. "It felt more like an institute."

The state's notice did not indicate whether Acadia would provide severance or assistance to the almost 300 employees who have lost their job. Desert Hills patients have been transferred to other facilities in the region.

Louisville behavior health center to relocate after assaults, neighborhood concerns

The Village Behavioral Health Treatment Center will relocate from Louisville to Knox County in the next two years following the adjoining neighborhood's unease over escaped juveniles, assaults and other incidents stemming from the juvenile residential facility.

On Jan. 29, Acadia Healthcare Division President Jeffrey Woods held a meeting with members of the public to discuss the company's plan to move the facility and address neighborhood concerns.

In a recording of the meeting provided to The Daily Times by a neighborhood resident, Woods said Acadia will move over the next 18-24 months to a more fit location in Knox County.

"We recognize that it would be beneficial to these patients and even to our business interests and to your community that we move this facility to a new location," Woods told an audience of around 10. "All in all, it'll be about an 18-month turnaround."

Woods said the company was investing \$35 million to purchase property and build a new facility rather than investing in the property they currently lease from Covenant Healthcare on Jones Bend Road because, as a clinician, he does not think the Louisville location is viable.

"My assessment was almost immediately 'this has to change," Woods said. "Anybody who preceded me with respects to corporate leadership, their point of view may have been different. ... It would be in our interest to build there if it made sense to build there, because we already have the land, but it's just not appropriate."

Incidents:

The current facility, at the end of Jones Bend Road, is a residential behavioral center for low- to midacuity juvenile patients and is composed of a series of cabins and small buildings on the shore of Fort Loudon Lake, neighboring a residential community.

With no fencing or discernable border between the cabins and the community, many neighbors have been victims of or irritated by juvenile runaways and related crimes over the years.

The long-standing concern resurfaced in September 2018, when three teenage boys fled the facility and were charged with vehicle theft and aggravated assault and kidnapping of a facility employee.

In the recording, Woods seemed to try and soften the incident, saying that the oldest of the boys felt he had to "rescue" his girlfriend who had recently been discharged from the facility, adding later that "you're always going to have the 17-year-old boy who does something stupid" and that every facility has patients who flee secretly.

On several occasions throughout the meeting, Woods said the facility had experienced a significant decrease in incidents over the past year and a half because of staffing changes and selective acceptance of applicants due to the facility's inability to serve patients of a certain acuity.


Call records provided to The Daily Times by the Blount County E-911 Center confirmed this claim of a significant decrease in call quantity to the facility from August 2017 to last month, with 60 calls compared to the 18 months prior (February 2016 to July 2017), with 96 calls.

One unidentified resident at the meeting told Woods that Acadia should strive for zero patient elopements, and that anything else was unacceptable.

"This is the real world and the reality is it's going to happen on any campus," Woods said. "We have had a dramatic, sharp decrease of incidents on this facility over the last year and a half, and we want to work to a zero (elopements) point. ... But I'm not gonna stand here and tell you that between now and 18-24 months from now there will no longer be a problem on our campus."

The same call data, however, seemed to emphasize the severity of facility incidents.

Among the 160 incidents listed in the log (Jan. 3, 2016 to Feb. 7, 2019), many are follow-ups, probation and other innocuous calls, but the most common call is for missing juveniles, with 43 such incidents in the three-year range. There were also 10 assaults, five disturbances and four thefts reported.

Woods attempted to downplay the negatives, citing a committee of "some number" of neighbors who have had "strong feelings of opposition" and some that had "very strong support" toward the facility.

The resident rebutted Wood's idea there was a measure of support for the property, saying that neighbors not directly impacted would "obviously" care less.

"If (my property) wasn't directly joining your property, I wouldn't be directly impacted and I'd be like 'what are these people complaining about," he said. "The fact is The Village is set up for a summer camp, not an inpatient facility."

"There are a number of facilities that look exactly like this in terms of their structure," Woods responded. "But they tend to be, for sure, more wilderness."

"The thing is we don't have peninsula hospital patients running around our neighborhood," the resident said.

Woods said that he would have facility management regularly meet with the community for the duration of the center's Louisville stay and that staffing changes such as shorter shifts should help cut down on issues. He conceded that Acadia's priorities remain patients first, staff second and community third.

New facility

Woods said the new facility near Riverbend in Knox County would not face the same kinds of problems because of a scarcity of neighbors.

"It's currently zoned (as an) agricultural area, so there's not a lot around," Woods said. "It keeps us out of residential areas or even areas that are likely to become residential in the future."

Woods touts a nearby nature reserve and proximity to the highway as additional perks of the new location, which will begin to accept a wider range of patients.

"When there are kids, and they are kids under 18, put in your care, you have to have control and responsibility, and they can't be roaming freely, whether they're out in the country or in the middle of town," the resident added.

"We don't disagree," Woods responded.

When asked by a neighbor what would become of the current facility, Woods speculated.

"I think it's probably safe for me to say that Covenant does not have an appetite to reinvigorate that campus for that same purpose," Woods said. "I don't think that there probably is any health care provider who would look at that property and think it is viable without doing a complete rebuild."

Woods declined to be interviewed for this story, but provided a written statement on the relocation saying it "will allow Villages to continue its mission and to expand services for patients with varying levels of care intensity requirements.

"When completed, the new facility is expected to improve access to desperately needed care and treatment," the statement reads. "Village Behavioral Health is committed to providing care that meets the needs of its patients and community. We are proud of our 10 year history and the thousands of lives that have been improved by that care and treatment."

I write this email to address the submittal for Acadia Healthcare and their proposed new facility.

As a homeowner, it is important for my community to have a sense of safety and the ability to enjoy living in our area... while also maintaining the value of my property. Our subdivision is in close proximity to the proposed facility... and puts our family in a potential financial and safety issue. This type of facility degrades our property value and puts our family and a high-level of concern for our wellbeing and safety. The behavioural center has a record of assaults and other misdemeanors that are NOT welcome in our community.

As a small business owner, this facility puts my business in direct jeopardy. It places us in a position to be forced to relocate so that we are not placing our team members, clients and consultants in a compromised security situation.

As a mom, this type of facility is completely unwelcome in my community. The safety of my children is number 1 priority. In the midst of a global pandemic... our home is our safe place... a place we can be well mentally, physically and emotionally. A place that we can enjoy life and enjoy our neighbors. Should this type of behaviour facility be approved, our quality of life in this neighborhood is directly breached and will encourage our friends and neighbors to relocate elsewhere and have yet a further impact on the taxes, economy and quality of life in this beautiful part of Knoxville.

I urge you to DISAPPROVE this type of facility for the safety, value and quality of life for our community.

- When Acadia was asked the question regarding the education of the 24/7 Behavioral Heath Technicians, this is staff to be in the cottages with the children at all times, we were informed that a high school graduate or college graduate with 40 hours education in how to deal with the children will be required by Acadia. We ask the question did the staff have any clinical experience in dealing with children with the type of issues Acadia is treating at the facility. The answer was no. As those who work in healthcare know, clinical experience is a must in treatment and dealing with these children who are in need of such treatment.



Review Statement of Assisted Living versus Recovery Treatment Center

Assisted living facility: A building, establishment, complex, or distinct part thereof which accepts aged persons, whom constitute a substantial majority of not less than eighty-five (85) percent of the facility population, for domiciliary care provided that residential units may be shared with a person under the age of fifty-five (55), if the head of household meets the definition of an aged person. The facility provides on-site to its residents, room, board, nonmedical living assistance services appropriate to the residents' respective needs, and medical services as prescribed by each resident's treating physician.

Recovery Housing: Housing for six (6) persons or more, with no limit on length of stay, that is occupied by the target population as defined below, and that is linked to on- or off-site services that assist the recovery housing residents in retaining the housing, improving his or her health status, and maximizing his or her ability to live and, when possible, work in the community.

Assisted living facilities are only subject to general use on review standards in section 6.50. Recovery Housing facility is subject to section 4.105. Recovery housing is much more detailed and address concerns and safeguards of the community and neighboring properties. Acadia has submitted their proposal as a Treatment facility.

APPROPRIATE LOCATION CONCERNS

- Center location:
- 3 miles from Ritta Elementary School
- 1 mile from Union Baptist Church Day Care
- Less than 1 mile from Home Day Care
- Less than .3 miles from Three Ridges Golf Course
- Less than .3 miles from Knox County Detention Center
- Directly adjacent to a Knox County School Bus Stop
- Approximately 5 miles from Interstate and 30 minutes from Children's Hospital Emergency access due to traffic to and from Residential Treatment Facility would be significantly delayed between 7:10 to 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 – 6:00 p.m. as Washington Pike is 2 lanes and the primary road access to the Residential Treatment Facility location.
- Located Directly Next to Knox County Sheriff's Regional Training Academy that includes a Live Active Firing Range

PATIENT CONCERNS & COMMUNITY CONCERNS

I. Per the Program Overview: The Residential Treatment Center and Alcohol and Drug Treatment Center will treat patients experiencing histories such as:

Trauma from physical, emotion, sexual abuse; Mood Disorders such as Depression, Bipolar Disorder, Anxiety; Behavioral Disorders; Family Problems - usually includes - Violence, Aggression, Defiance Disorders; Chemical Dependencies - Drug and Alcohol * which many of the above usually have multiple diagnosis.

Review of the literature indicates that the environment for these patients will need a stable, serene, safe, nurturing environment.

Speaking as a Registered Nurse with 40 years experience – Continuous GUN FIRE that can be all day long, sometimes 6 days a week, does not promote a sense of Safety, a Serene or Nurturing environment. The Environment of the proposed Residential Treatment Center is NOT conducive to meeting a therapeutic, nurturing or healing environment for any Residential Treatment Patient.

PATIENT CONCERNS & COMMUNITY CONCERNS

- II. Adjacent Landowner and Community Concerns: Acadia Health's previous issues at Jones Bend Road, referencing article with the Daily Times(1): "Louisville Behavior Health Center to relocate after assaults, neighborhood concerns" Article date: Feb 16, 2019.
- There were 160 incidents listed in the log from (Jan.3, 2016 to Feb, 7, 2019) with the most common call being missing juveniles. Approximately 43 missing incidents reported, 10 assaults, 5 disturbances, and 4 thefts. Acadia Healthcare Division President Jeffrey Woods stated in the article: "you're always going to have the 17 year old boy who does something stupid, and every facility has patients that flee secretly. This is the real world and reality is it's going to happen on any campus." In one incidence 3 male teenagers over powered a female employee who advised that the three boys assaulted her and then bound her escaping the facility(2).
- In the same article(1), Mr. Woods outlines the expectation that a new proposed facility would "keep them out of residential areas or even areas that are likely to become residential in the future". The current property is a residential area and Smith Built Homes does have plans to build a subdivision directly across from the proposed 4937 location. Why would Acadia plan to repeat their mistake by selecting a residential location?

Conclusion:

- Acadia states: Patient's First how would a medical corporation with licensed medical staff select a Recovery Treatment Center and Alcohol and Drug Center next to an Active Firing Range. If the Children's wellbeing is first, then each of you will need to decide is it right to subject children with these defined problems to the loud gun fire.
- Just as Acadia puts Patient's First, which includes safety, they are responsible for keeping the community people and our children First as well.
- The Community does not feel that Acadia Residential Treatment Center and Alcohol and Drug Center should be located at this location. However, if this review is passed, the Community does not feel that Acadia has addressed our security concerns as we do not desire any repeat incident of the "The Village". The community made the request in our meeting with Acadia, but met with resistance. The Community asks the Commission to enforce a 14 foot privacy perimeter fence around the entire property on the Acadia side.

We are in favor of all kinds of mental health treatment centers however, we have reservations about the placement of this facility on Wise Springs Rd. Our concerns are related to the size of the facility, it is much larger than we were originally led to believe. We also have concerns about the wear and tear and increased traffic that this construction will add to Washington Pike, which is already a very busy highway. We have concerns for the residents of the proposed facility hearing the constant barrage of gunfire from the training facility which is adjacent to the planned facility. We think the proximity to our property which is less than a half of a mile from the planned facility will lower our property values. We are a bit concerned about safety because the announced plans do not seem to address adequate perimeter fencing. Our neighborhood is primarily made up of retirees, many of whom are widows and already fearful. Having an additional center of troubled young people so close to the county detention center seems to be an added worry. We also have concerns that this facility although it is coded as "assisted living" is actually a "recovery" center and should be coded as such. If that is the case then the staffing should be adjusted to reflect the true purpose of the facility. We do not want to prevent mental health treatment facilities from being built, but do NOT think that this property was thought out considering all the issues that we have addressed here. We are quite sure that there are other parcels of land that would be better to house this than a residential/agricultural area such as the one proposed.

- 2. The traffic in this area is already a nightmare, due to new subdivisions in the area, with no update with the roads, along with the Roger Wilson Correctional Facility that has had escapee's roaming around in our area, which creates fear of breaking and entering our homes.
- 3. There is a school bus stop very close to this address.
- 4. Our property will decrease in value 8-15%
- 5. We have learned that this site is **coded for assisted living instead of a recovery facility**, which makes the codes easier to deal with.
- 6. We are in fear of patients eloping in our community in our surrounded farmland.
- 7. We were informed that once a patient reaches a higher level, they would be free to be on the outside of the fence with no outer security which would give them freedom to be in our neighborhood.
- 8. We were informed there would be college interns taking care of these patients mainly at night, with no experience of any clinicals. Ratio was like 4 to 1 intern I believe. Also, each cottage bed 18 kids, with 1 counselor.
- 9. This area is residential, not commercial. We, as residents are in fear of this facility being built here in our community. We are in fear for our children, our grandchildren. Please respect our community, and refuse this facility in this area.

Members of the Knox County Planning Commission,

My family lives within a couple hundred yards of the proposed Acadia Healthcare Juvenile Residential Treatment Facility proposed to be located at 4937 Wise Springs Road. Below are my family's concerns associated with this project. Thank you for your review and consideration of these points as an important component of your decision making process.

First, I would like to echo the sentiments expressed particularly by David N. Leone, Laurie Hildenbrand, Kenneth Domingues, Julia Gibson as well as many others who have authored and submitted letters of concern. Their points are very well made and should be heavily weighted as the commission considers approval for this facility. Some of the items I note below are re-iterations of their comments.

- 1. In this COVID environment, the community has not had sufficient time nor opportunity to understand, assemble, review and provide comment to the commission in regard to its position relative to this project. Well organized municipal, city and county boards are having a difficult time communicating effectively. A community such as ours cannot properly respond to an issue of this nature in the matter of days (note the July 30 notification date). Please postpone a decision on this application a minimum of 30 days so that the community has a reasonable amount of time to respond appropriately.
- 2. Acadia has a history of prior issues. The issues are not a result of location but more so due to ineffective facility management. Location simply brought the issues to light publicly. Note the February 2019 article in the Daily Times: https://www.thedailytimes.com/news/louisville-behaviorhealth-center-to-relocate-after-assaults-neighborhood-concerns/article 523be3b2-98ce-5ea6-afdf-028e94103b9e.html
- 3. The above article notes a relocation to the Riverbend area and identifies all the reasons that the Riverbend area is a good fit. What happened? Why the Wise Springs location? It's not Riverbend. It isn't near a hospital or a highway, it's no longer agricultural zoned, it is in a residential area (Smithbilt has property for a several hundred unit subdivision directly across the street. See previously published comments that identify the ideal location for the facility:

New facility

Acadia Healthcare Division President Jeffrey Woods

Woods said the new facility near Riverbend in Knox County would not face the same kinds of problems because of a scarcity of neighbors.

"It's currently zoned (as an) agricultural area, so there's not a lot around," Woods said. "It keeps us out of residential areas or even areas that are likely to become residential in the future."

Woods touts a nearby nature reserve and proximity to the highway as additional perks of the new location, which will begin to accept a wider range of patients.

"When there are kids, and they are kids under 18, put in your care, you have to have control and responsibility, and they can't be roaming freely, whether they're out in the country or in the middle of town," the resident added.

"We don't disagree," Woods responded.

4. Placing this facility directly adjacent to a very active firing range seems like poor planning. The firing range is active in the morning, afternoon and evening. The loud, sharp reports of firearms are clearly audible up to 1 mile away. The Acadia facility would be practically next door to it. I can't imagine this is conducive to the wellbeing of juvenile behavioral health patients. Acadia is not considering patient wellbeing.

5. Staffing and Professional care services appear to be less than adequate when reviewing the records of past issues. The facility has previously admitted that staffing is a source of their issues. How has Acadia committed to fix their in-house problems that evolved into problems for the neighborhoods and surrounding community?

If the commission intends to approve this plan. Please consider the following as conditions of an approval:

- a. This development is being reviewed as an Assisted Living Facility. How many assisted living facilities in the surrounding area require a fence 14' in height as a component of the development - shown on the current plans. How many assisted living facilities have been required to relocate due to problems or dangers they have created in thier community – please refer to previously mentioned Daily Times article. If this motion passes, please require non-scalable security fencing at the entire property boundary as a component of the development for the safety of the juvenile residents. Mr. Woods previously stated that he agreed that patients should not be able to roam
- b. Please require that Acadia maintain the 1:4 staff to resident ratio and limit the capacity to 144 residents throughout lifespan of the facility.

I believe approving this project now would be both hasty and unthoughtful. An approval shows Knoxville's disregard for the community in which this facility is proposed to be located. Please deny or at the minimum, postpone this motion to a later date. Please require Acadia to further research additional locations that more closely align with their mission to meet "the needs of its patients AND community".

While we are certainly in favor of rehabilitation for these juveniles, it seems there must be a much more remote area that is not surrounded by hard-working families and retirees who have worked their entire lives to live in a guiet and safe community. The community also houses the Knox County Detention Facility within 1/2 mile of the proposed location as well as the training facility for Knox County Sheriff's office. The training facility conducts firing "drills" or something of the sort, daily and the sound is easily heard around the neighborhood. The noise is probably going to be a distraction for the youth when inside the Rehab facility, but it will definitely be a concern when they are in the courtyard or in the surrounding area of the facility.

Louisville behavior health center to relocate after assaults, neighborhood concerns

The Village Behavioral Health Treatment Center will relocate from Louisville to Knox County in the next two years following the adjoining neighborhood's unease over escaped juveniles, assaults and other incidents stemming from the juvenile residential facility.

On Jan. 29, Acadia Healthcare Division President Jeffrey Woods held a meeting with members of the public to discuss the company's plan to move the facility and address neighborhood concerns.

In a recording of the meeting provided to The Daily Times by a neighborhood resident, Woods said Acadia will move over the next 18-24 months to a more fit location in Knox County.

"We recognize that it would be beneficial to these patients and even to our business interests and to your community that we move this facility to a new location," Woods told an audience of around 10. "All in all, it'll be about an 18-month turnaround."

Woods said the company was investing \$35 million to purchase property and build a new facility rather than investing in the property they currently lease from Covenant Healthcare on Jones Bend Road because, as a clinician, he does not think the Louisville location is viable.

"My assessment was almost immediately 'this has to change," Woods said. "Anybody who preceded me with respects to corporate leadership, their point of view may have been different. ... It would be in our interest to build there if it made sense to build there, because we already have the land, but it's just not appropriate."

Incidents:

The current facility, at the end of Jones Bend Road, is a residential behavioral center for low- to midacuity juvenile patients and is composed of a series of cabins and small buildings on the shore of Fort Loudon Lake, neighboring a residential community.

With no fencing or discernable border between the cabins and the community, many neighbors have been victims of or irritated by juvenile runaways and related crimes over the years.

The long-standing concern resurfaced in September 2018, when three teenage boys fled the facility and were charged with vehicle theft and aggravated assault and kidnapping of a facility employee.

In the recording, Woods seemed to try and soften the incident, saying that the oldest of the boys felt he had to "rescue" his girlfriend who had recently been discharged from the facility, adding later that "you're always going to have the 17-year-old boy who does something stupid" and that every facility has patients who flee secretly.

On several occasions throughout the meeting, Woods said the facility had experienced a significant decrease in incidents over the past year and a half because of staffing changes and selective acceptance of applicants due to the facility's inability to serve patients of a certain acuity.


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One unidentified resident at the meeting told Woods that Acadia should strive for zero patient elopements, and that anything else was unacceptable.

"This is the real world and the reality is it's going to happen on any campus," Woods said. "We have had a dramatic, sharp decrease of incidents on this facility over the last year and a half, and we want to work to a zero (elopements) point. ... But I'm not gonna stand here and tell you that between now and 18-24 months from now there will no longer be a problem on our campus."

The same call data, however, seemed to emphasize the severity of facility incidents.

Among the 160 incidents listed in the log (Jan. 3, 2016 to Feb. 7, 2019), many are follow-ups, probation and other innocuous calls, but the most common call is for missing juveniles, with 43 such incidents in the three-year range. There were also 10 assaults, five disturbances and four thefts reported.

Woods attempted to downplay the negatives, citing a committee of "some number" of neighbors who have had "strong feelings of opposition" and some that had "very strong support" toward the facility.

The resident rebutted Wood's idea there was a measure of support for the property, saying that neighbors not directly impacted would "obviously" care less.

"If (my property) wasn't directly joining your property, I wouldn't be directly impacted and I'd be like 'what are these people complaining about," he said. "The fact is The Village is set up for a summer camp, not an inpatient facility."

"There are a number of facilities that look exactly like this in terms of their structure," Woods responded. "But they tend to be, for sure, more wilderness."

"The thing is we don't have peninsula hospital patients running around our neighborhood," the resident said.

Woods said that he would have facility management regularly meet with the community for the duration of the center's Louisville stay and that staffing changes such as shorter shifts should help cut down on issues. He conceded that Acadia's priorities remain patients first, staff second and community third.

New facility

Woods said the new facility near Riverbend in Knox County would not face the same kinds of problems because of a scarcity of neighbors.

"It's currently zoned (as an) agricultural area, so there's not a lot around," Woods said. "It keeps us out of residential areas or even areas that are likely to become residential in the future."

Woods touts a nearby nature reserve and proximity to the highway as additional perks of the new location, which will begin to accept a wider range of patients.

"When there are kids, and they are kids under 18, put in your care, you have to have control and responsibility, and they can't be roaming freely, whether they're out in the country or in the middle of town," the resident added.

"We don't disagree," Woods responded.

When asked by a neighbor what would become of the current facility, Woods speculated.

"I think it's probably safe for me to say that Covenant does not have an appetite to reinvigorate that campus for that same purpose," Woods said. "I don't think that there probably is any health care provider who would look at that property and think it is viable without doing a complete rebuild."

Woods declined to be interviewed for this story, but provided a written statement on the relocation saying it "will allow Villages to continue its mission and to expand services for patients with varying levels of care intensity requirements.

"When completed, the new facility is expected to improve access to desperately needed care and treatment," the statement reads. "Village Behavioral Health is committed to providing care that meets the needs of its patients and community. We are proud of our 10 year history and the thousands of lives that have been improved by that care and treatment."










Dear Planning Commission,

My name is Alex & I am writing about the Acadia Healthcare juvenile behavioral health & drug/alcohol treatment center that is being proposed for 4937 Wise Springs Rd. Ben Mullins & members of Acadia Healthcare met with the community on August 10th to help us understand what they are proposing to do with land & answer questions. After this meeting I am left with even more questions & concerns about this type of facility becoming part of our community. My first question is why the facility is only having to meet the requirements for assisted living when the plans submitted by Acadia cleary describe a rehabilitation center? The best explanation I received is assisted living is the closest description under Knox County ordinance to what this facility is going to provide.

I reside at 4717 Wise Springs Rd & this facility will have an impact on my family. My biggest concern is safety for my own family & my neighbors. Acadia explained this would be a new, updated facility & different from the current "Village" facility in Louisville, TN however the only difference seems to be that the staff will have key cards to enter/exit the front of the cottages & the patients will only be allowed to exit the back of the cottages into a fenced courtyard. While this is an improvement from the layout they currently have in Louisville it doesn't change the fact that escaped patients roaming around the neighboring properties have been the number one source of complaints from the current location. After speaking with residents of Jones Bend Rd where the current facility is located they told us escaped patients were a weekly occurrence, there have been cases of assault & in one instance a group of patients stole a counselors vehicle in order to flee the facility. Acadia confirmed patients from "The Village" would be transferred to the new Wise Springs facility. These patients are not only from Tennessee but around the country, they will be curious as to what is on the outside of this facility which is our homes.

While the main courtyard may have a fence, the area they are wanting to use for nature trails, animal therapy, fishing ponds & outdoor activities has no barrier around it. This is very unsettling as a homeowner that these patients could walk off Acadia's property & be in one of our backyards in a matter of seconds. We all have children & animals that are our main priority just like Acadia states these patients are their main priority. As of now Acadia has no plans to put any barrier around the property line, when we asked about a privacy fence, like the one the are using to enclose the main courtyard, on the property line an Acadia representative responded by saying that was not something they were considering at this time but it could be looked into if issues were to occur. If this facility is approved I beg a condition of this approval be that Acadia must put a solid security/privacy fence at least 12 feet around the entire 40+ acre property. I feel this additional buffer between the facility & the community should give everyone added comfort that the patients will remain on their property.

Another concern is that this facility will be next door the Knox County Sherriffs Office regional training center & shooting range. The sound from the shooting range is very loud & happens several days a week, throughout the day. Acadia said multiple times they are striving to provide these patients with a serene, peaceful environment especially for school studies & therapy sessions. This shooting range is not conducive to provide that environment especially for children who are already struggling with mental health, anxiety & other disorders this facility will treat. In fact, after the meeting the adolescent psychiatrist who was there on Acadia's behalf approached a neighbor to express her concern over the firing range being such a prominent fixture & the effect it would have on the children.

I applaud Acadia for wanting to help challenged youth however I whole heartedly believe there is a property that would better suit their needs than 4937 Wise Springs Rd. A property with acreage & no family homes or even property in a commercial setting would be ideal for them. A residential area that only has the potential to become more residential like Wise Springs is not the place for them.

I want to thank you for your time & all I ask is that you really give this case attention & ask if our community is the right fit for this facility or if another property would better serve them & the needs of their patient's.

My name is Chase and I live on Wise Springs Road in Northeast Knox County. I am reaching out to you regarding the proposed use of review for 4937 Wise Spings Road. We have some what we consider major concerns.

We attended the re-zoning meeting back earlier in the year and voiced our concerns then. We have learned a great deal more about what is to be developed in our backyard. A lawyer representing Acadia Healthcare reached out to me and asked to meet with members of the community either August 10th or 11th to answer questions and address concerns. We are not used to this sort of thing but we happily agreed. The use of review notice came shortly after. With only seventy-two hours to absorb the information Acadia provided, I dont believe the community got a fair deadline to voice their concerns to the Planning Commission. We were unsure of what we were dealing with until we were able to meet with Acadia.

One of the key concerns we have with this proposed residential treatment facility is the lack of perimeter fencing. We pleaded with them to build a privacy fence along the property lines to not only give the neighbors a peace of mind, but also Acadia if another major incident occurs. They pushed back and stated that a wall would only be built if they felt it was necessary or if an issue were to arise. Acadia unfortunately has gained a reputation in the past few years regarding escapes, assaults, theft, fraud, etc... I urge you to investigate the following link:

In that article, the division president was quoted in regards to escapees as "This is the real world and the reality is it's going to happen on any campus". This does not make the surrounding community feel safe. Home should be a safe place and nobody wants to have to constantly be on alert while enjoying their lives at home. They claim that they have a system in place to notify neighbors if there is a major incident but we spoke with the residents living in proximity of their current facility on Jones Bend Road in Louisville, Tennessee and they stated that Acadia isn't very proactive about Alerting the community properly.

The next major concern may be the most serious. Roughly 1000 feet West of where this facility is to be built is the Knox County Sheriff's Office Regional Training Academy. I have lived on the same plot of land my entire life and there are some days that the Sheriff's Office uses the firing range all day. Many times a week. On some days it will actually wake me up if I decide sleep in. I can't see the benefit of treating children with anxiety and emotional issues while there are live fire exercises being conducted just beyond the trees. It should be noted that at the community meeting with Acadia that they were completely aware of the firing range. One of their representatives, a psychologist, pulled some of us aside and expressed great concern over the gunfire. She urged us to press the matter with her colleagues

I personally believe we should give our children with special needs the best care we possibly can. I am not against a facility of this type. I just do not believe Wise Springs Road is the best location to properly treat our youth with these types of behavioral needs. This also very out of character with the surrounding area.

Please, I strongly urge the commission to **Disapprove** the proposed use of review for case file 8-C-20-UR.

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

Members of the Commission, my wife and I are providing you with thoughts, considerations and concerns regarding the proposed case 8-C-20-UR, Residential Treatment Center in PR (Planned Residential) District 8. We realize the Thursday, August 13 commission meeting relates to the applicant meeting the requirements of zoning requirements and any stipulations the commission sets on the applicants.

We first wish to state the need throughout Tennessee for youth treatment centers. The crisis of drugs and alcohol with today's youth is of vital concern. The impact of our youth dealing with these issues reaches beyond the child and tears at the family structure and our community.

Regarding this proposed treatment center, we believe it can provide the overall support to youth, however, we are concerned about the procedure followed thus far and to specifics within the proposal.

First, our community received word of this proposal on July 30 not from the applicant nor from the Planning Commission. We received word from a homeowner in the local area who mailed out a notice to all concerned residents. The earliest a community meeting with the applicants could be arranged was Monday, August 10. At that meeting residents met with an attorney working with Acadia Healthcare, the director of the treatment residential facility, and one of the professional staff. Other individuals, although not presenting, included the architects. It was at this meeting that we were informed about the Planning Commission meeting on Thursday, August 13.

The short timeframe for the residents to study, prepare and address questions and concerns was insufficient. The approval of this application should be postponed for 30 days until further community discussions can be held with members of Acadia Healthcare.

These members of Acadia Healthcare informed us of the new facility needs, program overview, staffing structure, and basics about the residents and how they are evaluated. Following their presentation, the program was open to questions. These questions pertained primarily to design, safety, security, and potential impacts to residents and their property.

From questions we and other residents asked has left my wife and I with the following concerns.

- 1. No mention of prior issues with Acadia's Village facility were mentioned although questions focused on Acadia's Village facility were raised concerning why not just expand that facility. Indeed, we were informed by one of our residents that there were serious issues with Acadia's Village facility in 2019 including staff selling drugs to residents, escaped juveniles, and assaults. The history of a residential treatment facility run by Acadia leaves us with further questions about how Acadia will organize this facility and programs differently than they did at the Village facility.
- 2. Studies on youth alcohol and drug rehab facilities show a strong need for positive support and best practices for recovery and growth of the youth. This means eliminating negative disruptions including the sounds of violence. It was pointed out to the applicants that the Knox County Sheriff's office has a firearm target range near the proposed residential treatment facility. Law enforcement frequently uses this target range which produces loud, sharp sounds heard a mile or more away. My wife and I did not feel the applicants appreciated this concern although there is sufficient information supporting this concern.
- 3. The actual footprint of the proposed facility and surrounding area became clear after further discussion. The concerns were raised about the proposed fencing around the facility itself, surrounding the grounds, cottages, and center administrative building. Many residents focused the need for fencing the complete land boundary. This was met by hesitation and avoidance by the applicants.
- 4. The concern was raised that Acadia Healthcare needs to make a profit on this facility; as any business must. According to the applicants this facility will be limited to 144 residents (although the application states 216 maximum), 8 cottages (although the application states 12 maximum), and a 1:4 staff to resident ration to ensure maintaining structure and safety. If additional residents are accepted to help meet revenue needs, will Acadia maintain the 1:4 ratio or will that ratio change to 1:6 or higher? This is an important consideration for residents to feel confident Acadia Healthcare has addressed the problems incurred at the Village residential facility.

There are many issues yet to discuss regarding this incredibly important facility. For this to succeed, we need to meet with Acadia Healthcare and discuss these issues. Your approval to delay approving this application is particularly important to us all.

As a resident of Wise Springs Rd, I have a few concerns on the development of 4739 Wise Springs Rd as a Resident Rehabilitation Facility.

To begin with, I think the need for a facility of this nature is needed for the children in Knoxville and surrounding area. I do not think the area on Wise Springs is the best location for this type of facility.

My concern for the residents of this facility consist of the fact that the children in this facility have a variety of issues. This area is less than a mile from the Regional Training Firing Range which is used 6 days a week. This gun fire is live rounds of ammunition that goes on for hours each day. I cannot understand how this type of environment is best for adolescents that are in a facility for Mental, Emotional and Behavioral Disorders.

When meeting with Acadia, the violence, assaults and elopements from various types of facilities ran by Acadia was addressed. The only thing that Acadia will say is that the facility in Blount County cannot be compared. They also stated that some of those residents could be moved to the site on Wise Springs. Moving the patients from one location to another is not going to solve the issues without addressing the real problem, which in this case would be proper security for the residents and adjacent property owners. They have no plans for perimeter fencing around the entire facility.

If Acadia wants to come into our neighborhood and build a facility of this type, it seems to me as though they would want to make the neighbors feel secure and have the concerns of all parties involved in their best interest.

All the security concerns voiced by the community meeting with Acadia were met with resistance and the comment made "that fencing is not needed". The statement was made that if a fire alarm was pulled that only the back doors would unlock to the courtyard and there would be no outside access. I have enough experience in healthcare to know that when a fire alarm is pulled all doors are required to open which would allow the residents free access to outside of the facility.

As a lifelong resident of this community I have the right to feel safe on my property. Our fears are fact based on articles published by the Maryville Times in February, 2019.

Please consider the concerns of the community when considering this facility for approval for being in our backyard.

This email is regarding the Use of Review agenda item 8-C-20-UR.

I would like to take the time to identify some concerns regarding the Acadia Healthcare juvenile residential treatment facility proposed for the 4937 Wise Springs Rd location. This information was collected from a community meeting that Acadia held at Union Baptist Church on 8/10/2020.

- 1. **Patient well-being** the attendees at this meeting identified that the selection of this location, was not selected with the patients care in mind. Rather the location was selected more for as an inexpensive financial opportunity. This location is susceptible to a large amount noise generated from the Law Enforcement firing range directly adjacent to the proposed property. Among the attendees at the meeting were certified medical personnel. They identified that the loud continuous noise which persist on a daily basis generated from the firing range, will more than likely hinder the treatment of the patients who have been diagnosed with the behavioral problems that Acadia has stated will receive treatment. It was also stated that the level of noise generated from the firing range is likely to cause more damage to the mental state of the expected patients.
- 2. **Location** the surrounding community is not in favor of this location. The adjacent property landowners have stated privacy and safety concerns that have happened at the previous facility, and still have the potential to arise at this facility. This is due to the unsatisfactory "Security Upgrades" that Acadia stated that they will install at the new facility. When asked about these "Security Upgrades" they stated that they will only have a fence and locks on the doors. The level of security measures that have been identified as "Upgrades" can, and more than likely will be bypassed with a little of coordination from the patients not wanting to remain there. This ultimately puts an additional risk to the safety of the patients and the surrounding neighbors.
- 3. **Staffing / Professional care** The staffing ratio that was identified by Acadia will be 1 staff member to 4 patients with the majority of the staff requiring no more than a high school diploma. The majority of staff that has been identified at the Louisville facility was proven not to be adequate enough to handle the level of care and attention that these type of patients need. According to the Acadia representative the same staffing ratio is supposed to be adequate for activities that will take place on the outside of the "Security Fence" on the 30 plus acre property. Allowing uninterrupted access to the adjoining properties. In some instances, the "staff" that Acadia has employed at the Louisville facility has been mistaken for escaped patients. When the neighboring homeowners contacted the facility with a description of the individual trespassing on their property, the personnel on duty stated that it was one of their employees. This possibly identifies that Acadia employs individuals that display a lack of professionalism. There is a certain level of professionalism necessary when treating patients requiring positive emotional support as well as professional medical attention. There were other examples of there being lack of professionalism that were identified during the meeting, however I was unable to record all that was being said. One community member did stress the information that was being displayed on the popular social media platforms by current staff members were labeled as disgusting and disrespectful. Acadia representatives held this meeting with the agenda to convince the community that Acadia is a professional healthcare facility with the main focus being on the well-being of the patients in their care. However the only message that was clear to myself, and the majority of the community that were in attendance at this meeting was that Acadia is a company/business who may provide care to some troubled youth however there priority is appears to be on the business side focusing on making a profit. This is evident through the staff selection/screening process and the lack of willingness to upgrade the security level necessary to adequately protect the patients and the surrounding community.

Tennessee is a large state and there is more than likely a more suitable location available away from any community that will suit the needs of a facility like this. I urge the Knox County Planning Commission to deny this location or any other location within this community.

I also want to thank you for the opportunity to express my concern of the proposed location.

My name is Meghann Howard. My address is 4921 Wise Springs Rd. My family and I share a property line with the proposed facility of 8-C-20-UR. If you are not familiar with Acadia Health systems and their previous facilies, I ur ge you, please, research. It is my opinion, moving forward with this Use of Review will be detrimental to the community. The community had the opportunity to meet with representaves of Acadia Health and voice concerns.

Although there are mulple concerns, I will try to keep this personal to me. It is known that Acadia Health is relocang this facility from Louisville, Tn. Some of our community members have had the opportunity to speak to owners of adjoining properes regarding any issues they had with the juvenile facility located there. To list a few: The, assault, and tr espassing. Acadia repeatedly states the proposed facility on Wise Springs will be different. That we cannot compare this facility to the previous. However, what they fail to ever menon is, theav operated the previous facility and were unable to make necessary safety correcons. Ther e was not a fence at the previous facility, and their soluon is onea fence around the compound with some landscape. We have begged and pleaded as a community for a perimeter fence around the enr e property. The response we were met with, "We would consider that if there was ever an occurrence or elopement." I will not tolerate an atude of "somea thing is be. er than nothing." With 30 million dollars allo Aed to this property there is no reason Acadia cannot take an ounce of prevenon. I haave a 2 year old with a TERMINAL DIAGNOSIS, my child and my family are my first priority. I have always taken extra measure to get ahead of potenal prooblems. Acadia has a responsibility of making all of these neighboring properes a priority as well.

I cannot understand categorizing this plan under Assisted Living. They do not meet the Knox County Zoning ordinance definion of assis ted living. Can I get some clarificaon? Ther e will not be any type of perimeter security. There is no security plan for immediately nof ying adjoining properes of an elopemen t. We will be given the opportunity to sign up for text alerts. TEXT ALERTS?! I am quoted 60 feet from compound fence to my fence. 60 FEET. My yard would be one of the first places to flee. This compound is surrounded by 600 acres of farm land. There are so many places a child could get hurt or hide. This brings up liability quesons as well. Hopefully someone else will address this. There are cases pertaining to escapees geng hurt and Ac adia suing.

This facility will also back up to the Knox County firing range. This facility trains individuals from all over Tennessee. We have sound clips of the shoong r ange from our back porch. I do not believe anyone could approve this locaon in g ood conscience. These are juveniles with co morbidies . Ac adia's mission claims they are trying to provide a calm/serene environment for their paen ts. It was concerning enough for the psychiatrist with Acadia(she was not aware this firing range existed) to approach me a. er the meeng , deeply concerned about this environment. She has urged the community to emphasize the dangers with this. I spoke to Tommy Spangler; he stated no one has approached him with any of these plans. I can't imagine they haven't contacted someone in the sheriff's office. Blount County Sheriff's office handled hundreds of calls regarding this facility and their paen ts. Why weren't they the first people Acadia reached out to? I hope I've been misinformed. Repeang pas t mistakes is not tolerable. Acadia representav es were not aware of the firing range! The safety, both mental and physical, of the paen ts must be thought about in more detail than this.

There are also concerns with decline in property value. Will we be responsible for paying a maintenance fee for the sewer line coming in? This facility is not compable with the curr ent neighborhood. When there is an occurrence, and a mandatory prescribed hospital stay is ordered, or worse, an injured paen t, we are far from Children's Hospital.

I hope you will truly consider the lack of communicaon and responsibility from Acadia regarding this facility. I cannot imagine hearing delivery trucks, semis, visitors, etc all day. I do not want to see or hear anything from the neighboring property. Digging down a 20% grade and adding shrubbery is not acceptable. The only acceptable measure for a company that has this track record in lack of safeguards is to relocate to an area with more accessibility to security and less access to "elope and hide". If we are unfortunate enough that they build here we, as a community, have to "demand" perimeter fencing. Our fear is fact based.

Mental health facility locaons haave declined significantly over the last 10 years. I am hands on paen t care daily. I see how my paen ts are impacted when they can't get the care they need. As a parent, I may need a facility like this for my child one day. I am on board with plans for a treatment facility in an area more populated/closer to a hospital. Let's not pretend this something it isn't. This is not a posh luxury country getaway for troubled teens. It is a treatment facility. It is NOT assisted living. Please do not put my family or any paen t in an avoidable situaon.

I would also like to know if recovery homes have to be a certain linear footage from a bus stop. I cannot find this informaon. The adjoining property is a bus stop. And if they are required to be a certain distance away, will the use of review as assisted living allow them to disregard this bus stop? Thank you for reading all the way through.

To Whom it May Concern:

I am a resident of the community where this proposed residential youth treatment facility will be built. I attended the meeting at Union Baptist Church on the evening of August 10, 2020 to hear the representatives from Acadia, their engineers and attorney speak about the development. Based upon their statements, I don't understand the logic for attempting to build the facility on this property. Many residents raised the issue of the firing range next door and the gun noises heard throughout the day. That is obviously a concern, but based on Acadia's representation that they want the children to feel at home, as if they're not confined to a prison, and they want them to be able to participate in hiking and equine therapy on portions of the property, which are not fenced, it seems to me that they need a larger property. I feel that they would be better accommodated on a property of 200+ acres, allowing room for their residences, school, eating and nursing facilities, as well as plenty of outdoor space for activities. In a setting of that nature, fencing would not be the issue it is in this particular location, where neighbors are directly alongside the facility property lines. We were told that this facility will house mostly residents from across the state of TN (70%) with an additional 15% from North Carolina and the remaining 15% from across the country. If this is a national program, why not put it in a more accommodating location with lots of open space and acreage for the students to obtain treatments without having neighbors, noise and distraction so close by?

The representatives also stated that they take measures to screen applicants through extensive background checks and that their residents do not have behavioral problems. I find this to be a false statement after reading this article, published just last year: https://www.thedailytimes.com/news/louisville-behavior-health-centerto-relocate-after-assaults-neighborhood-concerns/article_523be3b2-98ce-5ea6-afdf-028e94103b9e.html. I do understand that the former facility did not have proper safety accommodations, which in itself boggles my mind. However, I believe that the Acadia representatives presented false information when they stated that these youth do no present behavioral issues. Additionally, it is not farfetched to believe that one or more youth could overpower a caregiver, take their key card and abscond from the facility.

I understand that the youth will be outside the fenced portion of the property for hiking and equine therapy and will take off-site excursions with staff members at a ratio of 1 staff member per 4 children. I further understand that the staff member escort will simply be a person with a high school diploma or equivalent who has received 2 weeks of training. Apparently these positions are mostly filled by college students working part time jobs. I foresee many problems with this scenario as 4 children could easily overpower their staff person or, if one or more decided to escape, that staff person would not be equipped to immediately recover them.

The community implored Acadia to delay this vote, and they declined. During this time of COVID, people cannot attend an in-person meeting. The meeting being held on Zoom truly limits many people. We will have representation from 2 community members, who will receive a total of 5 minutes to present their position. Additionally, most community members were completely unaware of this entire development. Had it not been for the immediate neighbors notifying a few property owners, no one would have known at all. I personally only learned about it when I heard a meeting was being held at my church. I had to go online and find all the plans and information about Acadia for myself.

Acadia informed us at the meeting that this is their Plan A; they have no Plan B. If this is to be built – and since no one in our community of hard-working, middle class people has any connections, money or power to get this vetoed - we at least deserve all the safety precautions possible. However, when I asked that they at least put up an additional fence – one along the perimeter of the property – I was told they would address that if the need arose. Well, if the need arises, it will be too late.

Many of our children ride the bus to and from school. Many, mine included, are often home for a portion of the day alone (and all day on days that the school is not open for in-person instruction). As parents, we do not want the additional worry that some child has escaped these confines and run in the direction of homes where our children are defenseless and alone. Would any of you want that for YOUR children? I think not. Acadia's attorney mentioned that he would have no problem living in our area or even next door to this facility or one like it, but his wife wouldn't allow him to move from West Knoxville. I dare say that she would also not allow him to live next door to a facility of this nature. They would likely not put their own children at risk, and I seriously doubt any of you would.

I understand that the current owners of the property are threatening our community; they are making statements that, if we do not accept this and go along with this proposal, they will accept an offer from a developer of Section 8 housing. The current owners don't live directly in this area, so this doesn't concern them. They are obviously in this just for the money. However, now that the community is becoming aware (and no, most people still don't even know about this, but with more time, we could see to it that they did), the community would also rally against Section 8 housing. That, too, would have to come before the Commission.

Much was discussed in terms of property values. Statements were made that this would not lower our values. I dare say that the people directly touching this property would have substantially lower values and would have significant trouble should they ever attempt to sell their properties. Smithbilt purchased the land across the street from the property at issue. I now wonder if they will build lower cost homes since many people who could afford higher priced homes would not want to be right across from this facility. So in those terms, yes, our values will be brought down. The representatives also pointed out the Florence Crittenton Agency and the values around that institution. It seems that the development out there is mostly commercial, however, that is a home for girls, most of whom I believe are pregnant. This facility will house both boys and girls. As a mother of a preteen daughter, I do not like the thought of boys potentially escaping the facility and coming to my home where my daughter may be home alone.

I believe that residents of our community feel very let down by the planning commission. We have no real hospitals in our area; they are all downtown or in West Knoxville. We have no real retail to speak of. We have few restaurants; all of this industry is in West Knoxville. However, when you look for the enterprises that no

one wants, you stick them in our neighborhood. We already house the jail. We do not want the youth treatment facility as well. Additionally, we feel that this has been snuck in on us. We ask that you consider our positions, think about how you would feel if you lived beside this facility and had these concerns and vote against this proposal.

We met with about 30 neighbors last night to answer their questions about the development. I am enclosing the power-point presentation we shared with the neighbors. I would ask that this be included in the record and available for the planning commission for review prior to the meeting. I expect there to still be opposition and a push for postponement, but it was clear to me that any call for postponement is not because of the need to further review or discuss the item, but in hope that the delay may damage our chances of obtaining approval.

One issue that came up early was the Assisted Living Facility. Some of the neighbors believed that by reviewing this as an Assisted Living Facility instead of Group Boarding Home was intentional on our part and a way to avoid stricter review or state licensing. I addressed that last night relating to the differences in review under the Knox County Zoning Ordinance, and its definitions and standards versus the state licensing requirements that our facility is subject to (which is beyond the scope of this review) but it may still come up so I wanted to make you aware.

- Program will be licensed as a Residential Treatment Center and Alcohol and Drug Treatment Center for Youth
- Accredited through Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO)



 - ▶ On the weekends youth will participate in on/off campus activities such as sports, hiking, movies, etc. Visitation with the youth's family predominantly occurs on the weekends on-site as well as youth leaving the campus with their family for 1-2 days at a time.

- Program Layout and Security
 - ▶ There will be 8 cottages housing youth in the program. Each cottage consists of two units housing up to 9 youth each.
 - ► The cottages will be hardware secure with key card access for both entering and exiting the building. Youth will not be able to exit the cottage without staff.
 - ▶ The back of each cottage will enter into a large courtyard/sports field that is secured by a 14-foot privacy fence. Youth will transition through the courtyard to school and other activities housed in the main lodge.
 - ▶ Within the main lodge will be dining, full gym, classrooms, group rooms, nursing, and other administrative offices.
 - ► The main entrance to the property will have a key card access gate to prevent any entry of unauthorized individuals.
 - ► The youth will occasionally participate in activities in other parts of the property outside the cottages, courtyards, and main lodge. These activities will always be supervised by staff and include things such as use of the fishing ponds, walking trails, and other outdoor recreational activities.
 - Neighboring properties will be shielded from view with natural vegetation both preexisting and some areas where additional landscaping will be added during construction. Youth will always be supervised on the property.
















12 TYPICAL 18-BED PRTF COTTAGE CONCEPTUAL FLOOR PLAN
