

Air Pollution Violation at Vulcan Construction Materials, LP in Illinois (2006)

Introduction

In 2006, Vulcan Construction Materials, LP faced an air pollution enforcement action in Illinois that resulted in a penalty of \$1,301,003. The violation was handled by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (Illinois EPA), the state agency responsible for regulating environmental compliance and protecting air quality. The case involved violations of air pollution requirements at a Vulcan facility in Illinois and resulted in a civil penalty paid to the state enforcement authority.

Background of the Violation

The Vulcan Construction Materials case demonstrates the role of state regulators in holding companies accountable for environmental violations. Enforcement penalties provide a financial consequence for noncompliance and encourage companies to improve pollution controls and operating practices.

The 2006 air pollution violation involving Vulcan Construction Materials, LP in Illinois resulted in a \$1,301,003 penalty issued through the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.
