

Air Pollution Violation by CalMat Co. in California (2005)

Introduction

In 2005, CalMat Co. faced an air pollution enforcement action issued by the South Coast Air Quality Management District (South Coast AQMD) in California. The case involved an air quality violation and resulted in a \$7,500 penalty. The enforcement action highlighted the importance of compliance with regional air quality regulations and the responsibility of industrial facilities to properly manage emissions.
