

Air Pollution Violation by CalMat Co. in California (2006)

Introduction

In 2006, CalMat Co. faced an air pollution enforcement action issued by the South Coast Air Quality Management District (South Coast AQMD) in California. The case involved an air quality violation and resulted in a \$7,500 penalty. The enforcement action demonstrated the importance of maintaining compliance with air pollution regulations and the responsibility of industrial facilities to control emissions and protect regional air quality.
