

Air Pollution Violation by CalMat Co. in California (2008)

Introduction

In 2008, CalMat Co. faced an environmental enforcement action for an air pollution violation issued by the South Coast Air Quality Management District (South Coast AQMD) in California. The case resulted in a \$32,500 penalty. The enforcement action highlighted the importance of maintaining compliance with air quality regulations and controlling emissions from industrial operations.

Background of the Company
